Chief Executive's Foreword

This week will see Fingal making final preparations for the celebration of St. Patrick's Day this Friday. Across the county many thousands of spectators will gather to view the 7 parades as they pass through our towns and villages. This year, the festivities of the day begin at 11am as the Swords Parade gets underway followed by Balbriggan at 12pm, Rush at 1pm, Blanchardstown at 1pm, Lusk at 1:30pm, Malahide at 2pm and Skerries at 3pm. This National day of celebration is one we all look forward to as it gives us an opportunity to enjoy the pageantry, colourful displays and music and dance performances that are so synonymous with the day. Participating community, sporting and recreational groups all across Fingal have been working tirelessly to ensure attendees at the parades will be treated to a truly enjoyable day and I hope you have the opportunity to attend a parade in your locality to cheer them on!

On Friday March 6, I was pleased to attend the openings of three public amenities in the north county which will not only enhance the landscape of the areas but will also serve as an attractive incentive for visitors to come and explore Fingal. Mayor of Fingal Cllr Howard Mahony was accompanied by Minister for Housing, Government and Heritage, Darragh O'Brien TD, to the first two openings at Swords Regional Park in Oldtown and Swords Archaeological Park in Miller's Glen and was joined by Minister for State at the Department of Transport, Jack Chambers TD, and the Chief Executive of Dublin Airport, Vincent Harrison for the unveiling of the Ward River Regional Park Recreational Hub. These three amenities collectively will offer exceptional outdoor play, recreation and leisure spaces as well as a top class sporting hub at the very heart of the community. Investment of €6 million in this area demonstrates Fingal County Council's continuing commitment to growing Swords and its environs sustainably, innovatively and effectively. Delivery of key capital projects such as these rely on numerous factors including approval from the Elected Members, strategic planning, efficient procurement and collaboration between the Council and members of the community and other stakeholders and I am delighted to see all the work put into these projects coming to fruition for the benefit of the people of Fingal.

International Women's Day took place on March 8th with the theme of #EmbracingEquity. Each year Fingal County Council marks the day with a full programme of events, this year being no exception.

Events supported and facilitated by Fingal County Council included The 'Shine A Light for Women' event in Millennium Park, Fingal She Leads Women's Leadership Exhibition, International Photo Women's Celebration at Parslickstown House and a Day of Activities as part of the Bleeding Pig Festival at Donabate Community Centre. Many of the events, talks and seminars that took place focussed on the important issues facing women today as well as information on nutrition, mental health and wellbeing. A very entertaining end to International Women's Day came with performances from three accomplished musicians - Bernadette Nic Gabhann on fiddle, Éilís Murphy on concertina and Megan NicFhionnghaile fiddler and singer in The Atrium, County Hall. The event was organised by the Council's Irish Officer, Bernie Kelly, with support from The Séamus Ennis Arts Centre as part of Seachtain na Gaeilge and proved to be a very enjoyable evening of ceol, craic agus gaeilge! I would like to thank the Elected Members and my colleagues here in Fingal County Council for participating in both International Women's Day and Seachtain na Gaeilge and I hope that many of you had the opportunity to enjoy our varied and engaging programmes.

Just last week, I had the pleasure of attending the sod turning of a new housing development at Hayestown, Rush. When completed in 2024, there will be 62 attractive and energy efficient homes ready for occupation. Thanks to funding made available from the Affordable Housing Fund, the development will comprise of 80% affordable housing and 20% social housing giving house hunters the opportunity to purchase or rent one of 52 homes for significantly less than market rates. Identifying suitable sites in Fingal to progress housing delivery continues to be high priority for the Council and the Hayestown development is ideally situated on a 6 acre site adjacent to a stream and with the benefit of beautiful landscaping throughout. I very much look forward to the completion of this development and to see the first occupants taking up residence in their brand new homes.

I am very pleased to announce that Mary Egan has been appointed Director of People, Corporate and Digital Services. On behalf of myself, members of the Executive Management Team and the Elected Members I would like to congratulate Mary and wish her the best of luck as she commences her new role.

Wellbeing Update



Seminars:

The theme for Quarter 1 2023 has a focus on mental & financial wellbeing. In February we delivered a course of Financial Wellbeing seminars including Financials 101, Budgeting for Success, and Financial Planning. These are being repeated

on March 15th 23rd and 29th. They will be streamed live in Watery Lane and Coolmine Depot for outdoor staff. these seminars provide tips and advice on managing your finances, budgeting, and your entitlements. The are delivered by a professional financial advisor James McGoldrick.

Employee Assistance Service;

We also received our first full report on our Employee Assistance Service from Spectrum Life for the period Oct 1st to Dec 31st. The report provides us with anonymised feedback including: Number of calls made to the service, Number of cases opened, Main Method of Contact, Primary presenting problem, Secondary presenting problem, Age Range, Gender, Impacts and Severity. Overall, we received a green light low risk rating. We will use this feedback to influence the range of supports and initiatives for staff over the next quarter.

Menopause in the workplace;

We have recently procured menopause in the workplace training for staff and managers from The Menopause Hub Ireland's First Dedicated Menopause Clinic. 12% of menopausal women leave work due to symptoms & 43% consider leaving. Education and training are key to talent retention. The e-learning hub we are using will provide awareness and information training that includes: Understanding menopause & symptoms | Impact at work | Menopause business case | Role of manager | Supporting your colleagues & team | Legislative Risk.

Upcoming;

Based on feedback from staff and the EAS reports in quarter 2 we plan to focus on Stress management, fitness, and nutrition. Proving seminars on how to manage stress, beat burnout and be happier. We also will be putting together a group interested in training for the Fingal 10k on

July 16th providing support and training programmes. Another round of visits to promote the employee assistance service will take place in March and April.

Learning & Development

In 2023 there will be continued high levels of training provided with new courses and opportunities being added all the time. We also have several Climate Action training programmes that must be rolled out as part of the local authority KPI's they include Climate Action training for Outdoor and Indoor staff. Green Public Procurement training stand 1 and strand 2. Empowering Change Climate Action training. These are provided from relevant Government departments and delivered through the LASNTG (Local Authority Service National Training Group)

The staff scheme of assistance programme is also available for staff who wish to further their education, providing funding for applications ranging from certificate up to doctorate level.

February was another busy month for training with the following courses completed:

48 courses delivered, with **602** attendees, totalling **528.5** training days.

HSU - Health & Safety Unit

The HSU monitoring of Covid-19 staff self-isolations for February recorded low single digits. The HSU utilized MS Teams to schedule and carry out remote assessments and along with continuing office based VDU assessments have completed 113 assessments to date. Accident investigation into dangerous occurrences and incidents were carried out during February along with safety audits [4] and site safety inspections [25]. The HSU assisted Uisce Eireann's risk assessment lead with transfer of corporate HSQE documents as part of the transition to a national water services authority, completing this task by early February.





The table below shows the total number of Elected Members' representations assigned to each Department to date in 2023.





Digital Services Infrastructure & Support

Digital Working

In February staff took part in 8,806 Teams meetings, 28,670 calls took place, and 929,843 emails were received or sent by the Council.



Digital Services Infrastructure & Support


1,248 support calls were logged by Council staff with the Digital Services Service Desk in the past month and 7 calls were logged by Councillors with Sord. 100% server availability and 100% network availability was achieved in the month of February.

Teams Meeting Rooms Project

To date 23 teams meeting rooms have been rolled across the two main offices (County Hall, Swords & Civic Offices Blanchardstown). In Phase 3 of the project a further 11 rooms will be rolled out to include the Office of the Mayor and a Training Room in Coolmine Operations Depot.

Chief Executive Orders System

All departments have now gone live with the CE Order System. All CE Orders other than those for Planning Applications are generated through the new system. Planning Application Orders are still generated through the APAS Planning Application System. Dublin City Council have now purchased the CE Orders system through the Build to Share Framework and are currently running a pilot of the system with a view to going live with all departments over the coming year. For the previous two months, 1060 CE Orders have been approved through the new system.



Transition from CRM 2011 to Dynamics 365

The implementation of Dynamics 365 solution continues to progress. The deliverables from this project will include: (i) a standardised process framework across all FCC services for all calls logged through Dynamics 365, and (ii) an updated Councillors' Portal. It is expected that the Dynamics 365 migration will be ready for testing for April 2023, with a view to going live in May 2023.

Communications

Digital Media

The fingal.ie website has had 200,968 visitors since the start of the year and 539,747 page views with the average time spent on the site being 1 minute 59 seconds.

The corporate Twitter account had 22,199 followers at the end of February, an increase of 102 from the start of the year. There was an average of 13,900 impressions every day during the month and an engagement rate of 1.4%. The top media tweet was one which marked the approval of the Fingal Development Plan by Councillors. It gained 11,034 impressions when published.

Councillors have voted 34-0 to approve the Fingal Development Plan 2023-2029. The Mayor and Chief Executive paid tribute to councillors and staff for their hard work over the past two years to produce a plan that will allow residents, businesses and the county to thrive

Our Facebook page saw its reach rise by 24.7% from the previous month with 134,933 impressions while Instagram reach rose by 12.3% to 7,448. There are now 29,913 following our Facebook page while 6,293 are following on Instagram. The LinkedIn account continues to grow steadily and now has 6,742 followers.

Videos

The You Tube channel is closing in on 1,000 subscribers with 946 currently receiving notifications when videos are posted. During February eight videos were published on the channel including one on Fingal receiving CPD accreditation from Engineers Ireland and one on

the Croí Cónaithe Vacant Homes Refurbishment Scheme. A video providing a tour inside Bremore Castle, which was published in January, has had 470 views to date.

Support

During the month of February, the Communications continued to provide support to various departments across the Council. We assisted the Housing Department in hosting a stand at the Property Show in the RDS on February 24 while earlier in the month we provided communications support for the Hands Up For Campaign which was an initiative from the Community Development, Heritage, Culture and Creativity Strategic Policy Committee.



Media

The Communications Unit issued 14 press releases during February. Among the topics covered was the launch of the Irish Rare Breeds Study at Newbridge House and Demesne. Other notable press releases issued included the NTA awarding €17.11m for Fingal Active Travel projects, the promotion of Seachtain na Gaeilge and the Hands Up for Kindness project.



Seachtain na Gaeilge

Seachtain na Gaeilge takes place from 1-17 March and a number of events have been organised to promote this within the council and the county by Irish Officer Bernie Kelly. These included a bilingual walk in Ardgillan Demesne led by Dominica McKevitt and a musical evening in County Hall Swords with other events taking place in Libraries. A number of Fingal staff and Councillors have also started Irish Language courses

TOURISM

Tourism Strategy 2023 - 2029

A multi-stakeholder workshop involving representatives from State bodies, tourism agencies and the tourism industry, on 1st February. The workshop focused on the tourism product: to identify, explore and assess the tourism assets and potential in the county, gaps and opportunities and the strategic marketing messaging which will support the development of strategic growth and improvement objectives. The Improvement Proposal covers 3 areas:

- Product
- Structure / Infrastructure
- Marketing

In each of the three areas above gaps and also high-level solutions are identified. These solutions will be developed further in the strategy under the relevant strategic objective. A Marketing Plan is being developed in tandem as Marketing and Promotions will be one of the Objectives within the Strategy.

Fingal Food Network

The Fingal Food and Drink Network met on 24th January with the Council's Events Unit to discuss the promotion of Fingal produce at the Flavours of Fingal County Show this coming July. The network has also been offered the opportunity to work with a creative food expert to plan and manage this space.



Initial ideas and thoughts would include three themed areas within the 'Flavours' space

- Demos / talks / interactions
- Fingal Food Showcase of produce and tasting
- Fingal Food and Drink retail offering

The group is also driving membership to ensure a good mix of food producers, food retail and hospitality in the network, to that end a mini social media campaign is ongoing to encourage membership. The next networking event for the greater network will be held in Howth in April.

Fingal Food Policy



The food consultant, engaged by the Council is currently evaluating the current landscape, conducting an audit in the region and site visits to a mix of food producers, food hubs and enterprise centres and heritage properties. Opportunities are being identified and what might be required for businesses to strive and develop.

The consultant is also conducting one to one Interviews, a number of focus Groups and an industry stakeholder survey. The next phase will be consultation analysis of these three processes after which the consultant will present a key findings document to the in-house team.

The consultant has also met with the Fingal Tourism Strategy consultants to ensure both the food policy and the strategy are aligned.

Digital Apps for Walking Trails



The Economic, Enterprise, Tourism and Cultural Development Department has commenced discussions with tourism consultants Peel X on the development of digital walking trails for Balbriggan and Castleknock. Detailed work on the project will commence in March with the intention that the apps will be available for download by the end of May 2023. Following on from the Castleknock app, It is envisaged that additional trails will be developed for the wider Dublin 15/Liffey Valley area.

HERITAGE PROPERTIES

Malahide Castle - Emergency and General Lighting upgrade



The technical specification for the Emergency and General Lighting upgrade of Malahide Castle & Visitor centre is now complete.

The Mechanical & Electrical consultants are finalising the tender package. It is envisaged that works will commence in Q2 2023.

Malahide Castle - Boiler upgrade incl. Rainwater Harvesting/CHP

The Mechanical & Electrical consultants are finalising the tender package for the Boiler upgrade incl. Rainwater harvesting/CHP.

The works will consist of a full replacement of the boilers, reintroduction of the CHP and Rainwater Harvesting System, thus providing enhanced efficiencies over time by reducing costs and by promoting energy and water conservation.

It is envisaged that works will commence in Q2 2023.

Swords Castle - CCTV Works



An up-grade to the CCTV system in Swords Castle is currently underway and is due for completion by the end of March. This will provide for more effective surveillance within the castle and will also monitor activity within the town park.

Swords Castle - Lighting up for Rare Diseases Day



Swords Castle was lit up in blue for a week to raise awareness for Rare Diseases Day that took place on 28th February.

Newbridge House and Ardgillan Castle Roof Projects



The roof and joinery conservation works at Ardgillan Castle and Newbridge House are progressing well and on schedule. Extensive scaffolding continues to be erected at both sites to facilitate the works.

Both properties continue to operate as normal with all facilities currently open to the public and information boards at both sites have been erected to inform the public about the conservation works.

Catering Services



Following the evaluation of mini competitions for catering Services in respect of the Coach House Café, Newbridge and Ardgillan Castle, contracts were signed for the new operators in February. The Coach House Café at Newbridge, which closed at Christmas, re-opened to the public on 25th February 2023.

ARTS OFFICE Public Art



Public consultation has commenced with an initial meeting at Mulhuddart Community Centre as we plan to deliver new art commissions as part of per cent for art funding attached to developments in Dublin 15 including Churchfields. The Public Art Co-ordinator was joined by previously commissioned artists John Byrne, Declan Gorman and local artist John Conway to discuss possibilities and get insight into the communities there. The evening was supported with the help of the area's community officer. There are plans to extend the consultation across a variety of groups in the coming months.

Fingal Artist's Support Scheme 2023

Scéim Tacaíochta d'Ealaíontóirí Fhine Gall Fingal Artists' Support Scheme

2023

Fingal Arts Office recently invited applications for the Fingal Artists' Support Scheme 2023. This strand of funding allows professional artists to avail of an award up to €5,000 towards travel/professional development opportunities, a residency or towards the development of work. The overall budget for the scheme was increased from €200,000 to €250,000. This year saw the highest number of applications received since the beginning of the scheme in 2014. A total of 252 eligible applications were submitted, an increase of over 50%.

Cruinniu na nOg 2023



Fingal County Council invites proposals from Artists and Creative Practitioners for the development and delivery of artistic projects for children and/or young people for Cruinniú na nÓg 2023. Cruinniú na nÓg is a flagship initiative of the Creative Ireland Programme's Creative Youth Plan to enable the creative potential of children and young people. This year it will take place on Saturday 10th of June. Access to events, projects and showcases will be free, local and interactive. It's a day of doing, making, and celebrating young people's creativity. Creative Ireland Fingal Commissions are for the development of artistic and creative content that will children/young people (0-18 years) in unique experiences in any artform and in response to any thematic - including but not limited to visual art, music, literature, theatre, performance, spoken word. fashion, photography, digital installation art, street art, storytelling, architecture, biodiversity, heritage, archaeology, landscape. We are interested in prioritising face-to face engagement, but will accept proposals for innovative radio, tv, or digital media content. Proposals can aim to engage with early childhood/youth /community/arts settings, primary and post-primary schools, families and more.

Exploring and Thinking Bursary Award 2023



Fingal County Council has partnered with Dublin City Council, South Dublin County Council and Dún Laoghaire-Rathdown County Council to award six artists for the 2023 Exploring & Thinking Bursary, which supports individual professional artists developing their artistic practice working with and/or producing work for early childhood arts. The Award will assist its recipients - Lara Gallaher, Lucy Hill, Joanna Parkes, Janet Moran, Helen Barry and Monica Munoz, to develop their practice in a wide range of arts practices and creative experiences with or for children aged 0 -5 years in different contexts. 'Exploring and Thinking' is a collaborative framework for early childhood arts in the Dublin region, originating in 2016 when the four Dublin Local Authorities partnered for the first time to collectively consider early childhood arts provision in Dublin.

To mark International Women's Day Wednesday 8th March, Fingal Libraries has programmed a number of special events to celebrate the creativity and talent of Fingal Women. At Rush Library, a discussion with some of Fingal's Inspirational Female Entrepreneurs will take place at 6:30pm. Noelle McEvov of Supernature, Lauren McDonald of Lynotts Jewellery and Giselle Makinde of Cream of the Crop will be discussing their lives and careers in entrepreneurship. At Malahide Library, well know writer, columnist, and broadcaster, Barbara Scully will give a talk around the important topic of her latest book, Wise Up: Power, Wisdom & the Older, which includes ageing and ageism, the role of women in contemporary Ireland and the unlocked opportunities life offers older women post menopause. Both events are free to attend and open to the public.

Ireland Reads



Ireland Reads is an initiative of the government of Ireland, funded by Healthy Ireland to promote literacy and the arts. The nationwide campaign which ran in February 2023, aims to get the whole country reading in the lead up to a national day of reading which took place on Saturday, 25th February. To encourage members of the public to visit their nearest library, Fingal Libraries ran a successful social media campaign, complemented by a number of programmed events and activities, suitable for both children and adults. 
Viewpoints

Each child was gifted with a book, activity sheet and a fun fact sheet about their visiting author. The aim of this programme is to encourage and instil in children (especially reluctant readers) the love and enthusiasm for reading and creating, and to engage with their favourite author.

Other Events at your Library

The Spring 2023 programme of events has been running from January across Fingal Libraries and will continue till April. In March. the Spring programme included a range of events for both children and adults: St Patrick's Day crafts for children which ran a number of branches, a 4 week Art Course for beginners at Malahide Library, Genealogy Workshops with Claire Bradley at Skerries and Baldoyle Libraries, a range of events for Seachtain na Gaeilge, Sensory Friendly Lego and Sensory Friendly Soapmaking, and events promoting awareness in engineering for Engineers Week. Creative Ireland community funding



The Creative Ireland Programme is an all-ofgovernment culture and wellbeing programme that inspires and transforms people, places and communities through creativity. Fingal County Council is fully committed to supporting our local communities in participating fully in the new 5 year Creative Ireland programme and to assisting Fingal's citizen to realise their creative potential. As part of this, we are currently seeking applications for funding for creative community projects that are collaborative in nature, transform people and place and benefit the whole community. This grant scheme is open to community groups and not for profit organisations, arts, heritage and cultural groups, venues and societies to support creative projects. Applications by individuals must be in

partnership with a community, cultural or heritage group. To be eligible projects must:

 take place in County Fingal
 be accessible to diverse audiences and participants and will be inclusive in theme and approach

•be designed on a realistic financial basis and provide good value for money

Launch of Creative Ireland strategies



Minister for Tourism, Culture, Arts, Gaeltacht, Sports and Media Catherine Martin TD, Minister of State with responsibility for Local Government and Planning Kieran O'Donnell TD and Fingal Mayor Howard Mahony announced the roll out of 31 new Local Authority Creative Ireland Culture and Creativity Strategies (2023-2027) at an event at Farmleigh in the Phoenix Park on 23rd February 2023.

Building on the success of the first 5 year creative Ireland, a new strategy for Fingal was created during 2022 with input from the community, creative practitioners, and other stakeholders. The vision of the Creative Ireland Programme 2023–2027 is to mainstream creativity in the life of the nation so that individually and collectively, in our personal lives and in our institutions, we can realise our full creative potential thereby promoting individual, community and national wellbeing. The Creative Ireland Programme will deliver through collaboration and partnership promoting understanding and appreciation of the value of creativity in all its forms — whether through the arts, culture, heritage, or technology.

Our creative Ireland strategy focuses on a number of strategic themes which reflect the focus of Fingal as an area and as a local authority. These themes include:

- Changing population and demographics
- Climate action
- Town centre first/rural economy
- Digitalization and ongoing transformation
- Making cities and counties great places to live and work and invest in

These overarching themes will guide our work in creativity over the next 5 years with implementation by the community and the creative and cultural teams and supportive collaboration across Fingal departments.

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

Fingal Skills Strategy

Planning continues for Fingal's Student Skills Expo in 2023 with consultants engaged to assist with event planning. The event is being planned for October 2023 and participation will be promoted with Fingal Schools.

Fingal County Council has been successful in an application for Interreg Funding as a partner in the SKYLA Project "Smart Specialisation Skills Ecosystems for the Twin Transition". The project will have a term of 4 years and will focus on enhancing the role of VET in smart specialisation sectors. Projects partners include Italy, Poland, Sweden, Lithuania, Bulgaria, Greece and Belgium. The project will be co-ordinated by the Fingal Skills Strategy Team and the project will commence shortly.





CITIZEN, EQUALITY, RIGHTS AND VALUES PROGRAMME (CERV)

CERV is an EU Funding Programme for citizens' engagement and the implementation of EU rights

and values. Fingal County Council has been awarded CERV funding to participate in 2 separate projects, which commenced in January 2023 and will continue for 18 months.

GREEN IT YOUR WORK

The Green IT Your Work kick-off meeting took place in Sinaia, Romania on the 27th & 28th February. Representatives were present from Romania, Spain Greece, Cyprus, Slovenia, Crotia, Italy and Ireland. The main objectives of Green IT Your Work are:

- Youth Debates about European Digital Age project highlighting the role of young people in the green transition.
- Promote green jobs with the aim of contributing to greener European cities.



InclusEU

The InclusEU project which aims to encourage volunteer action as a social response for an inclusive Europe will have the initial meeting in Valencia, Spain on March 9th, with Fingal scheduled to host international partners and host an event for young people in Balbriggan in August 2023. The delegation from Fingal will see the Healthy Fingal Coordinator, Sport Officer and a member of the Balbriggan Foroige team in attendance.

SUSTAINABLE FINGAL



The Council continues to work with SEAI Energy Academy to encourage businesses to apply for the Support Scheme for Energy Audits (SSEA) to access a €2,000 voucher towards the cost of a high-quality energy audit to help reduce energy bills. DUBLIN BELFAST ECONOMIC CORRIDOR

Fingal County Council has been awarded €150,000 by the Department of Housing, Local Government & Heritage under the Shared Island Local Authority Development Funding Scheme for a Feasibility Study for the development of regional innovation/enterprise hubs along the Dublin Belfast Economic Corridor. The Council is leading on the project with the support of the eight local authorities and two universities of the DBEC partnership. Tender submissions for consultants to carry out the feasibility study have been evaluated and a preferred tenderer identified. The Council will commence work on the feasibility appointment of study following the consultants in March.

LOCAL AND RURAL DEVELOPMENT



FINGAL LOCAL COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE

The Fingal LCDC continues to oversee and administer the key areas of LEADER and SICAP and the various Local Development and Community Development funding programmes under its remit. The LCDC also manages the Healthy Ireland Initiative and the Social Enterprise Grants Scheme.

The last Meeting of the Fingal LCDC was held in February.



FINGAL LOCAL ECONOMIC COMMUNITY PLAN 2022 – 2027

Consultation on the new Fingal LECP and engagement with internal and external stakeholders is planned to commence in Q2 2023. A tender competition is in progress to engage consultants to assist with the preparation of the socio-economic profile of the county, drafting the high-level objectives, facilitating the consultation

process and drafting the LECP and initial 2-year Implementation Plan.

COMMUNITY SUPPORT FUND

The Community Support Fund (CSF) was launched in January 2023 and is funded by the Department of Rural and Community Development. Fingal has been allocated €341,875 in funding for groups across the county. More 270 applications were received from community and voluntary groups in Fingal for the current and capital funding streams by the submission deadline of 10th February 2023. The evaluation of the applications is underway and groups will be notified of allocations shortly.

COMMUNITY RECOGNITION FUND

The Community Recognition Fund (CRF) was launched in January 2023 and is funded by the Department Rural Community of and Development. Fingal has been allocated €1,813,912 with project proposals to be submitted by the Local Authority for communities hosting high numbers of Beneficiaries of Temporary Protection and/or International Protection Applicants by the 15th March 2023. 60% of the funding must be drawn down in 2023 and 40% in 2024, with all projects required to be complete by 18th October 2024. The Fund is being administered by Fingal LCDC and consultation has been carried out with the LCDC, Local Response Forum and relevant stakeholders.

SICAP

The resources and staff of the Fingal SICAP Programme continue to be leveraged to assist with the Ukrainian Refugee Crisis response. The SICAP Programme continues to help in the response to this crisis and is a central resource to the work of the Ukrainian Refugee Community Response Forum. Additional funding has been received from the DRCD to help with the delivery of services to Ukrainian Refugees in Fingal and additional staffing resources from the Ukrainian community have been employed on the ground to assist with this. Confirmation was received during December that the Fingal SICAP Programme has been allocated €304,369 in 2023 specifically for Fingal's Ukrainian Refugee Response. The SICAP 2022 end of year review and the 2023 SICAP Plan and 2023 Case Study were approved at February's LCDC Meeting.







LEADER PROGRAMME

In December, the Dublin Rural LEADER Local Action Group (LAG) approved in full the allocated LEADER 2021-22 Transition Programme for eligible projects in the administrative areas of Fingal, Dun Laoghaire Rathdown and South Dublin.

On 26th January Minister for Rural and Community Development, Heather Humphreys, announced details of the applicant groups who were successful under Stage 1 of the 2023-2027 LEADER programme, Fingal LCDC was successful to run the next LEADER Programme for the Dublin Rural LEADER LAG.

The Dublin Rural LEADER LAG is moving to Stage 2 and commencing work on drafting the new Leader Development Strategy with an initial consultation workshop is scheduled for March.

Woodlands for Health

Healthy Fingal have partnered with Mental Health Ireland and the Sports Office to organise the Woodlands for Health walks. The programme will see the HSE mental health services in Swords & Balbriggan avail of the opportunity to introduce service users to walking in Ardgillan while availing of mental health expertise in the calming and quiet atmosphere of the walking paths around the demesne. The walks are referral only and start on March 24th and will take place weekly over a 10-week period.



ENTERPRISE CENTRES

Fingal's Enterprise Centres continue to participate in ConnectedHubs.ie.

ConnectedHubs.ie is a one-stop-shop for remote working hubs throughout Ireland.



All three Enterprise Centres currently have space available to start-up businesses and businesses/ individuals who wish to avail of remote working options and facilities. Bespoke options or generic office fitouts can be considered.

Occupancy rates at the Council's three enterprise centres are all over 90%. The three Enterprise Centres currently support 65 businesses and over 320 direct jobs.



Demand for the new Remote Working Hubs in BASE and Beat remain strong particularly after running two Connected Free Voucher Scheme during August and December 2022.

Fingal County Council was approved for €50,000 in new funding to promote Remote Working Hubs in the County under the Town and Village Renewal Scheme Marketing Measure. A cross-departmental team within the Council is implementing initiatives to promote Fingal as a Remote Working Hub base for remote workers.

OUR BALBRIGGAN 2019 - 2025 REJUVENATION PLAN - A SOCIO-ECONOMIC STRATEGY



The Our Balbriggan Programme Office continues to support the Leadership Group and its five pillars, who meet regularly, to progress work across a range of economic and social measures including: Growing the Local Economy, Public Realm & Infrastructure, Education, Skills & Employment, Community Integration, Health & Well Being and Community Safety.

The Balbriggan Leadership group will meet next on March 22^{nd.} The Education, Skills & Training Pillar which met on the 9th February, are organising the third edition of the Loves Learning Skills Festival on the last week of March. Led by the DDLETB it includes a wide range of stakeholders including schools, community groups, education services and business. The next Balbriggan Leadership Group Meeting is scheduled to take place in late March and will receive updates from all five pillar chairs.





The Quay Street & Environs scheme is in final detailed design phase with works anticipated to commence Q1. 2024 and be completed on a phased based in 2025. Irish Water on-site 1st September – 31st December 2023, pumping station upgrade. Car parking resurfacing (Bath Road/Balbriggan FC & Bremore Castle) progressing.

Site investigations to the rear of the group of derelict buildings on Bridge Street, known locally as De Bruns have concluded. Additional security measures were put in place in advance of phase 1 of development in line with the town plan which will include a new park space in the 'Heart' of the town. The green space will follow the River Bracken, through Millpond Park to the rear with entrance onto Bridge Street, flowing down to a transformed Quay Street and Harbour.



Public Realm Strategy



A comprehensive Balbriggan Public Realm Strategy - Masterplan & Design Guide and Balbriggan Active Travel & Transportation plan is nearing completion and both are expected to be published Q2 2023. Donnelly Civil Engineering Ltd and MWP Engineering will commence a package of improvement works at Balbriggan Harbour w/c 20th March.



The Our Balbriggan Office continues to generate regular and unique content across all social media (SM) channels, Facebook (FB), Twitter, Instagram, LinkedIn.

TOWN CENTRE FIRST - LUSK

A structure for the new Lusk Town Team has been agreed. Together with the Town Team there will be three Pillar Groups representing the Community, Business and Economy and Public Realm / Climate Action & Sustainability (to include Vacant & Derelict Buildings). The first meeting of the new Town Team will be held shortly.

TOWN AND VILLAGE RENEWAL SCHEME 2022

The Council was recently approved for funding from the Department of Rural and Community Development of €100,000 for the Rush Streetscape Scheme and €36,000 for a new Donabate Streetscape Scheme with work progressing on the implementation of these schemes. Residents, businesses and community groups in Rush were asked to submit expressions of interest for various grants for enhancement measures such as painting, shopfront repair, signage lighting and The maximum amount of funding available to each property is €10,000 overall and following a review 30 properties in Rush have been approved by the Department of Rural and Community Development and will be availing of funding from the scheme. The Council has informed all successful applicants and is working with them in delivering the scheme.

OUTDOOR RECREATIONAL INFRASTRUCTURE SCHEME (ORIS)



The Department of Rural & Community Development under the Outdoor Recreational Infrastructure Scheme (ORIS) is providing funding of €23,400 for the development of the Castleknock Historical Walking Trail. ORIS is also providing funding of €28,800 for enhancements to the Balbriggan Historical Walking Trail. Consultation on both projects has commenced with local groups. A new ORIS Scheme is expected to be announced shortly by the Department of Rural and Community Development.



LEO Fingal provides a broad suite of support services to stimulate enterprise and enable small businesses to succeed. Some of the LEO highlights for February 2023 are as follows:

LOCAL ENTERPRISE WEEK 2023



Local Enterprise Week is launched and ready to go on 6th – 10th March 2023 with a host of learning and networking events. The week will be kicked off with a Start Your Own Business Bootcamp in the Crowne Plaza Hotel, Blanchardstown followed by a Networking event in the Bracken Court Hotel in Balbriggan. There is the Fingal Enterprise Awards in County Hall, Swords, a Social Media event in Sutton as well as many other events both inperson and online throughout the week.

FINGAL ENTERPRISE AWARDS 2023

Local Enterprise Office Fingal have announced the finalists for the upcoming Fingal Enterprise Awards. The Awards ceremony, which takes place on Tuesday, March 7th, 2023 in County Hall, Swords. recognises and showcases the achievements of local businesses. The seven businesses shortlisted for the awards are; Cream of the Crop (Finalist - Giselle Goncalves Makinde, Dublin 15), Culinary Microherbs (Finalist - Carol Lopez and Paul Curry, Dublin 11), Lynott Jewellery (Finalist - Lauren McDonald, Kinsealy), Milkbath (Finalists - Sandra and Derek Hickey, Lusk), Platform55 (Finalist - Michelle O'Keefe, Malahide), Prints of Ireland (Finalists - Heather Gilroy and Peter O'Neill, Balbriggan) and The Little Wax Company (Finalists - Marc and Amy Herbert, Balbriggan). Finalists are chosen based on performance against several key business strengths, including financial, marketing and planning skills. They also pitch their business to a panel of judges with vast business and entrepreneurship experience. The hopeful finalists will compete for a top prize of €5,000, with each business also receiving €1000 to invest in their business. The overall winner will represent Fingal in the National Enterprise Awards to be held in the Mansion House in June 2023.

START YOUR OWN BUSINESS COURSE - UKRAINE



The Start Your Own Business Course for Ukrainian Nationals completed on 9th February with the participants receiving their certificates of completion. There were over 80 participants in the programme which was run in conjunction with the Irish Red Cross and the Fingal Ukrainian Response Team. Feedback from participants has been positive and upbeat.

FINGAL BUSINESS BRIEFING



Fingal Business Briefings will be ongoing throughout 2023 with the next briefing being held on Thursday March 9th as part of Local Enterprise Week. Information is shared with small business owner managers about supports available to them with Q&A & 1-1 follow ups also available on the day.

LEO FINGAL 2023 TRAINING SCHEDULE



Training continues to be provided at LEO Fingal with a wide range of training and networking events planned over Local Enterprise Week and

beyond. Demand for courses continues to be strong. LEO Fingal's schedule of courses includes the flagship Start your own Business course and Digital Marketing & Social Media training. The training programme is one of the key services provided by LEO Fingal and consistently receives positive feedback from attendees. A new Leadership Development programme will be launched, aimed at owner managers to increase their skill levels in Leadership, Sales and other business disciplines with expressions of interest open to small business owners on the LEO Fingal Website.

TRADING ONLINE VOUCHER SCHEME



An initiative under the Government's National Digital Strategy, the TOV (Trading Online Voucher) scheme supports small businesses by allowing them to enhance their online offering by providing a grant of up to €2,500 for ecommerce and digital marketing activities. So far in 2023 13 applications have already been approved in the amount of €29,014 showing that there is still strong interest in E-trading with applications and approvals running at nearly double pre-covid years. The next Trading Online Voucher seminar is a National Spotlight event and will be held online closing out Local Enterprise Week on Friday 10th March from 2 to 5pm.

FINGAL ENTERPRISING WOMEN NETWORK



The Fingal Enterprising Women Network (FEWN) is continuing to welcome new members in 2023. As part of Local Enterprise Week 2023, FEWN will host a special event on the 10th of March 2023 entitled "Challenging your own relationship with FEAR & ACTION" which will feature guest speaker Sonya Lennon. The event will take place in the Carlton Hotel Dublin Airport.

EVALUATIONS AND APPROVALS COMMITTEE

The first Evaluation and Approvals Committee (EVAC) meeting for 2023 was held on Wednesday 15th February. There were 6 applications approved to the value of €93,750 across Business Feasibility, Priming & Expansion grants.

BUSINESS ADVICE CLINICS AND MENTORING

Business Advice Clinics and mentoring services continue to be offered online and now have an option for clients to meet in person in the Business Advice Clinic based in County Hall, Swords. In addition, clients are continuing to receive one to one business mentoring with our panel of mentors. To date 18 clinic days were held in 2023, offering advice and support to 101 clients in Fingal. The Mentoring Programme continues with a total of 49 clients receiving one-to-one mentoring YTD.

MICROFINANCE IRELAND LOANS

LEO Fingal provides a loan scheme through its partnership with Microfinance Ireland, with "soft" loans of up to €25,000 per approved applicant. LEO Fingal is actively promoting the availability of loans from businesses that have difficulty raising finance from their bank. Applications are processed and assessed by LEO Fingal and submitted to MFI (Microfinance Ireland) In 2023 LEO Fingal will continue to assist clients with their applications to enable them to raise much needed capital. Applications submitted through LEO Fingal get a reduced interest rate of 4.5% APR

STUDENT ENTERPRISE PROGRAMME



The 2022/23 Fingal Student Enterprise Programme is well underway with 26 Second level schools across Fingal participating in this year's programme. The savvy students will develop their own actual businesses, researching, resourcing, trading services and products, with the guidance of business mentors. Fingal LEO boasts the largest enterprise programme prize fund for second level students in the country with prizes including an international educational trip to a European City for the senior category winning student and teachers. Final preparations are underway for the Fingal County Final will take on Wednesday 15th March 2023 in the Crowne Plaza Blanchardstown.

UKRAINE ENTERPRISE CRISIS SCHEME



Assistance for business energy costs is being awarded to qualifying businesses affected by the increase in input costs or supply chain issues in relation to the Ukraine war. Clients are being advised to speak to the Local Enterprise Office to assess eligibility and to apply.

Works are ongoing to deliver the Programme of Works across all three areas. Programme of Works 2023 for all 3 areas have been approved by the Area Committee and works will now begin.





Street Lighting LED Programme

Additional 180,000 2023 funding for specific public lighting projects to light up necessary walkways and connections to schools and buses will be assessed on a case-by-case basis.


Licences


- Road Opening Licences

The Licensing unit continues to process and manage the licensing system for the County, applications are allocated by area for examination and conditioning which includes reviews of the existing carriageway, footpaths, cycleways, and grass verges. Applicants submit temporary traffic management plans for review to ensure all works are carried out safely within the public domain. Road Opening Licences are a cross functional process for the department and are essential for the asset management of Fingal County Council Road network.

226 Licences were granted in the month of February with on average, 54% of the licences granted by way of automation. Clerk of Works in each area continue to carryout regular inspections following road opening works by utilities.







Casual Trading License

The Castleknock/Mulhuddart Operations Department are currently in the process of renewing Casual Trading applications for 2023. The licences are valid from 01 March 2023 to 29 February 2024.

There has been significant interest to date in a variety of pitches for coffee, ice-cream, hot food, and flowers at burial grounds and applications are being processed accordingly.

- Street Furniture

Street Furniture renewals took place in January with strong interest from many businesses.

Fees were reintroduced for 2023 following their waiver throughout Covid 19.

Inspections continue to be carried out by our enforcement officer on a regular basis to ensure compliance.

Water Services

- Stormwater Capital Programme 2023-2025

Fingal County Council are continuing to progress projects recently adopted in the 2023-2025 Stormwater Capital Programme. The 3-year programme includes 14 projects valued at approximately €3.63 Million. Below is a brief update in relation to the current status of some of the projects that have commenced and planned upcoming projects.

- Howth Stormwater Culvert:

The tender for the CCTV and Flow and Monitoring survey element of the Howth Stormwater Culvert Project is now complete with the contract due to be awarded to the winning bidder in the next few days. The CCTV and Flow Monitoring survey will confirm the current condition and capacity of the existing stormwater sewer enabling the project team to consider preliminary designs.

- Wendell Avenue/Heather Walk:

Stormwater sewer rehabilitation works are continuing to progress well at Heather Walk in Portmarnock. Significant progress has been made in upgrading the existing stormwater network serving Wendell Avenue & Dewberry Park in Portmarnock. Due to multiple collapses and blockages a section of new network and new manholes are being constructed which when completed will return the existing network to full capacity. Additional gullies were added to Wendell Avenue & Dewberry Park.

This will improve the overall drainage efficiency of Wendell Avenue and increase the half-life of the road surface.

Burrow Beach

Scott Cawley Consultants working in Partnership with Brady Shipman Martin signed off on the required Appropriate Assessment Screening Report for the Burrow Beach Project and finding that the Burrow Beach proposed works have been screened out enabling Fingal County Council to progress to the next stage of the project.

The Council will continue to work to implement Government policy in regard to water.

Framework for future of Water Services

A new framework for the future of water services developed through an engagement process facilitated by the Workplace Relations Commission was announced by the Minister on 24th June 2022. The Council is awaiting signoff of the new ÚISCE ÉIREANN /Local Authority Master Co-operation agreement which will replace the existing Service Level Agreement arrangements. The Council are working with ÚÉ in preparation for the Effective Date when ÚÉ will assume full responsibility for the delivery of all public water services in Ireland. Fingal County Council is scheduled within the first tranche of local authorities to transfer.



Planning Applications

There have been 64 planning applications received to the end of January 2023. 13 of these applications were invalid leaving a total of 51 valid applications. The volume of applications received by Local Electoral Area (LEA) is detailed in the table below. From January 1st to 31st 2023, 0 Large-scale Residential Development (LRD) applications were made to the Local Authority. 3 decisions were made up to end of January 2023. Of these, 3 applications were Granted (1,257 units).

There are a total of 20 SHD applications (13,038 units) currently in the formal application process with An Bord Pleanála. The Bord have not issued any decisions on SHD applications to the end of January 2023.



Planning Decisions

A total of 1210 planning decisions have been made to the end of December 2022. There have been 993 decisions to grant permission (82%) and 217 refusals of permission (18%). There have been 82 grants of permissions in respect of single house construction, 576 grants of permission for domestic extensions, 281 commercial/retail grants of permission and 25 grants of permission in respect of housing developments of which 13 relate to development of 2 - 20, 4 relates to 20 - 50 and 2 relate to 50 -100 and 6 which relates to 100+. A total of 106 planning decisions have been made to the end of January 2023. There have been 89 decisions to grant permission (84%) and 17 refusals of permission (16%). There have been 12 grants of permissions in respect of single house construction, 39 grants of permission for domestic extensions, 20 commercial/retail grants of permission and 7 grants of permission in respect of housing developments of which 4 relate to development of 2 - 20 units, 0 relates to 20 - 50 units, 0 relate to 50 -100 units and 3 which relate to development of 100+ Units.

Building Control Admin:


In January 2023, there were 119 Building Control submissions made via the BCMS.

This was made up of 50 Commencement notices, 32 Compliance of Completion Certificates, 24 Fire Safety related Certificates and 13 Disability Access related Certificates.

Commencement notices and Compliance on Completion Certificates are submitted through the Projects module on BCMS. Fire Safety, Disability Access, Regularisation and Dispensation/Relaxation Certificate applications

can be submitted online via the Applications module on BCMS and we are also still accepting hard copy applications directly into the office. Most applications are now being submitted via the online system.

The Building Control Admin team processed 97 decisions in January 2023 relating to Fire Safety and Disability Access Certificates. This was made up of 21 decisions to grant and 76 extensions of time.




Strategic Policy Unit

Draft Fingal Development Plan 2023 - 2029

The Fingal Development Plan was adopted on 22nd February 2023. The new Plan will come into effect on 5th April 2023.

The adoption of the Plan marks the end of the 99-week process which included three rounds of public consultation, numerous webinars, meetings and over 2,600 submissions.

The Development Plan sets out the framework to guide future development within Fingal with the focus placed on the places we live, the places we work, and how we interact and move between these places while protecting our environment. The aim is to progress to a more sustainable development pattern for Fingal County Council in the immediate and long-term future.



Sustainable Swords

The Sustainable Swords Strategy was agreed by the Members at the December meeting. this follows extensive consultation and engagement with the local community. The Strategy outlines 16 possible projects which would transform Swords. The agreed Strategy and all other supporting documents can be found here:

Residential Zoned Land Tax

The Government's 'Housing For All – A New Housing Plan for Ireland 'proposed a new tax to activate vacant land for residential purposes as a part of the Pathway to Increasing New Housing Supply.

The Residential Zoned Land Tax was introduced in the Finance Act 2021. The process to identify land to which the tax applies is now underway and the tax will be payable from 2024.

The objective of the tax is to activate land that is serviced and zoned for residential use or mixed use, including residential use, in order to increase housing supply and to ensure regeneration of vacant and idle lands in urban locations. These locations have been identified within statutory land use plans as being appropriate locations for housing and they have benefitted from investment in the key services to support the delivery of housing.

Fingal County Council has prepared a draft map of the land considered to be in scope for the RZLT as of October 1, 2022.



A supplemental map will be published on 1 May 2023 identifying additional land considered to be in scope as a result of a change of zoning, servicing or where the local authority becomes aware of the fact that land, which didn't appear on the draft map, may meet the criteria for being in scope, such as where this has been identified during submissions. The supplemental map will also be on public display and open to submissions which may challenge the inclusion of additional land on the map.

Built Environment Division

A new document "Nature-based Solutions to the Management of Rainwater and Surface Water Runoff in Urban Areas - Water Sensitive Urban Design - Best Practice Interim Guidance Document" has been issued by the Department of

Housing, Local Government and Heritage. It is intended as a high-level best practice interim guidance document for all those whose work impacts on the urban environment, for urban planners and all built environment professionals involved in the planning process such as engineers, architects and landscape architects and shows how to move towards a more systematic and sustainable approach to urban planning and design that seeks to mimic the natural water balance of rural areas through "water sensitive urban design".



Sustainable Drainage System (SuDS) – The Fingal SuDS guidance document (Green/Blue Infrastructure for Development) has been reviewed to include changes in technical standards. This document along with the Draft SFRA documents have been incorporated into the new development plan.



Incorporating Sustainable Drainage Systems in Residential Developments



The GDSDS has outlined SuDS as a sustainable way to manage surface water as we prepare to meet the challenges of climate change. This example of Millers Glen in Swords, shows an example of surface water being held onsite, providing treatment via appropriate planting, and then discharging at greenfield runoff rate. This is a move away from the traditional method of collecting all surface water via piped systems which can often no longer manage the intense rainfall`s being experienced.

Multi-Party Framework Agreement for the preparation of Surface Water Management Plans (SWMP)

The procurement process has begun for the new Multi-Party Framework Agreement for the preparation of Surface Water Management Plans (SWMP) for the new County Development Plan. The SAQ for the above framework was posted on eTenders with a closing date for tender submissions set for 30/09/2023. The tenders were assessed and a recommendation for progression to the next phase has taken place.

<u>Building Control/Taking in Charge Section</u> Building Control

- There were 21 Building control site inspections in February 2023 with 42 separate buildings being inspected.
- There were no enforcement notices issued in February but there were 4 Section 11 requests for further information issued following site visits.

- Taking in Charge
- There are 3 developments Limetree Avenue and Carrick Court Close due to be taken in charge in the April 2023 Council Meeting. A further 3 developments namely Miller Glen phase 4, Silverbanks, Baldoyle and Balgriffin Grove in Malahide have been advertised for Taking in Charge in the May 2023 Council Meeting.

Transportation Planning Church Fields Link Road

The Powerstown Road Safe Routes to School element of the Project is nearing completion, this will deliver high quality two-way off carriageway cycle track and pedestrian facilities along with upgraded controlled crossings. The Phase 1 of the link road and 'Dutch Style' cycle friendly roundabout are nearing sectional completion, the contractor is installing the new trees into the bioretention areas which form part of the SuDs strategy for the project. The contractor has also provided upgraded ESB ducting infrastructure to facilitate the diversion of the current overhead line and assist in the delivery of housing in the adjacent Church Fields Masterplan lands.





Broadmeadow Way Greenway

The project team have been working closely with property section and our legal team to secure a licence agreement which permits access to a landlocked section of the project route. A contractor has now been appointed to install a 1.2km access track to the northern shore of Malahide Estuary, this will facilitate access for a contractor to undertake ground investigation

works on the estuary causeway the outcome which will be used to inform the design of the causeway section of the greenway.





S2M Pedestrian and Cycle Scheme



The project team from the Planning & Strategic Infrastructure Dept has recently completed its preliminary cost estimate for the scheme. The total cost estimate of €45m has received NTA Board Approval and the project will now proceed toward finalising the preliminary design. The project team is currently finishing its review of public consultation submissions and discussions at

the successful drop-in information evening and webinars in 2022. A Public Consultation Report will be published online outlining the results of the consultation in March. This process has helped the team to identify areas of concern for review or potential change and this design review process is underway while the Public Consultation Report is being finalised. Following this review process documents will be prepared for a planning application to An Bord Pleanála. The application is expected to be made in late 2023 and is likely to take the form of an Appropriate Assessment, Environmental Impact Assessment Report.

Donabate Pedestrian and Cycle Bridge

The process to approve placing the Donabate Pedestrian Bridge into service above the Dublin to Belfast Railway Line is nearing completion. A design submission containing necessary technical and safety-related information is currently being assessed by the Board of Irish Rail as part of the approval process. Once Irish Rail approval is in place, the bridge design will be submitted to the Commission for Railway Regulation for final approval. Consultations with the developers of the lands on either side of the pedestrian bridge are at an advanced stage and the necessary legal agreements to allow access for Fingal County Council's works contractor through these development lands are expected to be finalised and agreed shortly.

A consultant has been appointed to provide site supervision and contract administration services for the construction stage of the project. A works contractor will be appointed once final approval is granted by the Commission for Railway Regulation. Once all third party approvals are in place, construction of the bridge can commence.

R132 Connectivity Project

Following Statutory Planning approval for the R132 Connectivity Project. A tender brief was prepared, and a tender FCC/318/22 was issued for Consultancy Services with a multidisciplinary design team for the remainder of the project lifecycle to Detailed Design and Procurement, Construction and Implementation and Close-out and Review. The evaluation assessment of the tender submissions is nearly now completed, and it's envisaged a consultant will be appointed in late

March. Once a consultant is appointed the project will then be progressed at Detailed Design stage.

Kinsealy Walking & Cycling Routes

A tender was issued FCC/325/22 Stage 1 for the Establishment of a Single Party Framework for Civil & Structural Engineering Consultancy & Associated Services - Initial Contract for Kinsealy Walking & Cycling Routes. The evaluation assessment of the tender submissions is nearly now completed, and this will allow the procurement process to progress to Stage 2 in March.

Harry Reynolds Road Pedestrian and Cyclist Route A tender FCC/164/20 Stage 2 was issued in early January for the Construction Phase of the Harry Reynolds Road, Pedestrian and Cyclist Route which recently closed for submissions. The evaluation assessment of the of the tender submissions is programmed to be undertaken in March to progress the procurement process to the construction stage of the project.

Snugborough Interchange Upgrade

Snugborough Interchange Upgrade Project Construction works are continuing during Q1. Much of the current work involves diversion of utilities in to newly constructed infrastructure. These include telecommunications and electricity. When many of these major utility diversions have been advanced new areas of work will open. There will be local safe diversions for pedestrians around the works and these will be signed. The current projected completion time for the project is Q3 this year. It is intended that the inbound N3 bus lane will reopen at the end of Q1.

The website <u>www.snugboroughinterchange.ie</u> containing information on the project will continue to be updated with information relating to the project.



Ongar Barnhill Road

An advance site clearance contract was carried out early in Q1 in advance of the nesting season. Fencing is being installed currently along the land to be part of the Barberstown lane south upgrade. Tenders for stage 1 of a restricted procedure for the main contract are currently being assessed. It is intended that the tender process for stage 2 will be during early Q2 and that a contractor will be appointed during Summer. The project will take almost 2 years to construct.



Royal Canal / Grand Canal Loop Greenway

Fingal County Council are entering into an agreement with South Dublin CC to advance a route options and river crossing design for a greenway between the Royal and Grand canals. A designer will be appointed and managed by SDCC on behalf of FCC. A briefing for the area members is currently being organised and it is intended that the route options for a river crossing and link to the Royal Canal will be ready for a public engagement in a few months' time.

Heritage Officer



The Fingal Thatch Project 2022 was launched on the 16 February by Fingal Mayor, Cllr. Howard Mahony in the Casino Model Railway Museum, Malahide, a beautifully restored thatched building which is of significant historical importance to Fingal's thatch heritage.



Social Housing Development for Older Persons in Lusk

On Friday 10th of February, Mayor of Fingal, Cllr. Howard Mahony welcomed Minister for Housing, Local Government and Heritage, Darragh O'Brien to Lusk for the official sod turning of Kilhedge Lane, a new social housing development being delivered by Tuath Housing in partnership with Fingal County Council.

Kilhedge Lane in Lusk is a sheltered housing scheme that will provide 31 new single-story homes for older persons and is due for delivery in 2024. The development – which will be built on land owned by Fingal County Council – will consist of 18 two-bed homes and 13 one-beds with an additional communal facility area for residents. The new homes are being funded by the Department of Housing, Local Government & Heritage via the Capital Assistance Scheme. The 31 new residents will come from the Fingal County Council housing list.



Affordable Housing Development at Hayestown, Rush

On Friday 3rd March, Mayor of Fingal, Cllr. Howard Mahony welcomed Minister for Housing, Local Government and Heritage, Darragh O'Brien to Rush for the official sod turning of the new affordable housing development at Hayestown in Rush. The development will consist of 62 new 2 and 3-bedroom homes, with 52 of the homes being made available to eligible purchasers in line with affordable purchase regulations and the Council's scheme of priorities. Details of the application process to submit an interest in purchasing the affordable homes will be available in the coming months. The remaining 10 homes in the scheme will be made available to people on the Council's social housing list.





The circular announces the publication of new regulations - Housing Loans (Amendment) Regulations 2023 (S.I. 76 of 2023), a new credit policy, and new guidelines for Local Authorities. The main differences are:

- Borrowers can apply for a max loan of €324,000
- The Loan can be used to purchase a property of a new max value of €360,000
- Single borrowers can earn up to €70,000 to qualify for the loan, couples can earn up to €85,000

The Loan application process in Fingal will be augmented by the introduction of an online application portal. This month Fingal County Council will introduce the portal to streamline the process and ensure applicants have all their documents in one place before submitting them. This will be explained to the applicants when they first contact the loans team, and help will be provided to all applicants to ensure that this is efficient and speeds up the process. An online video tutorial has been developed to support this. The portal will remove the need to produce paper copies of the application form and the supporting documents, reduce postal delays and speed up the process.

Housing Asset Management Report Energy Efficiency/Retrofitting Programme

Ninety-two properties were retrofitted under the highly successful 2022 programme, exceeding the DHLGH-set target of 81 for 2022 and which followed a pilot energy retrofit programme in 2021. Starting off in Jugback Estate, Swords, the project then moved to St. Paul's Balbriggan, Lissenhall in Swords and Whitechapel Clonsilla, where extensive works were carried out including electrical upgrades, attic insulation, installation of triple glazed windows and doors along with PV panels where required to reach a B2/Cost optimal standard

The 2023 programme will see further growth and expansion of this project throughout the Fingal region. Works have commenced in Strandmill Road, Portmarnock and will shortly commence in Barnewall, Donabate. St. Catherine's Close, Rush and Whitestown Gardens, Blanchardstown are currently at survey stage.

Fingal County Council and the SEAI have entered into a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) to explore the possibility of undertaking pilot projects to test a partnership approach to upgrading privately-owned homes funded by SEAI government grants in existing local authority estates where Fingal County Council are undertaking works funded by the DHLGH.

Planned Maintenance Programmes Cyclical Maintenance - Scheme Painting

The Scheme Painting Programme provides for external painting and joinery repairs to Council housing stock and currently operates on a 6/7 year cycle. Works are currently reaching completion in Abbeylea Estate, Swords and will soon commence in St Cronan's Estate, Swords.

Housing Assistance Payment (HAP)

HAP continues to be the primary source of rent support for those in private rented accommodation. Fingal County Council has set up over 50 new tenancies in 2023 to date with approximately over 3,600 tenancies set up since HAP began in 2017.

The HAP team are on hand to deal with any queries from applicants and landlords in person at the Housing Department in the Fingal County Council Blanchardstown Office, by phone on 01 8905000 via the CCU or through email hap@fingal.ie.

Rents

The new rent review process continues with over 1200 accounts being assessed in this quarter. Tenants will be notified of their new rent charge which will remain in place for a two-year period.

A further 1000 tenants will receive Rent Assessment Forms for completion within the next month.

The Rent Arrears team are working methodically through accounts in substantial arrears to encourage tenants to engage with the Council in reducing their arrears. 15 Tenancies Warnings were issued in February to tenants in arrears. In cases where there is no engagement, despite repeated efforts, proceedings will progress through the legal arena and to date the Rents Section has secured one Possession Order with 4 others currently before the courts.

The Rents team encourage any tenant who is experiencing difficulty paying their rent to engage with the Council to examine possible solutions. However, there are instances where tenants do not engage or make alternative payment arrangements and, in those situations, the Council needs to take further action.

Housing Tenancy Services Report Housing Support

Housing Position

Following Completion of the Housing Needs Assessment on 29th November 2022, the current housing list position is in preparation for all applicants, with an expected issue date in early March.

This will be available through the CBL portal on fingal.ie shortly. Applicants who do not have access to this portal should contact Choicebasedlettings@fingal.ie to request their unique username and password. The most recent list position issued on 1st April 2022 is available in the portal currently.

Letters will issue to applicants, this year, in addition to the portal.

Changes to Income Eligibility Thresholds

In accordance with Circular 48/2022 and changes being implemented via the Social Housing Assessment (Amendment) (No. 3) Regulations 2022, the Social Housing Eligibility Bands will increase with effect from 1st January 2023.








Total allocations for 2022



The collaboration between Local Authorities and Approved Housing Bodies is continuing to have a positive impact on the delivery of social housing, we aim to minimise the length of time units are vacant. FCC continue to work under the Best Practice guidelines as per the Code of Practice with an aim to continually refine and make improvements to the allocation process.

18 units in Portmarnock, Co. Dublin and 26 units in Clonross, Dublin 15 are being delivered in March 2023. These properties are being managed by Cluid Housing Association. Cluid is an Approved Housing Body and service provider. Cluid Housing is a not-for profit charity providing over 10,000 affordable, high-quality homes to people in housing need.

So far in 2023, there have been 67 allocations of properties with AHBS, the majority of allocations have been sent to Tuath housing association. Tuath are managing a number of large schemes presently in the Fingal area, some of which include, Balbriggan, Swords, Blanchardstown and Santry.




The chart shows a comparison in the volume of nominations sent to AHB's on behalf of Fingal County Council housing applicants from January / February 2022 and January / February 2023. There has been a 54% increase in nominations to AHB's so far in 2023.

Homeless Services Homeless Exits 2023

During February 2023, 29 households exited homeless circumstances into various forms of social housing support - including into private rented tenancies under the Homeless HAP Scheme. Homeless HAP accounts for 15 of these tenancies, comprising 10 homeless prevention, four who exited from emergency accommodation and one from Direct Provision.

Separately there were 14 households that exited Homelessness into social tenancies.

In total 7 FCC households exited emergency accommodation during January 2023.




Homeless Presentations

Fingal's Homeless Team continue to engage with those experiencing homelessness to offer advice and support. Homeless Assessments continued to be carried out.

In February 2023 there were a total of 42 full homeless assessments completed – comprising **15** families and **27** singles/couples.

During February 2023, of the Homeless Assessments carried out, 10 cases resulted from a **Notice to Quit** (NTQ) having been served. **Renting a room** or licensee presenters are not covered by the Winter Eviction Ban 2023 and accounted for 7% of assessments during February 2023.

There are also a considerable number of people making contact stating that they are Homeless due to **family breakdown** (26%). Most of the other presentations to the Homeless Section are from living in **overcrowded conditions** (2%) and state that they cannot/will not return to the property. The remaining reasons are outlined on the chart below.



Emergency Accommodation (including Fingal County Council Family Hubs)

There continues to be an extremely high demand for Emergency Accommodation across the region for both families and individuals.

Rough Sleepers

The Homeless Services Team continue to liaise with the DRHE Outreach Team regarding any reports of rough sleeping, to establish their names and circumstances and to offer supports. Regrettably, some rough sleepers are reluctant to engage with service providers and may refuse offers to access emergency accommodation. Any rough sleeper who is willing to engage with the Outreach Team and/ or the Council or will be assisted.

The Council will carry out homeless assessments and every effort is made to encourage them to avail of homeless services.

Rough Sleepers Co-ordination Group

In January 2023, the Housing Department established a Rough Sleepers Co-ordination Group comprising senior staff from the Homeless Team and the Housing Inspectorate.

This Group meets weekly and the role will be to track any reports of rough sleepers and to continue to monitor reported locations of rough sleepers. The Group will also work in collaboration with our Operations Department as required.

Cold Weather Strategy 2022/ 2023

The Dublin Region Homeless Executive (DRHE) has activated its Cold Weather Strategy 2022/ 2023 which runs from November 2022 to the end of March 2023. This is to meet a likely increase in demand for homeless services and to have the appropriate contingency plan in place for cold weather conditions.

Should there be a cold weather or any emergency event, the DRHE will co-ordinate the response to homelessness on behalf of the four Dublin Local Authorities. Whilst services continue to operate throughout the year to support people experiencing homelessness, during the winter period, services are increased and enhanced to mitigate against the health risks that the bad weather poses.

Homeless Action Plan 2022- 2024

The DRHE, with the approval of all 4 local authorities in the Dublin region, has finalised the Homeless Action Plan Framework for Dublin 2022-2024. This Plan is the first plan to be put into operation since Ireland signed the Lisbon Declaration on combatting homelessness in June 2021, which aims to end homelessness by 2030. It will follow on from the previous Homeless Action Plan for 2019- 2021 and continues with the three key themes of **Prevention**, **Protection and Progression**.

The Plan was developed based on a detailed consultative process including submissions from various Stakeholders, interested organisations, Service Providers, Members of SPCs of the four Local Authorities, the Dublin Joint Homelessness Consultative Forum and the Statutory Management Group.

TRAVELLER ACCOMMODATION PROGRAMME Traveller Accommodation

A significant programme of works in relation to the refurbishment and upgrading of existing accommodation on Traveller specific sites is

currently ongoing in conjunction with staff from the County Architect's Department. These works are in accordance with the objectives set out in the Traveller Accommodation Programme 2019-2024.

Regular site visits by Housing Inspectors continues on all Fingal County Council Traveller specific sites while checking on vulnerable residents and advising on the continued supports available. Council Officials continue to liaise and engage with the Traveller Community, Traveller Advocacy Groups, Welfare Services, Child Services, Mental Health Services and other services and agencies to resolve issues when and where possible.



Housing Maintenance



Boiler Servicing Programme

The Council provides an annual heating servicing facility, including all maintenance and upgrade works, for a nominal fee of €3 per week to participating tenants. Contractors progress batches of work throughout the course of the year. The 2023 programme of work has commenced, with Contractors are working on the across the County in areas such as Corduff Estate, Blackmills, Lambeecher, Glasmore, Cardy Rock and Ballygarra.

Anti-Social Behaviour/Inspectorate Unit

The management and sustainment of social tenancies and good estate management falls within the remit of the ASB/Inspectorate Unit. Alleged breaches of Tenancy Agreements are investigated and pursued in accordance with housing legislation and policy.

There are occasions when the vulnerabilities. complexities and health related issues associated with a tenancy require tenancy sustainment and welfare intervention and supports. Ongoing case management and review with a variety of external agencies, including Approved Housing Bodies, An Garda Síochána, TUSLA and the HSE may be required to ensure all agencies collaboratively with a view to achieving best outcomes for our Communities. This work is ongoing in relation to a number of Tenancies in the county.





Housing Ukraine Response

Those Fleeing the Conflict in Ukraine

The Government is committed to delivering a humanitarian response to welcome people fleeing the conflict in Ukraine and seeking protection in Ireland.

The Council's Fingal Ukraine Response Forum continues to meet regularly to assist co-ordinate the response of the various statutory agencies and voluntary groups in the county to assist the Ukraine community.

Liam Rodgers Rest Centre

The centre was re-opened as temporary accommodation for displaced Ukrainians on the 2nd November 2022 to cater for increasing pressures on the accommodation situation in the country for displaced Ukrainians. The centre is presently operating at full capacity utilised for new arrivals to the country with various statutory

agencies linked with the centre to provide support to the new arrivals. Every effort is made to move the rest centre occupants to more permanent accommodation as soon as possible with a steady stream of moves to pledge accommodation. Supported by the Council and the Peter McVerry Trust (PMVT), **101** persons have moved from the rest centre to pledge accommodation across the county and country since the 2nd November 2022 with further moves to pledge accommodation to take place in the coming days.

Pledge Accommodation

A new national call for vacant unoccupied properties to accommodate Ukrainian displaced persons was launched on the 24th November 2022. In terms of the Fingal area, 12 properties have been pledged to date. **5** of these properties are occupied with another property due to be occupied in the coming days. 4 properties were withdrawn or deemed unsuitable following inspection with the remaining 3 subject to inspection and dialogue with the owners. The Council is also engaging with other property owners who have not formally pledged a property but have made an expression of interest. It should be noted that the monthly recognition payment is now €800 per month. It is expected that there will be a further national call for vacant properties shortly and an associated promotional campaign

Vacant Homes

The Council's Vacant Homes Action Plan was launched on the 9th December 2022.

The Vacant Homes Plan will help continue to bring vacant properties back into use as a cost-effective and sustainable way to increase the supply of housing to meet housing need. In doing so, the Council believes it can help improve neighbourhoods, increase access to housing and help to improve quality of life for those living in the towns, villages, rural and larger urban areas within the county. Work is underway at St Ita's Portrane to bring 14 dwellings back into use. 2 housing units are at the concluding stages of a CPO process that will make the units available for social housing

use with the CPO process to commence shortly with respect to **2** additional units. The Croi Connaithe Refurbishment grant scheme is also in utilisation to address vacancy and assist citizens get a home.



This is a national scheme administered by local authorities introduced under *Housing for All*. This scheme provides new choices for people to live in towns, villages and rural areas in Ireland through the provision of a grant to support the refurbishment of vacant properties subject to the application meeting the scheme criteria. *Note the scheme is expanded to cover all parts of the country (urban and rural). Accordingly, applications are now accepted with respect to all areas in Fingal.*

Subject to meeting eligibility criteria, a grant of up to a maximum of €30,000 is available for the refurbishment of vacant properties for occupation as a principal private residence, including the conversion of a property which has not previously been used as residential. Where the refurbishment costs are expected to exceed the standard grant of up to €30,000, a maximum top-up grant amount of up to €20,000 will be available where the vacant property is confirmed by the applicant to be derelict (i.e. structurally unsound and dangerous) bringing the potential total grant available for a derelict property up to a maximum of €50,000.

New applications and expressions of interest continue to be received at an increasing rate. To date, 18 applications have been received. 4 have been approved with works underway in these dwellings. In addition, staff are engaging with 31 other expressions of interest which will lead to further applications. An information campaign by

the DHLGH has recently concluded to raise more awareness of the scheme and to further promote the grant scheme. This has been supplemented by promotion of the scheme via the Council's social media and at the Council's stand at the Property Show held in the RDS on the 25th and 26th February 2023








Dublin 15 Stay and Play Toy Library

FACILITIES

Network Masterclass



Supported by the Community Facility Management Support Unit (CFMSU), the Fingal Community Facility Network held a Masterclass on Wednesday 22nd February in the Clayton Dublin Airport Hotel. In attendance were management personnel representing 27 community facilities. Speakers on the day were Niall Edwards from EMS Health and Safety who gave an overview of the health and safety landscape and some of the requirements of the centres, Chloe Farrell, representing the FCC Sports office, gave an overview of the programmes the Sports Office are planning to roll out across the community centre network and gave ideas for

collaboration between the FCC Sports Office and the centres. Rounding out the session, Donal Ryan from DR Accountants offered a comprehensive overview of the role of an auditor, and implementation of best financial practices that centres can adapt to ensure financial compliance. The CFMSU continues to work with the network to identify relevant training opportunities and speakers for our Network events.

Hartstown Community Centre

Following the transfer of ownership of Hartstown Community Centre from the Arch Diocese to the council, a planning application has been registered with Fingal CC for change of use and retention of childcare facility and other minor matters at the centre. Application has been validated (Reg. Ref. No.: FW23A/0021) and final date for the submission of observations is 14th March. Remedial works to address fire safety issues began on 23rd February 2023.

Interagency

The Community Development office actively seek to work in collaboration with agencies to maximise service delivery and resources to communities In February/March the CDO supported the delivery of the following:

Foroige

Foroige has thanked Fingal's community office for funding support to allow them to make the dream of a dedicated youth space in Tyrrelstown a reality. The space in question was previously a solicitor's office. The funding received from Fingal County Council has allowed them to install a kitchen, knock walls, install new flooring as well adding storage. Over the coming weeks/months they will continue to make it as youth friendly as possible.

Fingal PPN registration

There are currently 680 groups registered with the PPN with 13 new groups signing up for membership in 2023. 534 groups are registered under the Community Pillar, 113 are under the Social Inclusion Pillar and 33 are under the Environment Pillar.

PPN Policy Hub

The PPN website continues to be a trusted source of information for the community and is updated regularly with relevant information. The Fingal PPN Policy Hub may be accessed through the PPN website https://fingalppn.ie/. This policy hub aims to support and guide linkage groups and their reps in building capacity when engaging with relevant committees as well as assisting in contributing to the decision-making processes in Fingal. The Policy Hub comprises of policies in three areas: Fingal Wide Policies, Regional Policies and National & European Policies.

Integration

The Community Development Department work to provide leadership on the delivery of national and local directives that support the development of inclusive communities and civic engagement.

Fingal Winter Pride - LGBTQ+ 40th Anniversary History of Pride:

A talk by Dublin Pride on the history of LGBTQ+ rights over the 40th year period of Pride took place in Blanchardstown Library on Thursday, 2nd Feb @ 6.30pm. Following the presentation, refreshments were provided along with the chance to chat and obtain information on the services available.



Ukraine Supports



Fingal Ukrainian Information Network

A Fingal Ukrainian Information Network has been established by FCC Community Development Office to enable the timely sharing of information to and from the Ukrainian community and FCC. Included on this Network are representatives from prominent Ukrainian Volunteer Groups, Ukrainian women residents in temporary rest centre accommodation, in host accommodations, and Ukrainian women residents in Fingal for many years. The network meets monthly and provides support, insight, and resources directly to our Ukrainian community in Fingal. It also provides invaluable feedback for Fingal County Council which ensures that we continue to focus our Community Integration support on the areas which are most in need.

Art Therapy for Older Ukrainian Guests

A comprehensive programme for elderly Ukrainians in socio-psychological support, using art therapy commenced this month.

Art therapy is a method that gently maintains an optimal psycho-emotional level in a creative way. For elderly people, forced to move because of war, this method it is hoped will assist them to continue with their daily lives, processing their individual realities. This 10-week programme facilitates 10 older Ukrainian residents and is delivered as a direct response to needs voiced at the Fingal Ukrainian Information Network.

AGE FRIENDLY

Age Friendly Fingal is committed, to driving a collaborative, multi-sectoral approach which supports interventions that will significantly help to improve the quality of life of the current population of older people in Fingal and future generations.

DDLETB Swords hosts Fingal Older People's Council



Dublin and Dún Laoghaire Education & Training Board (DDLETB) Swords hosted the February meeting of Fingal's Older People's Council. The OPC were delighted with the invitation to use the facility.

DDLETB Swords are seeking recognition as an Age Friendly Business, and the OPC members provided valuable assistance by completing a walkability study of the premises on the day. The OPC's assessment and recommendations will contribute to the process of gaining recognition as an Age Friendly Business and any associated changes to the premises which this may entail. The OPC were particularly pleased with the meeting room as it met their needs, due to the space which allowed members to socially distance, the natural light and excellent acoustics.

Using the facilities was a great opportunity to collaborate and network. The OPC and DDLETB look forward to future collaborations.

Information Event for older people in Swords



The Sports Office supports and delivers programmes aimed at increasing participation in sport, targeting specific groups such as children, youth at risk, disadvantaged groups, teenage girls, women in sport, older adults and people with disabilities

Balbriggan Sports Hub

Fingal Sports Office identified a need for a new programme on Saturday mornings in Flemington Community Centre for children who may not have found their sport yet. The programme is targeting children aged 8-11 years who are currently taking part in the Fingal School sports programme and offering different sports and skills each Saturday to try out. The group are currently trying out Sports Con – an introduction to fundamental movements (jump, skip, throw, kick etc) and the group will also try out basketball, athletics and pickleball plus many more sports! The programme has been a great success 3 weeks in with over 30 children taking part each week and a waiting list of children looking to join!

Fingal Older Adult Aqua-Aerobics at the National Aquatic Centre

A new 10-week Older Adult Aqua-Aerobics programme has commenced in the National Aquatic Centre with seventy-eight participants registered to join. This programme is targeted at Older Adults in Dublin 15 who wish to improve their level of fitness. Due to the popularity of the programme the class is divided into two sessions, each one led by a trained instructor provided by the NAC. This water-based exercise is suited to this specific age group as it is gentle on participants' joints and improves aerobics fitness. The programme will continue into the summer months in response to the demand for places.

Women in Sport Week – 6th March to 12th March



This year's Women in Sport Week will be highlighting the International Women's day theme of "embracing equality" for Women in Sports. Fingal Sports Office along with National Sports Governing Bodies, Clubs and Schools will be hosting a series of events and courses throughout the week including collaborating with the Community Development Office on the "Shine a light" Event on International Women's Day by providing a fitness tutor for gentle exercise.

The events will be starting with the Olympic Handball Association facilitated workshops in Le Chéile Secondary School in Tyrrelstown for their female students to encourage them to try out a new sport.

Following on from the success of last year's online conversation sessions with Niamh Fahey and Diane Cauldwell, Swords native and member of the World Cup qualified Women's National Team will be the guest for an online Webinar with Fingal/FAI Development Officer, Sharon Boyle. The Fingal/FAI team will also be hosting an online Safeguarding Course and an in-person PDP 1 course for female coaches in the A.U.L complex on the 6th & 7th March respectively. Over that weekend the Cricket Development Officer will be hosting a training session for the Women's Cricket Squad in Castleknock highlighting excellence and achievement in the sport.

Our on-going Women in Sports programmes such as Socia Ball, an initiative to re-engage women in basketball using a recreation and non-competitive model and the teenage girls' Exercise: Energise Programme in fourteen secondary schools will continue for the week each designed to encourage women & girls to participate in physical activity in a fun and sociable environment.

Nutrition Roadshow Series

Fingal County Council Sports Office supported by Healthy Fingal launched the Nutrition Roadshow Series in February. Laura Kealy from Bridge Nutrition delivered 4 workshops on Sports Performance Nutrition. The events took place in 4 club venues throughout Fingal and the target audience comprised of those interested in quality nutrition for sports performance and good health. The series kicked off on 7th February Workshop 1 in Lusk AFC on 'Nutrition For Endurance Activities'. This was followed in week 2 by a workshop on Field-Sports Nutrition in Fingallians GAA. There was a great attendance at workshop 3 in Westmanstown RFC and this was followed by the last workshop in the series on 'Nutrition For the Young Athlete' on 27th February with plenty of tips for parents on quality nutrition for youths.

Throughout the series Laura gave some powerful insights into the fundamentals of fuel and hydration for sports performance as well as some practical tips for making drinks and healthy snacks. The workshops received great feedback from

attendees especially for the excellent videos and materials accompanying the series.

Protected Cycle Lanes

The Stage 3 Road Safety Audit has been completed by the Road Safety Consultant and works are ongoing to complete snag items. Small landscaping measures are planned to be introduced on Grange Road in the coming weeks.




Options report received and under review by Active Travel.

St. Cronan's Ave and Brackenstown Road Protected Cycle Lanes

As the project now enters the final stages the contractor is busy reinstating green spaces and opening back up areas that were cordoned off during the works. There is a big push on from the Active Travel project team to keep the pressure on the contractor to finish out the final elements of the scheme before Easter. Following a recent onsite meeting with our Parks Department, the contractor's landscape designer is finalising drawings and planting schedules to allow the landscape contractor to complete the planting up of unfinished areas. The other works to be finished out are the resurfacing of the cycle lanes and ESB Network connection to the new pedestrian crossings. We are awaiting availability of the

surfacing contractor and suitable weather conditions to finish out the surfacing and line marking.

Towns & Villages

Works are continuing in the development of an Active Travel Plan for a number of our Towns & Villages. Details are outlined below.

New St

Pre-planning application submitted to FCC Planning Department.

Balrothery Active Travel Plan

Following the lack of engagement by consultants in the tender process carried out in 2022, a new process has commenced to appoint consultants to carry out a study and draft proposals for an Active Travel Plan for Balrothery.

Skerries Active Travel Plan

Currently waiting on new NTA Framework to go live to progress a tender competition for the appointment of an Intergrated Design Team. This will be the second tender competition for an Integrated Design Team as the previous competition was unsuccessful. The new tender brief will allow the project team to take findings from the public consultations and research undertaken by the ESRI and include this as part of the brief. The ESRI are finalising research report and it is due to be published.

Connectivity/Permeability

We are continuing to receive various requests for Permeability and Connectivity improvements from various stakeholders across the county. These requests are being recorded in detail for evaluation through a multi criteria analysis. The projects are then reviewed across the departments to identify if an appropriate means of delivery can be established on the ground.

Where other projects being progressed in the area at either design or construction stage; we endeavour to include these Connectivity and Permeability improvements within those projects. Greenway connectivity support teams have been convened to review, design, and deliver active travel infrastructure that will enhance accessibility between the proposed strategic greenways and residential, educational, amenity and commercial zones. These support projects have been set up for Fingal Coastal Way, Broadmeadow Way/Sutton to Malahide Greenway and Royal Canal Greenway. This will help to optimise the use of the proposed greenway by both leisure and commuter users.

Access Constraints

Following on from circular (NGS Circular 4/22) and guidance from the NTA (Access Control of Active Travel Facilities) the Active Travel Unit has mapped

the access constraints (in particular kissing gates) within Fingal. We have put together a list of access constraints to be considered for removal and works proposed to improve for pedestrians, cyclists and disabled persons. This list is currently being reviewed by the various departments to ensure that the removal of these constraints provide a positive impact in these areas. On completion of the review Fingal County Council Active Travel in conjunction with Operations will be coordinating the removal of these access constraints across the county.

Secure Bicycle Parking Infrastructure

Our Contractor is gearing up to commence new bike parking infrastructure in the Howth & Malahide, Swords and Dublin 15 areas in Q1 of 2023. Locations are currently being agreed for expansion of virtual e-bike parking in public areas. Active Travel has taken delivery of six new bike repair stations and will be rolling out two stations in each of the electoral areas in the coming weeks.

Road Safety

Safe Routes to School

Round 1 - Tranche 1

The works contractor for the Safe Routes to School Tranche 1 contract is making great progress at each of the three school sites. Works to date have progressed well, with little or no disruption to the schools or traffic in each of the three areas. A brief update is provided below for each school site and associated construction works completed to date since the appointment of the works contractor.

1. Rush and Lusk Educate Together

The Contractor is now in the final stages of delivery for this school's project. All footpath repairs, junction upgrade works (Raheny Close), traffic calming ramps, bollard installation, new pedestrian crossing, road resurfacing works are now complete. The final outstanding works include the planting of the Rain Gardens and the line marking and signage installation which the contractor expects to have complete in the coming weeks.

Castaheany ETNS / St.Benedict's NS

Junction and resurfacing works have been completed at the front of school. Rain gardens on approach to the school have been constructed and filled in with soil. Planting of gardens will occur in the coming weeks. Minor works remaining on site are signage install, line marking and epoxy resin

application. Please note that some of the works are weather dependant.









3. Bayside Junior & Senior School

Junction tightening has been completed for all the junctions. Raised ramps and raised table surfacing works have been completed at the school site. Works have been completed on installing infrastructure for new raised crossing. Work is to commence on completing the remainder of rain gardens.









Round 1 - Tranche 2

Design is currently underway for the Tranche 2 schools (4 no.) with a view to progressing to construction later in the year.

Round 2

In mid-December An Taisce announced Round 2 of the Safer Routes to School programme, with the following Fingal schools selected:

- Holy Family Junior National School, Forest Fields, Swords
- Scoil Bhríde Buachaillí, Church Avenue, Blanchardstown
- Scoil Bhríde Cailíní, Church Avenue, Blanchardstown
- St Helen's SNS, Limetree Avenue, Portmarnock
- St. Colmcille's Girls' National School, Chapel Lane, Swords

The Active Travel team are working closely with An Taisce in relation to data collection and engagement with the schools to develop briefs to enable the tender process for designers and contractors to carry out the works.

Mobility & Behaviour Change St Patrick's Walking Bus - Skerries

We filmed a promotional video with our Communications Team to promote the benefits of Walking Buses for both Schools and Parents. We filmed with Students and Parents from the Skerries Walking Bus that serves St Patricks Junior and Senior National Schools. The Link to the video is HERE

Behaviour Change Programm

One to one Cycling Lessons - Adults



Climate Action

The Department of the Environment Climate and Communication is due to issue guidelines in respect of the content and preparation of Local Authority Climate Action Plans in early March 2023. This stems from a requirement in the Climate Action and Low Carbon Development (Amendment) Act 2021. All local authorities will be required to engage with this guidance in order to comply with the provisions of the Act.

As the four Dublin Local Authorities (DLA) already have Climate Change Action Plans (CCAPs) comprising adaptation and mitigation actions in place, it is the intention that existing plans will be varied and amended to align the existing CCAPs with the requirement of this new national guidance, and increased level of ambition stemming from the National Climate Action Plan 2023.

The Environment Climate Action and Active Travel Department is currently engaged with the DLA and the Climate Action Regional Office to plan for amending the existing CCAP's and will be engaging with the Climate Action Biodiversity and Environment SPC and the Council in due course.

Environmental Awareness

Green Schools Assessment visits have begun with over 30 Fingal schools going for the Green Schools Flags this year.

The Fingal County Council website has been updated for groups to download social media assets for local anti- litter campaigns.

Litter pickers were supplied to Rolestown N.S to help them tackle litter in the village and to the Laurel Lodge Environmental Group for the Castleknock area.

A waste prevention and gardening project was started at the Sophia Housing homeless service in Donabate. This involves implementing a waste segregation management system in the offices and residential units.

All-Ireland Pollinator signs were supplied to the Malahide allotments which are managed by the Epilepsy Care Foundation.

Musical Instruments were delivered to St. Fintans Senior High School in Sutton/ Baldoyle and to Sphere 17 Youth Service in Kilbarrack. The young people receive music lessons as part of the social program for crime prevention and community interaction.

Bottle Banks

Below is an Artwork that was completed by a local group at Corduff Community Centre to brighten up the area. Environment hope to do more artwork in this area and have reached out to Community Centres to avail of the anti-litter anti-graffiti grant

through our Environment Awareness Officer. Meanwhile the Environment Department have sent a list of sites to our contractor to commence the general painting and upkeep of the bring bank sites that were not painted last year.



Can Banks

In Fingal we have 40 can bank sites across our Bring Bank network. Glassco, our contractor collects from these sites, cleans the steel and aluminium, cuts them into pieces and bales them into cubes. The are then sent to be remelted back into aluminium sheets to be totally reused again which is a perfect example of the Circular Economy.

Aluminium is an infinitely recyclable material, and it takes up to 95 percent less energy to recycle it than to produce primary aluminium, which also limits emissions, including greenhouse gases. Today, about 73 percent of all aluminium cans in Ireland are recycled. In Fingal in 2022 a total of 30.78 tons of aluminium/Steel was collected and recycled from our Bring Bank sites.




Bales of cans above ready to leave our Glassco site to be melted down to create fresh aluminium sheets

Assessment on Blanchardstown, Castleknock, Mulhuddart & Dublin 15 for Potential sites for Bring Banks

Environment in conjunction with Fingal County Council's Operations Department have identified some potential sites for installation of bottle banks and will be working to progress these sites in the first and second quarter of 2023.

The Glass Tonnage Report for February 2023 year to date compared to tonnage collected February 2022 is shown below. There were 389 tons of glass collected for recycling to the 27th of February 2023. This is compared to 403 tons which were collected in the month of February 2022.




Textile Banks

The Textile Tonnage Report for 2023 compared to 2022 is shown below. The amount of textiles collected for January 2023 was 20.76 tons compared to 17.79 tons which was collected in January 2022.







Litter Management

In February, the Litter Wardens continued with their daily patrols, including the coastal routes to carry out foot patrols to advise people of their responsibilities to pick up litter and to speak to dog owner regarding their responsibilities. They also erecting anti dog fouling signage in areas where requests were received.

A total of **276 planned route** inspections on litter black spot areas were carried out.

They also carry out inspections on the bring banks in the Fingal to ensure that there was no dumping. Any dumping found was investigated under the Litter Pollution Acts. They carried out investigation on reports of abandoned cars. Local businesses were inspected, to ensure they were keeping their premises free of litter.

In the district court in February 2023, one case was successfully prosecuted, and costs were awarded.

There have been 76 reports of alleged Abandoned Vehicles received between 1st January 2023 – 27th February 2023.


Burnt-out vehicles are also reported to the Environment Department.

Dog Warden Service

The dog wardens continue to issue on the spot fines to dog walkers/owners who are in breach of the Control of Dogs Act 1986, as amended. Dog walkers/owners should make themselves familiar with the regulations in order to avoid being issued with an on the spot fine.

32 fines were issued by the dog wardens in February for breaches of the Control of Dogs Act 1986. A number of these fines included restricted breed dogs being unmuzzled while in a public place. There is a strict, zero tolerance policy in relation to restricted breed dogs being unmuzzled and owners using an incorrect lead while out in a public place with such dogs. Dog owners must have their dogs under control at all times.

The dog wardens are also continuing door to door licence checks. Dog owners should ensure that they hold a valid licence for their dog and if issued with a 10 day notice by the dog wardens, should present their licence to Controlofdogs@Fingal.ie within the 10 days provided on the notice. Failure to do so may result in a fine being issued for failing to produce a dog licence when requested to do so by a dog warden and keeping a dog without a valid licence. The fine per offence is €100.

The Animal Welfare Section received 60 CRMs in February in relation to dogs.

Dog Licences and Fines

The below table shows the number of annual and lifetime licences purchased in February, compared to January. A yearly licence costs €20 and a lifetime licence costs €140. We will continue to promote the requirement for a dog licence on social media platforms. It is a legal requirement to hold a valid licence for any dog you own or are responsible for

under the Control of Dogs Act 1986. Failing to hold a valid licence for a dog that you are own or are in responsible for can incur a €100 fine.

On the 7th of February, one case in relation to the Control of Dogs was successfully prosecuted. Fines and costs were awarded to Fingal County Council totalling €439. In the second case a fine of €200 in relation to the Probation Act was handed down and a third was issued with sub service.

On the 14th of February, the judge in the District Court heard a case in relation to the breaching of a Court Order to which the defendant pleaded guilty.

Dog Shelter Service

Dublin County Dog Shelter holds "Meet and Greet" visits for anyone looking to rehome a dog. Visits can be arranged by calling the shelter and arranging an appointment. These visits can be arranged from Monday – Friday from 11am to 1pm and from 2pm to 3.30pm.

The shelter is also open on Saturday from 11am – 1pm. The shelter is not open on Sunday's.



The dog shelter holds stray dogs picked up by the dog warden and dogs who have been surrendered by their owners. At the beginning of the month there were 9 dogs in the shelter. During February, 14 dogs were found straying/seized and 4 dogs were surrendered by their owners.

Of these 27 dogs, 7 have been reclaimed by their owners, 3 dogs have been rehomed to rescue and 2 have been rehomed to members of the public. At the end of February there were 12 dogs remaining in the shelter.

Viv the lurcher was found straying in Balheary, Swords by a member of the public and the dog wardens attended to collect her. She was not microchipped and as a result her owner could not be contacted. Viv is now available for rehoming.



A large Caucasian Shepherd was found as a stray in Santry by the dog wardens. This dog was microchipped, his owner contacted, and he was reclaimed within 5 days.

Horses

Weekly inspections continue to take place on Dunsink Landfill to monitor the numbers and welfare of the horses onsite. Currently there are 106 horses on the main landfill site. There are 10 hay feeders being refilled by the Operations Department on a weekly basis to ensure adequate forage for horses on the landfill. In February there were 3 seriously welfare compromised horses removed from the Landfill and taken to the shelter to receive veterinary treatment.

7 horses were seized from the public realm in February. 1 of these has been reclaimed by its owner.


This horse was found grazing (unauthorised) on Fingal County Council land. As a result, he was seized by the horse contractor following a period of time given to the owner to move their horse. The owner made contact with the Animal Welfare Section and reclaimed his horse, paying all associated fees. This horse has now been relocated to a Department of Agriculture, Farming and The Marine registered Equine Premises.

Waste Enforcement & Regulation

Waste Complaints

Responding to waste complaints continues to be a major priority for waste enforcement officers in 2023. A total of 20 waste complaints were recorded for the month of February. The majority of complaints related to backyard storage of household waste and backyard burning of waste (76%) with fly tipping and illegal dumping accounting for a further 24% of waste complaints. Article 27 By-Products

Article 27 of the European Communities (Waste Directive) Regulations 2011 (S.I. 126 of 2011) makes a key distinction between the regulatory regime for substances or object that are defined as "waste" and those that are instead to be viewed as a "by-product".

Under the Regulations, an economic operator can notify the EPA that it views a production residue generated by its main production process, as a "byproduct" of the said production process. For example, sawdust shavings and woodchips can be viewed as a by-product from untreated timber manufacturing.

Four criteria must be met by the production residue for it to be considered a by-product rather than a waste:

- ✓ The further use of the substance or object is certain
- ✓ The substance or object can be used directly without any further processing other than normal industrial practice
- ✓ The substance or object is produced as an integral part of a production process
- ✓ The further use is lawful in that the substance or object fulfils all relevant product, environmental and health protection requirements for the specific use and will not lead to overall adverse environmental or human health impacts.

By-product notifications are made to the EPA through an online portal. Fingal County Council Waste Enforcement Section then has a role to carry out site inspections at the site of origin and / or site of destination to check that the material matches that which has been notified as a By-Product as opposed to a waste material.

In January and February, 10 notifications were received regarding by-products having either a site of origin or a site of destination or both within Fingal. All notifications were for soil and stone materials, e.g. soil and stones excavated as part of developments and then notified as by-product.





Inspections have been completed for 5 of the notifications with the remaining sites to be inspected shortly. Inspections to date have found the materials matched what was notified under the Article 27 notification with no further action required.





The EPA carries out an assessment of all notifications and then makes a determination. The

determination is either to agree with the decision as notified that the material is a by-product, or that the material is a waste i.e. the notification fails to satisfy the 4 key criteria required for the material to be classed as a by-product.

Where the EPA makes a determination that the material is a waste, and the material has already moved, the site of destination becomes an unauthorised waste disposal site for which enforcement action is then required. Early inspection of sites notified under Article 27 minimises the risk of being confronted with an unauthorised waste disposal site.

National Enforcement Priorities (NEP) Progress Report 2022

The FCC National Enforcement Priorities progress report 2022 has been submitted to the EPA detailing the extensive work undertaken by the Waste Enforcement Section, Water Pollution Section and the Air & Noise Pollution Section during 2022. The NEP report gives a full overview of all national enforcement priority activities and tells the story behind the hundreds of inspections, patrols, investigations, and enforcement actions that were undertaken during 2022 and how key criteria were met such as:

- Documented Compliance Rate for Regulated Sites
- Appropriate Site Selection Methodology
- Unauthorised Activities Identified and Actioned
- Highlight Positive Environmental Outcomes
- Lessons Learned and Improvements Made
- Collaboration with other Agencies
- Proactive Approach showing Innovation
- Promote Awareness Campaigns
- Initiate Enforcement Actions and Prosecutions
- Share Case Studies





Under Waste Enforcement there are detailed descriptions of the work undertaken to tackle illegal waste activities and illegal waste collectors using a multi-agency proactive approach, increased checkpoints through collaboration with the Gardai and the Divisional Crime Task Force, increased surveillance, and waste enforcement patrols at sites of interest and the use of Anti-Dumping Initiative funding to target key blackspot areas. Other key areas where extensive work was undertaken during 2022 using innovative techniques with positive outcomes were:

- End of Life Vehicles and the Waste Metal Sector
- Construction and Demolition Waste Activities
- Household & Commercial Waste Collection
- Producer Responsibility Initiatives
