# **Chief Executive's Foreword**

Following the local elections last month, Fingal County Council has 12 new councillors beginning their terms of office and representing their communities. I wish to offer my sincere thanks to the outgoing councillors for their work over the last 5 years and for their support to myself and the Executive Management Team in that period. I hope that you will reflect with pride on the time you spent representing your constituents and the work you undertook on their behalf. To the new members, I extend a warm welcome to you all and I look forward to working with you on behalf of the people of Fingal. At the first meeting of the new council on Friday, June 21<sup>st</sup> Cllr Brian McDonagh was elected Mayor and Cllr JK Onwumereh was elected Deputy Mayor. I congratulate you, Mayor and Deputy Mayor, on your elections and wish you every success in your endeavours over the next year. Overseeing the democratic process is an important function of the local authority and extensive preparations for the counting of the votes at the National Show Centre in Cloghran began several months ago. The manner in which the count was organised and executed was very impressive and I thank everyone who engaged in the process as well as the external agencies who supported Fingal County Council in this undertaking.

Each year the prestigious Bord Bia Bloom gardening festival attracts many thousands of visitors to the Phoenix Park to view the most spectacular gardens on display. Over the years, Fingal County Council is proud to have forged very successful collaborations with talented garden architects and horticultural teams to further underpin and emphasise our commitment to sustainability, biodiversity and creativity. The theme of Fingal's display this year centred around incorporating biodiversity into urban landscapes and private gardens. With global and national biodiversity in decline, and a high demand for housing, the show garden demonstrates how new developments can not only coexist with nature but also enhance it. This year the 'Coming Home to Nature' garden, which was designed by Nicola Haines from Tierney Haines Architects, was not only awarded a gold medal but was also named as 'Best in Show Large Garden.' It also picked up an award for Best Construction Team and was hailed the Most Sustainable Garden. Following on from last year's gold medal winning garden, 'A Breathing Space for Fingal,' I am delighted that once again we have been recognised for the calibre of the design and workmanship employed in creating stunning spaces. I wish to pay tribute to the Biodiversity, Parks and Landscape teams and all who assisted in the process from design to build and who continue to put Fingal firmly on the horticultural map each year.

There have certainly been many opportunities to enjoy the finest events recently in Fingal. In May we welcomed cycling enthusiasts to the beautiful Millennium Park for a family fun day to mark the beginning of a jam-packed Bike Week which saw participants enjoy a range of activities such as an inclusive cycling event, a small bike parade and a sunset cycle. On Saturday, June 15<sup>th</sup> Cruinniú na nÓg was celebrated with over 30 events specifically designed to explore and harness the creativity of our young people. Last month the Malahide Castle Concert series was a tremendous success with thousands of fans seeing Take That, LCD Soundsystem, Shania Twain, SZA, Nicki Minaj and Arcade Fire. The always anticipated Flavours of Fingal returned to Newbridge House and Farm for a fantastic weekend of live music performances, cooking demonstrations, agricultural displays, equestrian trials, dog agility and over 150 craft and food stalls. Later on this month, we have more stellar performances lined up as we welcome the ever popular Nathan Carter and iconic 80's superstars Sister Sledge to Swords Castle. It is a source of pride that the best of Fingal is showcased at all the events we stage. We are fortunate to have some of the most picturesque heritage properties and parks in the country right here on our doorstep and to facilitate large scale events, concerts and festivals at these locations offers locals and visitors alike a unique and enjoyable experience. Preparing for and staging these events is a task requiring meticulous planning and internal and multi-agency collaboration and I acknowledge with thanks the huge efforts of all those who undertake this work in order to provide safe and enjoyable experiences for all.

Many of you who live or work in Swords or indeed spend time in the town and its environs will be aware of the work ongoing in preparation for the construction of the Swords Cultural Quarter (SCQ). The SCQ will encompass a 3.89 acre area around the junction of North Street, Seatown Road, Bridge Street and Main Street. This will include Swords Castle, County Hall, Swords Courthouse and the recently refurbished Carnegie Library. 36 homes will also be built on Seatown Road with a further 13 homes to be constructed on North Street. Once fully constructed, the new Civic and Cultural Centre in Swords will include a new 3,000m2 County Library, an art gallery and exhibition space, a café, a civic area, studios and rehearsal rooms, and a Black Box theatre which can cater for audiences of between 165 and 360. This project represents years of intricate planning and a multi-million euro investment in the town - It will marry the historic with the modern and will ensure the vibrancy and character of Swords is maintained as well as enhancing the public realm and offering an exciting and attractive area for recreation, learning and leisure. I look forward to bringing you updates on the works as they progress in due course.

#### Wellbeing Update

The distribution of the Fingal County Council 2024 Staff Wellbeing Pack took place in June, containing a double walled insulated travel mug and insulted lunch bag. The 'Elephant in the Room' logo was included on the packs to again highlight our participation in this mental health initiative. The packs support Fingal County Council's sustainability efforts by reducing the use of single use cups and encourage the adoption of reusable, durable materials.

#### HSU – Health & Safety Unit

The HSU conducted proactive safety measures during the month of June with the completion of 29 site safety inspections and audits. From January 2024 to date the HSU has completed 22 safety audits and 159 site safety inspections. During the month the Unit assisted the Training Section with manual handling training and protection & safeguarding of young persons training for onboarding lifeguards. Risk assessments and standard operational procedures continue to be reviewed / created during the month. The HSU continued with its role of VDU assessments and answering staff queries on health and safety issues.



# **Communications**

The Communications Unit provided support to several departments during May and June.

It worked with the Economic Enterprise Tourism and Cultural Development Department on several projects including the sod-turning for the Quay Street development in Balbriggan and the signing of the contracts for the Swords Cultural Centre.

The Unit also assisted the Planning and Strategic Infrastructure Department on sod-turning for the Broadmeadow Greenway and National Biodiversity week.

Another project was the sod-turning for the Baldoyle Community Centre with the Housing and Community Development Department.

#### **Local Elections**

The Communications Unit was tasked by Corporate Services with providing a results service for the Local Election as well as managing media attending the count in the National Show Centre. Media attending the count included RTE, Irish Times, Irish Independent, Dublin Live and Phoenix FM. Election results were carried across our social media channels and on our website.

For the first time ever, the Council streamed the Count with 29 hours of live coverage that was watched by 9,893 viewers.

The dedicated results page on the website, www. fingal.ie/count, attracted 23,322 visitors and 52,350 views.

On X our local election coverage generated 595,058 impressions over the three days of the count with 447,396 being recorded on Sunday, June 9.

On Facebook our count coverage had a reach of 315,900 while on Instagram there was a reach of 122,425.

The Communications Unit was also responsible for the content on the big screen which ensured that those in the National Show Centre could follow the different counts.

In the run-up to the election there was a specific campaign encouraging citizens to vote in addition to the ongoing register to vote campaign.



#### Website

The first six months of 2024 have seen a record number of visitors to the fingal.ie website. Between January 1 and June 30 there were 978,517 visitors and 2,260,034 page views. The average time spend on the site was two minutes and one second. That's an average of 37,635 visitors per week and leaves us on track to improve on last year's record figure of 1.4m visitors.

After the home page, the most frequented pages in the opening six months of 2024 were Planning Applications, Affordable Housing, Jobs, Contact Us and Recycling Centre.

#### **Social Media**

The Local Election coverage helped drive traffic on our social media channels during May and June with X recording 1.2m impressions and an engagement rate of 4.8% while Facebook had a reach of 1.2m and an engagement rate of 2%.

Overall, the five corporate social media channels now have an accumulated following of 80,309 which is a rise of 5.8% since April 30.

Facebook has 35, 544 followers, X has 23,784, LinkedIn has 9.381 and You Tube has 1,430 subscribers. Instagram broke through the 10,000 followers barrier during the period and now has 10,170 followers.

#### **Press Releases**

The Communications Unit issued 19 press releases in May and 23 in June. Among the press releases issued were ones on Africa Day, Biodiversity Week, Blue Flags, the Bloom Garde, Baldoyle Community Centre, Flavours of Fingal and the appointment of the contractor to build the Swords Cultural Centre.

#### **Media Queries**

The Communications Unit responded to 34 media queries in the month of May and 23 in June. Some of the topics involved included the local elections, housing, Dublin Airport, drone deliveries and Skerries GAA pitch.

#### Videos

The Communications Unit were involved in the production of 14 videos during May and June. One of the videos was prepared especially for Dublin Climate Week and detailed the Climate Action work being done internally and externally by Fingal County Council. There was also a video to mark the completion of the LED public lighting scheme and another to mark the recent election of the Mayor and Deputy Mayor.

There was also video about the multi-awardwinning Bloom garden which documented the journey from conception to construction in the Phoenix Park.

The Fingal Food & Drink Policy was launched on Friday, 28 June at an invite-only event for industry professionals hosted at Newbridge House. Fingal food producers, growers and Councillors were joined by TV host and food writer, Donal Skehan and Minister for Housing Local Government and Heritage, Darragh O'Brien TD to officially launch the policy, which celebrates local food provenance and positions Fingal as a premier culinary tourism destination. Attendees networked and discussed the future of food in Fingal while enjoying culinary delights from Sabongi who catered the launch. Recognising the ongoing importance of fostering a long term, sustainable and thriving food sector, the policy was developed, with the Local Enterprise Office Fingal, following an extensive process of consultation and research. The new policy supports businesses and economic growth, aims to develop greater food tourism experiences, engages the community on the benefits of their local food provenance, celebrates Fingal's horticultural history and celebrates culinary excellence across the county.





#### Fingal Food & Drink Network



The Fingal Food & Drink Network will be well represented at Flavours of Fingal on Saturday 28<sup>th</sup> and Sunday 29<sup>th</sup> June at Newbridge House and will be involved in cooking demonstrations as well as showcasing the wide variety of produce from across Fingal in the 'Coast and Fields' tent. This is a great opportunity to raise the profile of the Network, recruit new members and meet the public.

#### Launch of St. Patrick's Trail and Art Trail

The St. Patrick's Trail and Art Trail was officially launched on Saturday 22<sup>nd</sup> June in Skerries Sailing Club by Cllr Robert O'Donoghue deputising for the Mayor. Among those present for the launch were representatives from Failte Ireland, Skerries tourism group, Skerries autism group and the local community.



Those present were brought on a guided tour of the trail highlighting the new signage and information boards as well as the art sculptures along the route. The new trails were part funded by Failte Ireland's Destination Towns programme and are seen as another tourism asset for Skerries that will attract greater numbers to the town and stimulate further economic activity.

# American Connections in an Irish Country House

Newbridge House will celebrate July 4<sup>th</sup> this year with a tour led by Newbridge's own American, curator Mary Cate Babcock, exploring the surprising connections between the Cobbe family and American history. With links to the American War of Independence, the founding fathers, southern plantations and pioneer life on the prairie to be discovered, this very special tour will reveal a new side of Newbridge House.



In the agreed programme of marketing events with Malahide Castle and Newbridge House Ltd (the Council's holding company for the site) this event represents the use of the historical narrative of the house and its former occupants and connections to drive visits North American visitors. This is an important aspect of the ongoing tourism market recovery, as this segment is yet to be restored to pre-pandemic levels of demand.

#### **Skerries Mills Celebrates 25 Years**

This June the staff of Skerries Mills celebrated 25 years of serving the public with a very special gathering. Skerries Mills first opened to the public in June 1999 as a community heritage centre and has developed into a vibrant commercial and community-focused amenity with guided tours of the iconic windmills, a thriving café, shop, artist's studios and a busy event schedule to match.



Staff came together to commemorate the anniversary and congratulate two ever-present employees on their 25 years of service.

#### Malahide Castle Boiler Upgrade

Work began last month on the Malahide Castle and Visitor Centre Energy Centre & Rainwater Harvesting Systems upgrades. These upgrades are part of the reduction of costs on energy spending, and water re-use on-site and form a large part of the commitment of Fingal County Council to deliver on sustainability in its main heritage properties.

While there were measures in place on-site these were designed two decades ago and raising them to a more contemporary specification will help reduce carbon emissions and reduce operating costs.

#### **Guinness Bridge Conservation Works**

Works by Jons Civil Engineering Ltd, working on behalf of Fingal County Council, to secure the Guinness Bridge at Farmleigh through restoration and conservation are now substantially complete, with the bridge now re-instated.

The aesthetic appearance and structural integrity of the bridge have been significantly improved and the bridge will now safely remain a part of the Liffey Valley's visually accessible built heritage for decades to come. Land ownership on the northern approach to the site and consideration of options for the future of the bridge are ongoing, given its structural capacity. Fingal County Council is liaising with South Dublin County Council, who have public lands near the southern landfall.

Fingal Arts Office proudly presented Orchestral Odyssey on the occasion of Cruinniu na nOg 2024. This ambitious arts education project brought the magic of a full orchestra directly to children in schools and to families in the newly refurbished Carnegie Library Swords. Scoil Chrónáin Senior National School, Swords Educate Together National School and Gaelscoil Bhrian Bóroimhe responded to the unique invitation to host musicians Niall O'Sullivan, Shóna Henneberry and Denice Doyle over the course of three weeks to mentor children in carefully selected songs about inclusivity, diversity, and resilience.

Children were encouraged to explore the intricate art of ensemble performance in preparation for performing in front of their peers accompanied by the 35-piece orchestra. This project connected over 1400 children in Swords with some of the finest musicians in Ireland. In addition to the schools' programme, a series of interactive music workshops for families and the wider community was presented at Carnegie Library – a new focal point for arts development in Swords, on Cruinniu na nOg Saturday 15<sup>th</sup> of June.

#### **Dance in Schools**



Fingal Arts Office is conducting research into contemporary dance to better understand the needs and ambition of children and young people when it comes to this underserved artform. Dance artist Alessandra Azevedo facilitated a dynamic consultation workshop exploring movement and rhythm at St. Luke's NS, Tyrrelstown. This is one of a series of dance workshops facilitated across schools. The aim of this action research is to collaborate and communicate with young people through dance.

#### **Space Crafts**

Fingal Arts Office is working in collaboration with Dunsink Observatory to offer an exciting new arts and science initiative to local primary school children. Artists Aileen Murphy, Mary Jo Galligan and Julia McConville have completed a residency phase at DIAS where they worked closely with DIAS education officer Sadhbh Leahy. A workshop series planetary compositions, celestial exploring movement, light and optics was developed to stimulate interest in the innovative space research taking place at Dunsink and the exciting contemporary art practice of these three artists. This first phase engaged children from Castaheany Educate Together NS and St. Philip's NS Mountview.



# Students of Malahide Portmarnock Educate Together Secondary School create beautiful print work in response to local biodiversity

Professional Printmaker Clare Henderson worked with 1<sup>st</sup> year students on a creative response to the Sustainable Development Goal - 11 (sustainable cities and communities) and 15 (life on land). Using knowledge that emerged from the study of flora and fauna native to Fingal and site visits to a nature reserve, students captured what they saw using drypoint intaglio printmaking. Students discussed the idea of biodiversity and how art plays a huge role in raising awareness on the importance of preserving the wild beauty of our planet.



#### **Public Art**

#### St Patrick's Way & Art Trail

Successfully launched the St.Patrick's Way & Art Trail, at the Skerries Sailing Club, the project included dedicated collaboration between EETCD,Heritage, Operations and Arts. The trail includes 5 new artworks and associated signage which will add to the visitor and local experience in Skerries. We will continue to engage with the local community in the communication of the trail including listing it on Failte Ireland's Visitor Portal.



#### **Artist Funding & Support**

#### 2003 Arts Act Grants Scheme

Applications were received for the '**2003** Arts Act Grants Scheme' to assist the development of the 'arts' in Fingal.

The 'arts' means any creative or interpretative expression (traditional or contemporary) in whatever form, and includes visual arts, theatre, literature, music, dance, opera, film, circus, and architecture, and any medium when used for those purposes.

The Arts Act grant scheme is intended to assist **groups, organisations, and individuals** in the following:

- stimulating public interest in the arts
- promoting the knowledge, appreciation and encourage practice of the arts
- improving standards and development in the arts in the county

Events supported under this scheme aim to deliver quality arts experiences to participants and audiences, to increase opportunities for participation and engagement in the arts and to contribute to the development of the arts in the county.

A total of 26 eligible applications were received and assessed by the Arts Office and an external advisor. The panel has recommended 26 awards amounting to a total sum of **€160,823.**

#### Draíocht



Draíocht is preparing the final report (including the commissioned Evaluation of our hugely successful NEST project. NEST shows played 68 times to an audience of 2,417 in Dublin 15 homes, schools and community organisations on 1<sup>st</sup> March 2024. 1,140 people attend the Spréacha Soar Festival from the 11<sup>th</sup> to 16<sup>th</sup> March 2024 and an additional 1.690 visited the two Exhibitions: NEST: The Portrait Project and Me, You, Us. 900 children and young people participated in NEST workshops with a further 193 children and young people participating in the Me, You, us photographic element of the NEST project. The total reach was 6,400. Draíocht commissioned Dublin 15 artist, Eleanor McCaughey, opened her show to an appreciative gathering on June 12<sup>th</sup>. Entitled 'Whispers of Rhythm balance on my hands', this will run until September 12<sup>th</sup>. The joint Fingal Arts Office and Draíocht Studio Artist Award will take place from September to December 2024. Closing date for applications is 28<sup>th</sup> June. A programme of workshops for children and young people will take place over June/July in Draíocht's spaces.

The following evening, a comedy trio was hosted by Sharon Mannion, with comedians Gearoid Farrelly, Julie Jay and Ian Coppinger. #### **Creative Ireland**

#### Cruinniú na nÓG



Cruinniú na nÓg took place on Saturday 15<sup>th</sup> June. To celebrate Ireland's day of free creativity for young people, creative events took place in library branches, arts spaces and parks across Fingal. 22 events took place in libraries for children and young people of all ages, including author and illustrator workshops, a role-play village, graffiti workshop, coding, creative writing, orchestra performances, music recitations, crochet workshops, moviemaking, and comic book creation. Fingal Arts Office also delivered a beautiful Orchestral Odyssey project featuring 35 of Ireland's most talented musicians and over 1400 children across three schools in Swords. This culminated in three interactive musical workshops held in the Carnegie Library, Swords for Cruinniú na nÓg. Balbriggan Youth Theatre created a promotional video to raise awareness of their group. The video premiered across Fingal County Council and Fingal Libraries YouTube channels and social media on the 15<sup>th</sup> of June and was subsequently selected to feature in the RTE highlights video of the day.



In Blanchardstown Library, Author/Illustrators Niamh Sharkey and Mary Murphy responded to our Voice of The Child survey with their Cruinniú Creation Station, a big space for children to get creative and messy and try lots of different art forms. The Fingal Makerspace held workshops to print and sew your own bag, and library staff ran a Dungeons and Dragons-themed Fantasy Mapmaking Workshop. All library events were fully booked and well-attended on the day.



Our flagship event, as part of the new Cruinniú Late initiative funded by the Night Time Economy unit, was the Garageland Galaxyz Live Youth Music Festival in Millennium Park. This event was aimed at a target audience of 14 to 18-year-olds, to take place on the day of Cruinniú after 4 pm to a minimum of 8 pm. There was a fantastic turnout and over 50 young musicians got to perform live on stage to an engaged young audience. #### One Book, One Community: David O'Doherty at Blanchardstown Library

On 16th May, students from Blakestown Community School, Scoil Mhuire Senior School, and St Philip's Mountview met author and comedian, David O'Doherty in Blanchardstown Library. This event celebrated One Book, One Community - a community reading project where children and their families are encouraged to read and discuss a particular book, along with supporting activities held in schools, libraries, and the community. The students chose David's novel 'The Summer I Robbed a Bank'.

#### Summer Programme

Libraries has launched its programme of events for the summer months. The programme includes free events for children such as author visits, creative writing, illustration and painting classes, arts and crafts, tie-dye T-Shirt printing, drama, Lego STEM workshops, board games, and sensoryfriendly workshops. The summer programme will also feature events for all the family including a percussion workshop, coding workshops and talks on dyslexia. Events for adults include a summer plant care demonstration, painting on silk workshops, creative writing, sustainable vintage fashion demonstrations, chair yoga, Tai Chi, and a talk for parents on supporting children starting school.



#### **Heritage Week**

Heritage Week takes place between 17th – 25th August this year. Libraries will celebrate with events for people of all ages, including a pollinator workshop teaching children about the importance of the All-Ireland Pollinator Plan for bees. There will be talks for adults on local history including a talk on the history of Balbriggan Library. Fingal Local Studies and Archives have organised open days where the public can view interesting items from the collection and find out what resources are available for local and family history. Local Studies and Archives will also host a Heritage Week talk on genealogy and a talk by Dr. Bernard Kelly on the war of independence in Fingal.

#### Summer Stars

Libraries are taking part in Summer Stars, the national reading programme that runs annually throughout the school summer holidays. Every child who takes a book out from the library will get a reading card which they can get stamped for each book they read. Children will be issued with certificates at the end of the programme. Summer stars story time sessions will take place in all Fingal libraries.

# Little Library Book Bag

Libraries are taking part in the 'My Little Library Book Bag' initiative, a collaborative project between libraries, the Department of Rural and Community Development, and the Department of Children, Equality, Disability, Integration and Youth as part of the First 5 strategy. Every child starting school this September will be able to pick up a bag with a free book telling a story about making friends from their local library.

#### **Flavours of Fingal**

Libraries will again be taking part in the Flavours of Fingal Festival on Saturday 29th and Sunday 30th June this year. Libraries will have a stand at the Fingal Village where the public can talk to staff and find information on library services. People who are not already library members will be able to join up on the spot by scanning a QR code. The mobile library van will also be at the Festival along with entertainment for children including facepainting, a magician and an author visit from Alan Nolan.

# Donabate Portrane Community Crafters Project

The Donabate Portrane Community Crafters project grew out of the craft group that meets weekly in Donabate Library. Following a successful application for funding from the C.E. Innovation Fund, a programme of workshops was drawn up featuring crafts such as macramé, jewellery making, felting, soapmaking, cyanotype and block printing. These workshops are facilitated by local craft specialists. New equipment including a Singer sewing machine and Cricut cutting machine were purchased. Participants in the project will take part in August Craft Month this year. The group have also been invited to run craft sessions with residents in the newly reopened art therapy room in the Knockamann Resource Centre in Portrane.

#### Festival in a van



Sounds Like Summer: Fingal Festival in a Van kicks off on the summer solstice, bringing music, spoken word, and dance to every corner of Fingal. Taking place over six days the last two weekends of June, this tour is a free, open air, open-to-all celebration of Fingal's community spirit and creativity.


#### **Economic Development**



Fingal SKYLA Project Team previously shared two Good Practices from Fingal with our project partners which were identified in collaboration with key Fingal County Council stakeholders DRSF and Baldoyle Training Centre. The Fingal SKYLA Project team intend to further examine the shared Good Practices and are in the process of identifying the Gap Analysis between our chosen Good Practice and the outcome we aspire to achieve.

The Good Practice we have identified is by our partner Skane Industrial Development Centre in Sweeden who shared their "Mind the Gap" tool which assists in identifying specific needs in the business region and in doing so offers collective results that could be made available to the education system and VET providers. Mind the Gap assists in matching between supply and demand when it comes to skills development and VET in the region.

#### **Economic Development Strategy**



The Future Fingal Economic Development Strategy builds on the socio-economic profile prepared as part of the Fingal LECP process and sets out a vision, key opportunities and actions to support the local economy to 2040.

An official launch of the Economic Development Strategy is intended for Q.3, 2024.

To align with the Economic Development Strategy work is also ongoing on the development of a Marketing Plan for the County in consultation with key stakeholders.

#### **URBACT – EcoCore**



Fingal County Council is leading the URBACT EcoCore Project which comprises a network of 9 small cities/towns in Europe focussing on challenges and opportunities for green growth and sustainable economic development along transport corridors. Balbriggan is the lead town and the other partners committed to the network are Albu Iulia, Romania; Dubrovnik, Croatia; Parnu, Estonia; Kekava,Latvia; Villena, Spain; Ormoz, Slovenia; Santo Tirso, Portugal; Tuusula, Finland.



The EcoCore Project Team accompanied by members of the Project ULG travelled to Parnu, Estonia for our third transnational city visit as part of the EcoCore Project.



Parnu is primarily a summer tourist destination with its own cruise and industrial port.

It is strategically positioned, connected to Tallinn, Riga and Helsinki Vantaa via the Via Baltica highway and a local airport. The city is well-suited for manufacturing industries due to its transport connectivity with successful wood processing and textile manufacturing industries.

There were many good practice examples demonstrated during the visit to Parnu and invaluable learnings for the Balbriggan delegation.



# Citizen, Equality, Rights and Values Programme (Cerv)

CERV is an EU Funding Programme for citizens' engagement and the implementation of EU rights and values. Fingal County Council has been awarded CERV funding to participate in 2 separate projects, which commenced in January 2023 and will continue for 18 months.



#### **Green It Your Work**



Work is continuing on the objectives of 'Green IT Your Work' project which are:

- Youth Debates about European Digital Age project highlighting the role of young people in the green transition
- Promote green jobs with the aim of contributing to greener European cities

A meeting took place in Kocevje, Slovenia in May 2024 with a focus on Green Portals for Youth.



The delegation convened at the Kočevsko Institute, the public institute for Tourism and Culture, where they were welcomed by Vice Mayor Andrej Mladenovič. The meeting focused on discussing regional tourism and cultural initiatives.

This was followed by a visit to a local Gymnasium, (a secondary school dedicated to preparing students for higher education). During this visit, students presented their project, 'ITS-GRETA' showcasing their innovative ideas and hard work.

The delegation visited the Organic Farm Kocjančič in Gotenica to explore the opportunities for growth and the challenges impeding the farm's progress. The visit included a detailed tour of the farm, discussions with the owners about their sustainable practices, and the potential obstacles faced by the farm in expanding its operations and enhancing its productivity.



On day 2 the delegation visited local company, Intersocks, a leading developer and supplier of high-quality technical socks to the clothing and sportswear industry for a tour of the facility and attended a presentation on the sustainable measures implemented by the company. The focus was on their commitment to environmental responsibility and sustainable practices in their operations.



The visit concluded with a tour of Podjetniški Inkubator in Kočevje which included a tour of the Podjetniški Inkubator where the group explored the facilities. Following the tour, presentations were given on the "Green Portals for You(th)" initiative and the Career Centre for Youth, highlighting efforts to support young people's professional development and environmental awareness.

#### InclusEU

The InclusEU project aims to encourage volunteer action as a social response for an inclusive Europe. Work continues on the project with partners from Italy, Poland, Hungary, Spain, Portugal, the Netherlands and Romania. Representatives from Fingal's Sports Office and Foroige attended Viana do Castelo, Portugal, in April and representatives from Fingal's Sports Office and Empower attended a city visit in Italy in June.



#### **Sustainable Fingal**



The EETCD Department are liaising with representatives from DCU and DAA to explore a work programme for 2024/25 to progress collaborative sustainable projects. Work is ongoing to explore opportunities between both organisations for synergies in the area of biodiversity and circular economy projects and to identify potential funding streams.

#### Smart Balbriggan

Smart Balbriggan were recently successfully in an application under the SFI Discover Programme 2024 - Science Week call and has been approved for funding by SFI at a value of €10,000 direct costs.

An introductory partner meeting will take place on 4th July 2024 to discuss the guidelines of the Programme.



Staff from EECTD attended a webinar on Public procurement which stands out as a decisive, high-impact lever that cities can use to lead by example by purchasing goods and services that support the transition to a circular economy.

While a growing number of Circular Cities Declaration signatories are reporting using more circular practices in their procurement processes, there are still challenges with mainstreaming the approach across product categories and departments. This CCD webinar examined best practice examples and tools that cities across Europe have used to implement a more circular approach to public procurement to support the use of circular procurement.

#### **Dublin Belfast Economic Corridor**



Fingal County Council's Feasibility Study for the development of regional innovation/enterprise hubs along the Dublin Belfast Economic Corridor has been completed. The Council continue to liaise with DBEC to consider potential funding streams to progress the implementation of the Study's recommendations and has submitted a concept proposal to the Enterprise Ireland Smart Regions Fund for a priming grant for a pilot implementation of the recommendations.

Fingal County Council continues to liaise with DBEC on a series of potential projects for DBEC.

#### **Enterprise Ireland – Smart Regions Funding**

The Council has submitted 5 no. concept proposals to the Enterprise Ireland Smart Regions Fund. The concept proposals include applications under Stream 1 for Capital Infrastructure Investments in the Council's Enterprise Centres and Under Stream 4 for Feasibility Studies/Priming Grants for consideration. Following consultation with Enterprise Ireland in relation to the funding applications, EETCD will pursue potential applications.

#### LOCAL AND RURAL DEVELOPMENT



#### Fingal Local Community Development Committee

The Fingal LCDC continues to oversee and administer the key areas of LEADER and SICAP and the various Local Development and Community Development funding programmes under its remit. The LCDC also manages the Healthy Ireland Initiative and the Social Enterprise Grants Scheme.

The LCDC will meet on 10<sup>th</sup> July 2024 to review progress on various programmes under its remit including the SICAP Mid-Year Review.



# Fingal Local Economic Community Plan 2023 – 2028

The LECP was adopted by the Council in January 2024 which includes a two-year LECP Implementation Plan with actions to implement the Goals and Objectives set out in the LECP.



#### Local Enhancement Programme 2024

The Local Enhancement Programme 2024 which is funded by the Department of Rural and Community Development allocated a total of €220,842.98 in funding to community groups/ organisations within the Fingal administrative area.



Minister Joe O'Brien TD announced the successful projects which provides vital support to community groups to help them improve their facilities.



#### We Can Quit

Healthy Fingal have teamed up with Empower to deliver two pilot We Can Quit programmes with the Blanchardstown Training Centre and the Tolka River Project, Mulhuddart. The We Can Quit programme, was developed by the HSE and is encouraging people aimed at to quit tobacco/vaping. The programme with the Tolka River project started in January 2024 for a period of 10 weeks with participants enrolled to take part in both quit smoking sessions and weekly yoga sessions to encourage a healthier lifestyle.

#### **Woodlands for Health**

Healthy Fingal have partnered with Mental Health Ireland, HSE, Empower and the Sports Office to organise the Woodlands for Health walk. The programme brings service users from the HSE mental health services and other key target groups in Swords & Balbriggan to Newbridge Demesne to interact with other service users and avail of health expertise in the calming and quiet atmosphere of the walking paths around the park. Two programmes are scheduled for 2024.

#### Community Recognition Fund 2023/2024

**The Community Recognition Fund (CRF) 2023**, funded by the Department of Rural and Community Development, approved the Council's project proposals in March 2023. Fingal County Council has received an allocation of €1,748,912 for 26 projects across Fingal.

All projects are required to be complete by  $18^{\text{th}}$ October 2024 and work is progressing on the implementation of the projects with the Council submitting an initial drawdown in 2023 of  $\notin$ 243,000 with a further drawdown of  $\notin$ 176,000 submitted in respect of works completed to date in 2024.

In March the Council received an allocation of €1,538,573 in respect of the **Community Recognition Fund (CRF) 2024.** The funding will support capital projects which will be delivered over the time period 2025/2026. The fund is targeted to invest in those communities, villages and towns where the highest level of new arrivals are located and where a clear need for investment is identified.

The funding is allocated across 3 application windows as outlined below:

**Application Window 1:** FCC Public Call Closed Successful applications pending announced by the DRCD

Application Window 2: FCC Public Call Now Open: (25th June to 13th August) Approval Timeline for DRCD: (1st August to 30th September 2024)

ApplicationWindow3:FCCPublicCall:(November/December 2024)Approval Timeline for DRCD:(1st January 2025 to 31st January 2025)

FCC Public Call 2 is now open and applicants are eligible to apply for capital projects with a minimum level of funding for an individual project of  $\notin$  50,000 and a maximum of  $\notin$  500,000.

It should be noted that applicants who previously applied under Call 1 are eligible to apply for projects under Call 2 irrespective of the status of their Call 1 application. https://submit.link/2Hq

The allocation of funding will be a competitive process and project proposals will be evaluated by the Council for further engagement with the applicants to agree the project requirements which will then be submitted to the DRCD for approval to proceed.

# SICAP



The annual SICAP budget for 2024 is  $\leq 1,520,811$  with a separate funding provision for new arrivals of  $\leq 375,372$ .

The SICAP Mid-Year Review meeting is scheduled for the 10<sup>th</sup> July 2024 by the LCDC with formal approval by the LCDC to be agreed by Friday 26<sup>th</sup> July 2024.

LCDCs to provide feedback to POBAL by Tuesday 2<sup>nd</sup> July. POBAL will complete the Mid-Year review by 16<sup>th</sup> July 2024.



#### Leader Programme

Following the outcome of the Local Development Strategy (LDS) selection process Fingal LCDC and Fingal LEADER Partnership were selected to run the LEADER Programme 2023 – 2027 in the Dublin rural area. The Dublin Rural LEADER (LAG) includes rural areas in the administrative areas of Fingal, Dun Laoghaire Rathdown and South Dublin.

The new LEADER programme launched at the end of February, following the signing of the LEADER Funding Agreement by the Minister for Rural & Community Development, Heather Humphreys, TD.

The new Dublin Rural LAG met for the first time on the 27<sup>th</sup> February 2024 and were briefed on the new LEADER Programme by Fingal LEADER Partnership.

The Dublin Rural Leader team held an online information session on the LEADER application process and an overview of the procurement process.

Applications are sought from Individuals, Farm Families, Rural Businesses, Community & Voluntary Groups and Social Enterprises. Help is available to guide you through the process More details: www.dublinruralleader.ie



#### Enterprise Centres

A convention of the Boards of Directors of BASE, BEAT and Drinan Enterprise Centres was recently held in the Carlton Hotel to examine and review the future direction of the Enterprise Centres to align with the Strategic Vision of "Future Fingal" An Economic Development Strategy.

The respective Boards agreed that in order for the three Enterprise Centres collectively to become a beacon of innovation and change leadership for employers, entrepreneurs, employees, social enterprises and creative communities within Fingal that they should merge with a united strategic vision to transcend the current understanding of a Community Enterprise Centre and create a Network of Centres of Enterprise Excellence and Innovation "without walls". It was agreed by the three Boards of Directors that in the coming months the legal company entities of the respective Centres will dissolve with the formation of a new legal entity "Innovative Fingal" The Council has engaged Legal Expertise to facilitate the formation of "Innovation Fingal" and has consulted extensively with the existing boards of directors with a view to the formation of an interim board of directors to oversee the formation and implementation of "Innovation Fingal".

Fingal's Enterprise Centres continue to participate in ConnectedHubs.ie a one-stop-shop for remote working hubs throughout Ireland and to inform the Council's future policies on such facilities, the Council has concluded a public survey of residents and organisations in the County with regard to the demand of co-working hubs.



All three Enterprise Centres have space available to start-up businesses and businesses/individuals who wish to avail of remote working options and facilities. Bespoke options or generic office fitouts can be considered. Occupancy rates at the Council's three enterprise centres are all over 90%. The three Enterprise Centres currently support 65 businesses and over 320 direct jobs.

# <u>Town Regeneration Office</u> Our Balbriggan 2019 – 2025 Rejuvenation Plan – A Socio-Economic Strategy



Dr. David Begg was appointed Chair of the Balbriggan Leadership Group following the departure of Brian MacCraith earlier this year. The Balbriggan Leadership Group provides oversight and stewardship for the town plan's implementation. A 'Review and Renew' process, conducted by the Leadership Group, of the town plan, its governance and delivery structures is due to be completed shortly.

The review process confirmed the extension of the Rejuvenation programme until 2030, bringing it in line with its main funder the Department of Housing, Local Government and Heritage, URDF unit. Further, the review process has confirmed new governance arrangements for existing, merged and new Pillar Groups.

The Our Balbriggan Programme Office will support the Leadership Group and its five new pillars -Economic Development, Public Realm & Placemaking, Education, Skills & Employment, Community and Sustainability, Climate Change & Biodiversity, as part of the 'Renew' process to develop high level objectives and actions to be adopted in Q4 and implemented 2024 - 2030.

Contracts were signed between Fingal County Council and John Craddock Ltd in April 2024 for the €15 Million transformation of Quay Street, Harbour & Environs. The contractor is on site and the project is due to be substantially completed by December 2025. A Communications plan including an update to every Balbriggan household and business has commenced and includes detailed information on alternative car parking and frequently asked questions. All materials are available on Balbriggan.ie





A call for tenderers for 2 – 4 Dublin Street is expected during the Summer month. 2 - 4 Dublin Street is to be transformed into a new Creative Hub with 8 workspaces at 2 Dublin Street and an ancillary connected space at 4 Dublin Street which will support STEAM education, training and enterprise activities supported by SMART Balbriggan and the Fingal Arts Office. Planning permission was granted at council in October 2023.



Demolition works on 14 Bridge Street (house known locally as Keelings) have been completed and a temporary Pocket Park has been installed.



Demolition contractors continue excavation works to the rear of 6a – 14 Bridge Street. An Integrated Design Team has been appointed and a project initiation meeting took place in May 2024. The IDT will look at preparing a design based on best possible uses and options in line with site constraints. Early and on-going stakeholder engagement has commenced to inform options and will continue throughout the design process.





Donnelly Civil Engineering Ltd and MWP Engineering have delivered a package of improvement works at Balbriggan Harbour. The main Harbour upgrade works and shoreside services are complete, with some lighting improvements awaiting final completion further to new electricity connections. The ESB have been on site since early May.

The programme office is progressing the phase 2 element of the Balbriggan Tidal Pool and Swimming Platform Feasibility Study. Phase 2 will include an economic demand analysis which will inform further possible options for this project.

An Internal Project Team has been established from the Town Regeneration Office, Our Balbriggan and FCC Architects to progress the Boathouse and Bathhouse project. FCC has met with local stakeholders and potential end users for the Bathhouse and Boathouse at the Martello Tower. Enabling works commenced in February. Works include full surveys and assessment of the site, which will inform the full works design and planning proposal.



The Our Balbriggan Office continues to generate regular and unique content across all social media channels, Facebook, Twitter, Instagram, LinkedIn with over 5.1k followers on Facebook.





#### Town Centre First – Lusk

The Lusk Town Centre First Plan, "Lusk for Life", was launched by the Mayor of Fingal, Cllr Adrian Henchy and the Minister of State at the Department of Rural and Community Development, Joe O'Brien, on 24<sup>th</sup> May 2024. This followed months of consultation and

engagement by the Town Team and the three Pillar Groups representing the Community, Business and Economy and Public Realm / Climate Action & Sustainability,



Two applications for Project Development Measure funding have been submitted to the Department of Rural and Community Development for their consideration. These projects have been taken from the Lusk Town Centre First Plan and, if approved, will support the development of projects listed within the Plan.

In May 2024, under Measure 1: Town Centre First Suite of Supports 2024, three applications for funding of €10,000 per village were approved in respect of establishing and supporting town teams in Ballyboughal, Balrothery, and Donabate.

#### Town Centre First – Rush

At the National Town Centre First Day held 28<sup>th</sup> February in Limerick, the Minister for Rural and Community Development, Heather Humphries T.D. announced that Rush had been selected as Fingal's second Town Centre First Town. The Town Regeneration Office welcomes the selection of Rush as a Town Centre First Town and engagement with the Local Elected Members, the Community and the Business Sector in Rush will be invited shortly to establishing a new Rush Town Team. This new Town Team will prepare a new Town Centre First Plan for Rush.



#### **Town & Village Renewal Schemes**

The Town Regeneration Office was notified in April that two applications under this scheme from 2023 have been successful. A Phase 4 development of Floraville Park in Skerries ( $\leq$ 55,800) and upgrades to the Rush Community Centre ( $\leq$ 64,350) have been approved by the Department of Rural and Community Development.



In 2023, the Town Regeneration Office completed the implementation of projects in Rush, Donabate, Oldtown, Naul, St. Margaret's and Balrothery.

With respect to these 6 schemes, the local authority has invested €282,276.00 in total funding drawn down from the Department of Rural and Community Development to support the revitalisation of our Rural towns.

#### Streetscape Enhancement Scheme 2024

Streetscape Enhancement Scheme 2024 was launched on the 15<sup>th</sup> March, 2024 and expressions of interest were sought from qualifying commercial and community premises located within areas designated as "Major Town Centre", "Town and District Centre", "Local Centre" or "Rural Village" within the Fingal County Development Plan 2023-2029. Under the scheme, up to 50% of the cost of improvements, up to a maximum grant amount of €1,500 per eligible property, is available, subject to terms and conditions. A total of 41 applications were received by the closing date, 32 of which have now received offers of funding subject to project completion by  $31^{st}$  August 2024.

#### **Outdoor Recreation Infrastructure Scheme**

One project was approved under the Outdoor Recreation Infrastructure Scheme for 2024, " "Sea Swimming at Skerries Springers". The Town Regeneration Office has commenced the study process by engaging with local stakeholders, gathering, and collating feedback to inform future options and study scope. A request for tender document has been prepared and the formal procurement process is now underway.


#### **Urban Regeneration Development Fund Call 3**

In 2023, the Town Regeneration Office was successful in securing  $\in$ 7 million for a new revolving fund that will acquire vacant or derelict properties to renovate, bring back into use and sell back into the market for housing purposes. 24 properties have been approved for inclusion by the URDF Call 3under this fund which is administered by the Department of Housing Heritage and Local Government. These properties are being assessed and progressed where appropriate. A further 20 properties are under consideration to be added to the list of properties going forward. In April 2024 the Council was notified that an additional  $\in$ 3 Million had been allocated to fund this Call.

#### **Derelict Sites**

117 statutory notices have issued to owners of Derelict properties to the end of May 2024. This shows a significant increase in notices issued by the Council compared to a total of 16 at this point in time in 2023.

The Derelict Sites team continue to focus on engagement with the owners of these existing derelict sites and identifying further derelict sites across the county.

- Widening the eligibility for the Digital for Business Consultancy Scheme and extending it to all sectors with up to 50 employees
- Launching a new 'Ireland's Best Entrepreneur Programme' to encourage entrepreneurship and startups in underrepresented groups
- Launching the new online National Enterprise Hub for SMEs to access information on the wide range of Government business supports

# **Fingal Business Network**



Established by LEO Fingal in Summer 2022, Fingal Business Network meets guarterly. Over 100 business owner/managers attended the latest Fingal Business Network event on Friday 10<sup>th</sup> May in the Carlton Hotel, Dublin Airport. The theme of the meeting was "Using AI for Business" and provided participants with the information they need to use the available AI tools to help them in their business. Attendees were given a live demo of Chat GPT, Gemini by Google & other tools. The response to the event has been astounding and more events of this nature are in the pipeline. The afternoon concluded with a lively networking lunch where many new connections and business opportunities were made and discussed. Next Fingal Business Network event is in planning for the 25<sup>th</sup> September 2024.

#### **National Enterprise Awards 2024**



The National Enterprise Awards took place in the Mansion House, Dublin City Centre on Thursday 23<sup>rd</sup> May 2024. PRM Assist represented LEO Fingal as the winner of the Fingal Enterprise Awards, and went on to scoop he Dublin Regional Award at the National final. PRM Assist based in Dublin Airport is a global leader in innovative Passenger with Reduced Mobility (PRM) services within airport environments.

The overall winner at the National Enterprise Awards was Dreamdev Technologies who are supported by Local Enterprise Office Kildare. This year's winners share a €50,000 investment fund.



Student Enterprise Programme

Loreto Secondary School, Balbriggan and Mount Sackville represented Fingal at this year's Student Enterprise Programme National Final which took place in Mullingar on May 9th. 81 businesses from across the country participated in the National Final with close to 28,000 students taking part nationally.

Registrations are now open for participation in the 2024/2025 Fingal Student Enterprise Programme.

# Fingal Enterprising Women Network

Over 140 female entrepreneurs attended the quarterly Fingal Enterprising Women Network event themed "Mind, Body and Business", on June 20th at the Portmarnock Resort Hotel. Dr. Sarah Murphy, a distinguished clinical doctor and GP, led an engaging discussion offering valuable insights for personal and professional well-being. This summer event was a great opportunity for Fingal's businesswomen to connect and gain valuable insights from shared experiences.

Meanwhile, LEO Fingal is making preparations to host the 2024 National Women's Enterprise Day which is scheduled to take place in the Crowne Plaza, Blanchardstown, on October 17<sup>th</sup>, to be hosted by Gráinne Seoige and featuring a stellar line-up of inspirational speakers.

# **Fingal Business Supports Briefings**



The monthly Fingal Business Supports Briefing series continued on May 7th & June 5<sup>th</sup> in the Riasc Centre Kinsealy. With over 50 small business owners & entrepreneurs in attendance at each session to hear about the supports available to them from the Local Enterprise Office and other state agencies. Presented by the LEO Fingal team, the next business supports briefing is scheduled for Wednesday, September 4th at the Riasc Centre, Kinsealy.

# **Food Supports**



LEO Fingal partnered with Champion Green, Maxol Ireland on Thursday 16<sup>th</sup> May to introduce Fingal businesses to the opportunity to have their products distributed through Maxol stores. The Homegrown Maxol programme accepts entries from various categories including ambient, confectionery, deli, hot foods, fresh produce, soft drinks, juices, smoothies, teas, health and fitness products, dairy, and alcohol. The initiative is aimed at Dublin-based food and drink producers.

Some 70 food producers from the Dublin Region participated in the opportunity.

Meanwhile, LEO Fingal is continuing to work through the Dublin Food Chain & South Dublin LEO to promote specialised training modules for Food and Drinks companies over the Summer months.

#### **Evaluations and Approvals Committee**

The Evaluation and Approvals Committee (EVAC) has approved €485,503 across 20 Business Feasibility, Priming and Expansion Grants to date in 2024. Nine Technical Assistance for Micro Exporters grants to the value of €22,500 and three Digital for Business grants amounting to €13,500 have been approved year to date. The next EVAC meeting will be held on 3<sup>rd</sup> July 2024.

#### **Management Development**



LEO Fingal established the Leadership for Business Acceleration Programme in 2023, to provide an opportunity for SME owner/managers to build on the necessary leadership skills and knowledge needed to successfully compete in existing, new and markets. international The latest "International Best Practice" training programme commenced on March 26<sup>th</sup>, concluding on May 21st and was delivered to small groups by way of onsite skills development workshops and online workshops. As part of the programme, the owner/manager participants each produce Work Based Assessments which document their strategic plan and acts as a living document as well as a point in time reference for where their business is now and the actions they need to take to grow. Applications for the Autumn Leadership for Business Acceleration Programme are now open.

#### **Energy Efficiency Grant Scheme**



Applications are open for the Energy Efficiency Grant Scheme, which enables small businesses to invest in technologies and equipment to make their businesses more energy efficient. The grant will cover up to 50% of the costs to a maximum amount of €5,000. The goal is to reduce the impact of small businesses on the environment and help them to reduce costs to enable them to become more competitive. As part of the process, applicants complete the Green for Business Programme, a customised initiative whereby the business develops a strategy to become sustainable. 2 applications totalling €10,000 have been approved year to date.

# **Trading Online Voucher Scheme**



An initiative under the Government's National Digital Strategy, the Trading Online Voucher (TOV) scheme supports small businesses by allowing them to enhance their online offering by providing a grant of up to  $\pounds$ 2,500 for ecommerce and digital marketing activities, as well as giving businesses a better understanding of how they can exploit E-Commerce opportunities for their business. A total of 55 applications have been approved in the amount of  $\pounds$ 122,379 to date in 2024. The next Trading Online Voucher webinar will be held online on Friday 5<sup>th</sup> July. New measures will be implemented soon to the TOV Scheme, bringing the scheme in line with updated LEO Digitalisation offerings.

#### **Business Advice Clinics and Mentoring**



LEO Fingal provides one to one business support services through Business Advice Clinics and a Mentoring programme, both online and in person. These services are provided free of charge to small businesses. The Fingal mentor panel consists of a variety of skilled and experienced mentors from a range of business backgrounds. So far this year, 380 clients have availed of one-to-one advice in our Business Advice Clinics. The Mentoring Programme has already seen 198 clients receiving expert mentoring so far this year.

#### **Microfinance Ireland Loans**

LEO Fingal provides a loan scheme through its partnership with Microfinance Ireland, with loans of up to €25,000 per approved applicant. LEO Fingal is actively promoting the availability of loans from businesses that have difficulty raising finance from their bank. Applications are processed and assessed by LEO Fingal and submitted to MFI (Microfinance Ireland). Applications submitted through LEO Fingal are eligible for a reduced interest rate. LEO Fingal has processed and submitted 15 MFI loan applications to date in 2024. A government decision in May 2024 will see a doubling of the maximum loan available from MFI funding, rising to €50,000.

#### **Training and Events**

LEO Fingal continues to provide needs-based management development training to Fingal owner/managers, with over 1,877 participants in training so far in 2024. A seventh SYOB started on 27th June 2024 with a total of 80 participants availing of this programme year to date.

Additionally, there have been three Social Media and Digital Marketing QQI courses with 34 participants year to date.

#### Internationalisation and Export Development



Five Fingal businesses are currently participating in the 2024 Export Development Programme. The purpose of this programme is to provide clients with the skills and the confidence to identify, target and exploit new business opportunities in the Benelux Region. The trade mission took place from 18<sup>th</sup> to 20<sup>th</sup> June with all clients travelling to Brussels. In addition, the TAME (Exporter) grant enables small businesses to explore and develop new market opportunities by providing up to €2,500 to businesses investigating and researching export markets. Eleven Fingal businesses have been approved for Export Grants (TAME) to date in the amount of €27,500. An online First Time Exporter workshop took place on 27 May 2024 with the aim of guiding clients through the essential steps of venturing into the world of exporting.

A new Export Development programme will commence in H2 2024 and will be rolled out throughout all 31 LEOs, targeting first-time exporters with national and local targets attaching.

# Fingal Grow Your Business (Fingal Business Expo)

A new Fingal Grow Your Business expo is planned as a collaborative initiative with Fingal Chamber on September 20<sup>th</sup>. LEO Fingal will organise a Business Supports Expo, one to one mentoring and a series of seminars, with the Chamber focusing on providing a Meet the Buyer segment. The event will be widely marketed to appeal to SMEs.









# Beaches and Lifeguard Service Lifeguard Service 2024


Fingal County Council sought to employ 45 beach lifeguards for the 2024 Bathing Season. However, following a rigorous recruitment process, for which we initially received 45 applications, the Council secured just 23 beach lifeguards for the bathing season.

We are currently seeking additional beach lifeguards and recently completed additional interviews on 19<sup>th</sup> June 2024.

The Water Safety Development Officer (WSDO) was in contact with water safety trainers, who have advised that the two-year closure of pools had a significant adverse impact on the training of potential candidates. It is noted that this is a national issue affecting numerous local authorities.

In the run –up to the recruitment campaign which commenced in February this year, the WSDO sent flyers to secondary schools and universities, and carried out recruitment talks at some of the schools in Fingal.









## **Licenses**


#### Road Opening Licenses

The Licensing unit continues to process and manage the licensing system for the County. Applications are allocated by area for examination and conditioning which includes reviews of the existing carriageway, footpaths, cycleways, and grass verges. Applicants submit temporary traffic management plans for review to ensure all works are carried out safely within the public domain. Road Opening Licences are a cross functional process for the department and are essential for the asset management of Fingal County Council Road network.

**148 Licences** were granted in the month of **June**, **40%** of which were granted by way of **automation**. Clerk of Works in each area continue to carry out regular inspections following road opening works by Utilities. Figures are accurate as of 19/06/2024.







#### Casual Trading License

Fingal County Council have a total of 32 valid Casual Trading Applications for 2024/2025 trading year throughout Fingal administrative area covering the trading of Hot Food Tea & Coffee/Ice Cream and Flowers.





## **Street Furniture Licences**





A total of 33 Street Furniture Licences have been issued in 2024 with a further three currently been processed.

To date in 2024 a total of 13 Street Furniture Inspections have been carried out so far with further planned over the summer months.

Any new street furniture applications will be dealt with on an ad hoc basis.

The Operations department continue to engage with businesses to ensure compliance from Street Furniture Licence holders.

# Surface Water

## Stormwater Capital Programme 2023-2025

Fingal County Council are continuing to progress projects recently adopted in the 2024-2026 Stormwater Capital Programme. The 3-year programme includes 17 projects estimated at  $\in$ 2.5 million with this figure under review as the projects are developed. Below is a brief update in relation to the status of some of the projects that have commenced and planned upcoming projects.

# Howth Stormwater Culvert

This project consists of the design and construction of a Stormwater culvert replacement on Howth main street (Work Package A) and the separation of a combined sewer on Tuckett's Lane. Howth (Work Package B). Optioneering and Investigation phases are complete for both Work packages and Preliminary design is completed for WPB. An updated programme is due from the Design Consultants.

# > Burrow Beach

The proposed remediation of the surface water outfall pipe has gone through all stages of design and various consents. A contract for the manufacture and delivery of precast concrete anchor blocks was awarded to Shay Murtagh. Placement of the anchor block units is scheduled for Spring 2025. Works will be executed by FCC Direct Labour with technical assistance to be provided by design consultants, Malachy Walsh and Partners.



#### - Lusk Network Remedial Works

The above project consists of Stormwater infrastructure provision and improvement in the Lusk urban area. It includes second level/follow up investigation, surveys, non-invasive interventions, jetting, root removal, pipe lining, replacement and new lay – using conventional cut and cover plus reinstatement of surface.



# Clonsilla/Mulhuddart Network Improvements

Following historical reports of flooding CCTV surveys were carried out to determine the condition of the Stormwater infrastructure in the **Rusheeney and Manorfield estates in D15**. Several large restrictions were found and a manhole was completely blocked with household waste. Robotic cutting equipment was used to clear the blockage and the network is now flowing freely. This also allowed facilitated a network survey to determine the route and discharge point. Additional repairs including part liner installation were carried out on collapsed sections along the same network. All works in this area are now complete.



## Carpenterstown Road SW Pipe Refurbishment


Following survey work and analysis in 2023, various remedial works were identified for sections of network along Carpenterstown Road. A Contractor was appointed in May to carry various remedial works including part liner repairs on damaged sections of the network along Carpenterstown Road. Works, predominantly overnight, to avoid disruption to pedestrians and road users, started in early June and are now complete. 36 m of roots were removed and 20 m of UV CIPP liners were installed along a section of 450mm concrete pipe.





## - Storm Water Maintenance

Maintenance of the network and much of the capital works programme is generated by inspections which are tabulated on a Works Planner. The types and volumes of issues reported are shown in the chart.



## - Storm Water Connections:

13 new connection applications including one diversion application have been processed to date in 2024.

## > Networks

#### Swords

CCTV Surveys were carried out on a section of network in the Balheary area close to Swords Business Park following historical reports of flooding. These showed that the line was heavily restricted with large volumes of aggregate and silt removed. Displaced joints and root ingress were identified which will require additional investment through root cutting and liner installations.

#### Lusk

Following reports of road flooding CCTV surveys were completed on a section of pipe along Old Schoolhouse Lane. It has been determined that this section of pipe must be replaced with a larger diameter pipe. The works will also require the installation of a new Headwall. Works are planned to commence in early July

## Malahide/Portmarnock

Chalfont – CCTV surveys were carried out in May in the Chalfont area of Malahide to ascertain the condition of the network within the estate and the cause of localised road flooding during periods of intense rainfall. These surveys are now complete, and the findings are being analyzed to determine the most appropriate type of repair required. It is envisaged that there will be a number of invasive and non-invasive repairs required.





Coill Dubh - Following reports of footpath flooding along the R124 surveys were taken of the local network. Following analysis of these surveys a number of areas were jetted to remove silt deposits and a CIPP Liner was installed to remove an area where there was a high level of groundwater infiltration.

#### Assets

#### Ironworks

The Stormwater manhole cover and frame replacement programme for replacing assets at the end of life is ongoing. A Contractor has been procured for on road manhole covers with works commencing in March. Off-road replacements were carried out by maintenance crews in the Balheary /Swords Business Campus area of Swords.

## - Underground Stormwater storage Assets

In recent years there has been a proliferation of underground storm water assets installed in developments to reduce the risk of future flooding. These will inevitably be taken in charge by the Council. Many require to be properly registered and a **process of identification and recording has begun county wide**. With new best practice guidelines in place these assets are expected to be phased out in future planning applications and should be replaced with above ground natural features. Below is an example of system employed to manage storm water on new developments



#### - Water Quality/Environment Enforcement

#### Seagrange Park

Assistance and engagement are being given by the Storm Water Unit to *Baldoyle Tidy Towns* who had secured funding for a Biodiversity project on the Seagrange Park stream, Baldoyle.

Samples were received in April indicating ongoing contamination of the storm network (High Ammonia etc)

Flow loggers will be installed on the waste water network to determine whether the "storm overflow" at Seagrange park is the main source of this contamination. These will be monitored for follow up action.



## **Clonsilla - Lambourne Road**

Following multiple reports of Malodours emanating from the local road gully network a series of surveys and die testing was conducted. It has been determined that several properties are incorrectly connected to the network. FCC Environment are now engaging with the properties to attempt to resolve the connection issues internally.

#### **Balbriggan - Clonard Court**

An underground survey was carried out in Clonard Court to identify the location of two buried manholes to assist FCC Environment with misconnection surveys being carried out in and around the Bracken River.

#### **Bridge Street**

Misconnection surveys are ongoing in the Bridge Street area to assist FCC environment with identifying the source of poor water quality samples in the Harbour area.

#### Meetings/Briefings

Briefing will be given to Howth/Malahide Councillors on the new public conveniences in Howth and Malahide Muldowney.



# Planning Applications

There have been 744 planning applications received from 1<sup>st</sup> January 2024 to 31<sup>st</sup> May 2024. This is including 158 E applications via the LGMA portal. 186 applications were invalid leaving a total of 558 valid applications. The volume of applications received by Local Electoral Area (LEA) is detailed in the table below.

From 1<sup>st</sup> January 2024 to 31<sup>st</sup> May 2024 there have been four Large-scale Residential Development (LRD) applications made to the Local Authority. From 1<sup>st</sup> January 2024 to 31<sup>st</sup> May 2024, 6 decisions have been made on Large Scale Residential Developments. Of these 6 decisions made, 4 have been to grant Permission (1,212 Units). 2 decisions have been made to refuse permission.

An Bord Pleanála have issued one decision on SHD applications in the period from 1<sup>st</sup> January 2024 to 31<sup>st</sup> May 2024, this decision was to refuse permission. There are now four SHD's (3,932 units) remaining with An Bord Pleanála for decision.





# Planning Decisions

A total of 557 planning decisions have been issued from 1<sup>st</sup> January 2024 to 31<sup>st</sup> May 2024. There have been 458 decisions to grant permission (82%) and 99 refusals of permission (18%). Included in the 458 grants there have been 38 grants of permissions in respect of single house construction, 266 grants of permission for domestic extensions/works, 47 commercial grants of permission, 9 retail grants of permission and 13 grants of permission in respect of housing developments. The breakdown of which is outlined in the table below.


# **Building Control Admin**

In April 2024, there were 241 building control submission's made via BCMS.

This was made up of 148 Commencement notices, 36 Compliance of Completion Certificates, 35 Fire Safety related Certificates and 22 Disability Access related Certificates.

Commencement notices and Compliance on Completion Certificates are submitted through the Projects module on BCMS. Fire Safety, Disability Access, Regularisation and Dispensation/Relaxation Certificate applications can be submitted online via the Applications module on BCMS and we are also still accepting hard copy applications directly into the office. Most applications are now being submitted via the online system.

The Building Control Admin team processed 204 decisions in April 2024 relating to Fire Safety and Disability Access Certificates. This was made up of 60 decisions to grant and 143 extensions of time and 1 refusal (DAC).




In May 2024, there were 128 building control submission's made via BCMS.

This was made up of 66 Commencement notices, 24 Compliance of Completion Certificates, 29 Fire Safety related Certificates and 9 Disability Access related Certificates.

Commencement notices and Compliance on Completion Certificates are submitted through the Projects module on BCMS. Fire Safety, Disability Access, Regularisation and Dispensation/Relaxation Certificate applications can be submitted online via the Applications module on BCMS and we are also still accepting hard copy applications directly into the office. Most applications are now being submitted via the online system.

The Building Control Admin team processed 219 decisions in May 2024 relating to Fire Safety and Disability Access Certificates. This was made up of 33 decisions to grant, 1 refusal (Dispensation) and 185 extensions of time.

# Local Area Plans, Masterplans and Framework Plans

In July, the first round of Plans falling out of the development plan was agreed. This comprises Swords and Flemington LAP's, the Dunsink Plan, Kilbarrack and the Old School House Masterplans and the Stephenstown, Folkstown and Clonsilla Framework Plans.

Work has begun on the Flemington Local Area Plan, the Clonsilla Framework Plan and the Old School House Masterplan.

# Residential Zoned Land Tax

The Residential Zoned Land Tax (RZLT) is a tax aimed at activating serviced and residentially zoned land for housing. Local authorities are responsible for identifying the land that is subject to RZLT.

On 1st February 2024, Fingal County Council published the annual draft maps for 2025 identifying land currently in scope for the tax, land proposed to be removed from the current scope and land proposed to be added for the first time. 37 submissions were received by the closing date for submissions (1st April 2024). All submissions received in relation to the annual draft map have been published on the Fingal Consultation Portal. Where a landowner requests the exclusion of their site from the annual draft map on the basis that it does not meet the criteria for being in scope or challenges the date from which land on the map met this criteria, the Local Authority must notify the owner of its decision not later than 1st July 2024.

An appeal of the Local Authority decision on a landowner's submission on the annual draft map, must be lodged by the landowner with An Bord Pleanála by 1st August 2024.

The second phase of the Residential Zoned Land Tax (RZLT) Annual Draft Map 2024 consultation remained open for landowners only seeking a land use zoning change. Submissions until 31st May 2024 (inclusive).

39 submissions were received in total and determinations issued by 1<sup>st</sup> July 2024

# **Built Environment Division**



- There were 19 no. Building Control Inspections in May 2024 with 44 no. buildings inspected and 11 no. inspections and 19 no. buildings inspected in June 2024 (so far).
- There were 4 no. section 11 requests for further information following building control inspections, issued in June and there have been no enforcement notices issued.
- There were 6 developments Taken in Charge in May 2024 namely, The Park in Skerries, Hyde Court in Rush, Lusk Village in Lusk, Thornleigh in Swords, Blackwood Estate in Ongar and Fairhaven in Castleknock.
- There are 3 developments (River Mall Laneway, The Elms Ridgewood and Ashfield Ridgewood) up for taking in charge in September/October meetings depending on the dates of the Area committee meetings.

## **Dangerous Structures**

• There were no dangerous structures notified in May 2023 and 1 dangerous structure notified in June 2024 (so far). There are a total of 99 dangerous structures active in our database.

# **Transportation Planning**

## PSI 001 Snugborough Interchange upgrade

Some elements of the Snugborough Interchange upgrade have been completed and were opened to the public during May and June. This includes new signalised junctions at Waterville and at the onramp for the N3, new traffic lanes, footpaths, and cycle tracks. The last element at road level to be completed will be the 5-arm junction and main street which will be completed in mid-July 2024 when the footpath and cycle track on the eastern bridge will open.

Due to the complexity of the underground services and the requirement for the watermain diversion works to be completed, the completion of the active travel corridors through the underpasses will form the last element of the works scheduled to be completed in September 2024. FCC have been working closely with Uisce Eireann to reach a solution to provide for the upgrade of a Watermain to ensure continued high quality and reliable supply to Blanchardstown and surrounding areas. www.snugboroughinterchange.ie



#### PSI 002 Ongar Barnhill Road

The beams for the new bridge over the railway line were placed during the June Bank Holiday weekend which marks a major milestone for the project. Embankment construction has continued to advance across the site with the section North of the rail line largely completed. Construction of the new layout north to the tie into Barnwell Roundabout is scheduled to be carried out during the summer months. During Q2/Q3 construction of the bridge deck will be completed with continuation of embankment construction across the site and associated drainage works. The latest updates for the scheme will be posted on www.fingal.ie/ongar-barnhill.





## PSI-039 R132 Connectivity Project

Consultation with the National Transport Authority and with Transport Infrastructure Ireland regarding the connection with Metro Link is ongoing with Monthly meetings. Detailed design stage is underway and progressing as programmed. Meetings continue to be held with the various department of Fingal County Council to gather information for detailed design.

The tender assessment for CCTV drainage contractor has taken place and the appointment of the CCTV contractor is currently underway. Outcome letters is currently being drafted for issue with appointment of the GI/GPR contractor expected to take place in July.

These survey Investigations will inform the below ground detailed design process and de-risk the project. The documentation (Suitability Assessment Questionnaire) for the stage 1 of the procurement process for the construction phase is currently being complied with a view to issue stage 1 in July.



# PSI-005 Harry Reynolds Road Pedestrian and Cyclist Route

Construction works are progressing on the Harry Reynolds Road Pedestrian and Cyclist Route for this key infrastructure project for Balbriggan. The Project is now approx. 70% completed. The work is ongoing and progressing well at three locations on the project on Hamilton Road, Harry Reynolds Road just south of the R122 and at Moylaragh Road. Works on the Dublin Roundabout are progressing with works to the third quadrant due to start before the end of June.



Another update project briefing will be arranged during the summer with the local Councillors for the Balbriggan Electoral Area, members of the Residents Associations and tidy town committee on the progress and remaining programme of works for the Harry Reynolds Road Pedestrian and Cyclist Route. A site visit has been organised for the 9<sup>th</sup> of July as a CPD event.

To assist with communication to the community a dedicated project website is setup which is updated throughout the project, highlighting the projects progression and key milestone stages; Harry Reynolds Road Pedestrian & Cycle Route | **Fingal County Council** 



# Consultancy Framework for Dublin 15 Walking and Cycling Projects

The Planning & Strategic Infrastructure Dept has commenced the procurement process for a Single Party Framework for Engineering Consultancy Services for Pedestrian and Cycling Route Projects in the Dublin 15 Area. The procurement process has now moved to Stage 2 with the tender assessment of the tender submissions taken place in May.

The outcome letters were issued in June and appointment of the consultant will take place in July. The Proposed projects will include the Clonsilla-Damastown Cycle Route and Pedestrian & Cycling Bridge at Granard Bridge Castleknock.

# PSI 063 Pedestrian and Cycling Bridge at Granard **Bridge Castleknock**

A tender was published recently for Engineering Consultancy Services for a Pedestrian and Cycling bridge over the Maynooth Rail line and Royal Canal at Granard Bridge on the Castleknock Road and will form an integral part of the walking and cycling route for Blanchardstown to Phoenix Park which is a proposed route in the NTA's Greater Dublin Area Cycle Network Plan. The tender forms part of the initial project for the Engineering Consultancy Services Framework for Dublin 15 Pedestrian and Cycling Route Projects which is currently at stage 2 of the procurement process. Following assessment of tender submissions outcome letters were issued in June with appointment of the consultant expected in July.

#### PSI – 004 Royal Canal Urban Greenway

Dialogue continues to be held with key stakeholders the National Transport Authority and Waterways Ireland along the route of the greenway to ensure a coordinated, high quality final design is achieved at interfaces between existing facilities and the proposed scheme.

The project is currently at preliminary design stage and requires the need to hold additional meetings with all the relevant key stakeholders to agree a revised design in lined with the new National Cycling Manual. These meetings will continue over the coming month to ensure a coordinated, high quality final design which compiles with the new cycling manual is achieved at interfaces between existing facilities and the proposed scheme. Landowner searches and land referencing are ongoing also.

Following completion of the preliminary design, all the required documents including the Environmental Impact Assessment Report will be prepared for a planning application to An Bord Pleanála.

## Sutton to Malahide Pedestrian and Cycle Scheme

The preliminary design drawings are being finalised. The recently published Cycle Design Manual has led to some improvements being incorporated into the overall scheme design including revised layouts for crossings and bus stops to comply with the new standards. A surveyor has recently completed topographical surveys of public and private lands within the proposed scheme. Ground Investigation Works are progressing along the route at all locations where new structures are being proposed. A tree surveyor has been procured and a survey of all trees along the proposed route will be carried out in the coming months. Following this process, the preliminary design can be finalised, and documents will be prepared for a planning application to An Bord Pleanála. Engagement with potentially impacted property owners, businesses and stakeholders is ongoing. A search of unregistered lands is ongoing for production of the deposit maps for the land acquisition. Draft documents are being prepared for the submission to An Bord Pleanála.




Ongoing Ground Investigations to inform the design of the structures along the route

#### Kinsealy Walking and Cycling Routes

The Kinsealy Walking and Cycling scheme aims to provide a high-quality walking and cycling route between Kinsealy and Portmarnock train station, and between Kinsealy and Malahide Castle and Gardens. The two walking and cycling routes will form a link from Kinsealy to sustainable transport at Portmarnock and Malahide Train Stations. The Planning & Strategic Infrastructure Department awarded a consultancy framework contract to Barry Transportation for this project.

The Options Selection phase is progressing on both routes from Kinsealy (north towards Malahide and east towards Portmarnock) and is due in August 2024. Traffic and topographical surveys on public lands have concluded and the various constraints along all route options are now being analyzed, this will lead to the Emerging Preferred Route (EPR). A public consultation strategy is being planned to progress from the EPR stage to the Preferred Route stage and the ensuing statutory process required to deliver this project.



#### Fingal Coastal Way

Meetings between the Independent Agronomist and affected landowners with farming, equestrian and horticultural businesses are now complete and the last few reports are being agreed with landowners. Site-specific issues and opportunities identified in the reports will be used to move towards agreement on the final position of the route during further consultation with the landowners.

Preliminary design work is progressing along urban roads. Updated traffic counts in Skerries and Rush took place in May.

Liaison with Irish Rail, Gas Networks Ireland and Eirgrid continues to ensure coordination of the proposed scheme with existing infrastructure and utilities.

#### Broadmeadow Way Greenway

Progress on the detailed design phases of the various elements that form the Broadmeadow Way project continue. Works contracts for Donabate landward, Malahide landward and the northern and southern causeways will take place in 2024, 2025 and 2026 respectively. It is expected that the greenway will be completed in 2026.

Design options for the northern causeway have been developed using ground investigation data from the ground investigation (GI) contract. A Design Workshop, hosted by Fingal County Council, took place with representatives from Irish Rail and the NTA. A decision was reached on how the estuary crossing should be designed to allow for the maintenance of the rock armour on the causeway.

The Foreshore unit in the Department of the Environment, Climate and Communications, has published the Notice of Determination that advises that the Minister has approved the granting of the Foreshore Lease, Licence and Consent.

On Friday, 31<sup>st</sup> May, representatives from Fingal County Council, the NTA and Irish Rail joined the Fingal Lord Mayor, Adrian Henchy and the Minister of Housing, Local Government and Heritage, Darragh O'Brien, in unveiling the foundation stone for the Broadmeadow Way at Bissett's Strand.

The OHLE mast strengthening works are substantially complete. The contractor, Global Rail, has demobilised but will be carrying out some additional work over the next 6-8 weeks. Jons, the Irish Rail Contractor for the main estuary bridge have mobilised and works on site are progressing. Preliminary works to prepare the weir for the arrival of the bridge spans and the Self-Propelled Multi-axle Transporter (SPMT) are currently underway. The contract for the manufacture and supply of precast concrete units for the 12-span 180m long precast bridge deck units was awarded to Shay Murtagh Precast Ltd. A trial assembly of four of the spans was undertaken Thursday, 13<sup>th</sup> June, at the Shay Murtagh premises in Limerick. Also on display were some of the precast units that will make up the southern ramp of the bridge.

# Church Fields Link Road

Works at the Church Fields Link Road and Cycle Network project, which includes the upgrade and reconfiguration of the existing Wellview Avenue, Damastown roundabout and the installation of 670m of high-quality pedestrian and cycling facilities through the eastern parklands linking up with existing networks and future proposed facilities in the vicinity, are progressing and nearing completion. Based on the Contractor's programme, the contract completion date is estimated as 30<sup>th</sup> July 2024.

# Turvey Avenue & Portrane Road, Donabate

Fingal County Council has lodged an application to An Bord Pleanála (ABP) for a Compulsory Purchase Order (CPO) for the Portrane Road Enhancement Project. Two landowner objections have been lodged with ABP in this regard. Further consultation regarding landowner concerns has resulted in one of the landowners withdrawing his objection. Consultation continues with the other landowner to try to reach an agreement. The project involves works to widen the existing narrow footpath on the northern side of Portrane Road in order to provide a suitably wide and safe footpath for pedestrians to use in the vicinity of two national schools (St. Patrick's Boys National School and Scoil Phádraic Cailíní). The project also involves works to provide safe pedestrian crossings and appropriate traffic calming facilities. Subject to approval from An Bord Pleanála, the CPO will allow Fingal County Council to purchase privately-owned land that is required to widen the path and deliver the project. Fingal County Council awaits the decision of An Bord Pleanála in this regard.

Separately, Priority Construction Ltd, working on behalf of Fingal County Council, has substantially completed work on the Turvey Avenue Footpath Enhancement project. A new footpath has been built on the northern side of the road where no footpath previously existed. The new footpath provides a continuous and safe walking route along Turvey Avenue for pedestrians travelling to and from Donabate Village and train station. The project also delivered drainage improvements, footpath improvements on an existing path nearby, road resurfacing, additional kerbing, line markings, speed ramps and signage, resulting in a significantly safer environment for all road users. The contractor working on behalf of Fingal County Council, Priority Construction Limited, is currently finishing off the remaining elements of the project, which include hedge planting, tree planting, installation of driveway gates at affected properties, etc. These elements of work are due to be completed this month.

## Donabate Pedestrian Bridge

Fingal County Council has appointed Jons Civil Engineering Limited, a highly experienced bridge construction company, to build the Donabate Pedestrian and Cycle Bridge over the Dublin to Belfast railway line, in Donabate. The new pedestrian and cycle bridge will facilitate greater connectivity between Newbridge Demesne, Donabate Village and Train Station and new residential developments on either side of the railway. The NTA has allocated funding for delivery of the project in 2024. Construction is expected to commence next month.

# Donabate Transport Projects

Fingal County Council has appointed Roughan and O'Donovan, a leading multi-disciplinary consultancy firm, to provide engineering, planning and environmental services for the Donabate Transport Projects, which comprise a number of major projects with the objective of improving transport and active travel infrastructure and road safety on the Donabate-Portrane peninsula. The projects include:

- Phase 2 of the Donabate Distributor Road project, to improve access to Donabate and Portrane from the M1-Lissenhall Interchange for all road users, particularly vulnerable road users such as pedestrians and cyclists;
- Blakes Cross Junction Upgrade, to provide a safer junction layout that caters for both motorised traffic and active travel modes of transport such as walking and cycling;
- A study of the M1-Lissenhall Interchange, in collaboration with TII, to assess all technical and operational traffic issues associated with this strategic motorway junction;

• 7no. Active Travel Routes which encompass a number of related local projects which aim to increase local connectivity for pedestrians and cyclists.

Work on the initial data-gathering, concept development and option assessment stages of the Donabate Transport Projects is underway including topographical surveys of relevant areas of Donabate.

Fingal County Council and Roughan and O'Donovan are liaising with Transport Infrastructure Ireland to complete the study of the M1-Lissenhall Interchange. Separately, a number of potential route options have been identified for Phase 2 of the Donabate Distributor Road. These options are shown below and are currently being assessed to determine the preferred route. Once the preferred route is established, a non-statutory public consultation will be held, most likely in Q4 2024.



Further stages of work, relating to environmental assessment, planning consent, etc. will follow on in subsequent years as appropriate.

# Construction of Howth Harbour Playground

A recent milestone has been the installation of the wide range of equipment. In the coming weeks, work will focus on safety surfacing and boundary treatments.

The design of the playground is guided by the promotion and encouragement of imaginative play. This has been achieved by combining traditional play pieces, predominantly made of timber, with natural elements such as mounds, boulders, logs and water features. The goal is to provide inclusive, imaginative, adventurous, social, natural, sensory, and educational play opportunities for children of all ages. The diverse range of materials and equipment is arranged to compliment the character of Howth Harbour.

It is anticipated that this exciting new play space will be ready for opening in August, providing a valuable amenity for the community of Howth and beyond.

# **Cyclical Maintenance - Scheme Painting**

The Scheme Painting Programme provides for external painting and joinery repairs to Council housing stock and currently operates on a 6/7-year cycle. Works are currently reaching completion in Pinewood Heath, works are ongoing in Pinewood Green, and Brega in Balbriggan. Works will commence next week in Curran Park, Clonard Court and Rise and Grace O'Malley Drive and Road.

# Housing Assistance Payment (HAP)

HAP continues to be the primary source of rent support for those in private rented accommodation. Fingal County Council has set up over 160 new tenancies in 2024 to date with approximately 4087 tenancies set up since HAP began in 2017.

The HAP team is on hand to deal with any queries from applicants and landlords in person at the Housing Department in the Fingal County Council Blanchardstown Office, by phone at 01 8905000 via the CCU or through email at hap@fingal.ie.

# <u>Rents</u>

The Rent Arrears team is working methodically through accounts in substantial arrears to encourage tenants to engage with the Council in reducing their arrears. In cases where there is no engagement, despite repeated efforts, proceedings will progress through the legal arena, and to date, the Rents Section has secured two Possession Orders with 4 other Tenancies continuing through the court process in November 2024. We have recently resolved two cases to a satisfactory conclusion for both the tenant and the council. Regarding the two possession orders secured, both tenants are engaging with the team to address their arrears.

The Rents team encourages any tenant who is having trouble paying their rent to engage with the Council to examine possible solutions. However, there are instances where tenants do not engage or make alternative payment arrangements, and, in those situations, the Council needs to take further action.

#### **Housing Loans**

The Local Authority Home Loan (LAHL) is a government-backed mortgage for first-time buyers and certain other applicants who are unable to obtain home loan financing from a commercial lender. Interest rates are fixed for the term of the loan and loan terms are available for up to 30 years. The LAHL can be used to purchase new-build homes (including affordable homes); second-hand homes & self-build.

# **Eligibility Criteria:**

- Income Limit Single Applicant = 70,000 / Joint Applicants = 85,000
- Employment 2 years continuous employment / if joint application with a second earner, second earner to be 1-year continuous employment
- **Residency** legal right to live & work in Ireland & be habitually resident in Ireland
- Insufficient Offers of finance from 2 commercial lenders
- 10% Deposit 3% to come from own resource savings
- Satisfactory savings record
- Fresh Start Principle

#### **Housing Loan Arrears**

Borrowers who are struggling to repay their housing loan are encouraged to contact the Mortgage Support Team at the earliest

opportunity to examine & agree the best solution for them. Various options are available to borrowers in mortgage arrears under the Mortgage Arrears Resolution Process (MARP). Failure to contact the Team will leave the Council with no option but to progress the matter further.

# **Private Rented Inspections**

The Department of Housing Local Government and Heritage (DHLGH) have released 2024 targets for inspection of private rented dwellings. The most recent RTB data available to the DHLGH, which includes private rental, AHB and, where appropriate, student-specific accommodation, indicates that the number of tenancies to be inspected by Fingal County Council in 2024 is 4,711. Currently, 2,670 inspections have been conducted in 2024, with 450 inspections carried out in June. Of the 2,670 inspections, 2,334 dwellings were inspected. The team continue to work on this target and improving compliance.

#### **Housing Support and Housing Position**










The above chart depicts the total number of properties allocated since the beginning of 2024.

#### **Homeless Exits 2024**

During May and June 2024, 47 households exited homeless circumstances into various forms of social housing support - including privately rented tenancies under the Homeless HAP Scheme.

Please see the table below for a breakdown of the figures:

There was a total of 23 homeless prevention cases and 15 who exited emergency accommodation comprising:

3 allocations of social housing support to homeless prevention cases, 6 who exited emergency accommodation and 8 from Homeless HAP Tenancies.

30 Homeless HAP tenancies, comprising 20 homeless preventions and 9 who exited emergency accommodation and one from Direct Provision.


# **Homeless Assessments**

Fingal's Homeless Team continues to engage with those experiencing homelessness to offer advice and support. Homeless Assessments continued to be carried out.



In May 2024, there were a total of 80 full homeless assessments completed – comprising 45 families and 34 singles/couples.

In June to date 2024, there were a total of 65 full homeless assessments completed – comprising 29 families and 36 singles/couples.



During May and June 2024, of the 145 Homeless Assessments carried out, 30% cases resulted from a Notice to Quit (NTQ) having been served. Most of the other presentations to the Homeless Section are from Direct Provision (24%), family/relationship breakdown (13%), living in overcrowded conditions (7%) who state that they cannot/will not return to the property. The remaining 26% comprise various reasons outlined in the chart below;



# Emergency Accommodation (including Fingal County Council Family Hubs)

There continues to be a high demand for Emergency Accommodation across the region for both families and individuals.

# **Rough Sleepers**

The Homeless Services Team continues to liaise with the DRHE Outreach Team regarding any reports of rough sleeping, to establish their names and circumstances and to offer support. Regrettably, some rough sleepers are reluctant to engage with service providers and may refuse offers to access emergency accommodation.

Any rough sleeper who is willing to engage with the Outreach Team and/ or the Council will be assisted.

The Council will carry out homeless assessments and every effort is made to encourage them to avail of homeless services.

A weekly Rough Sleepers Coordination Group monitors the reports of rough sleepers. The reports come from various outlets, including the DRHE Outreach Team, Elected Representatives, the FCC Operations Department, and the general public.

There have been 31 reported rough sleeping cases in 2024.

6 of the clients have taken up Emergency Accommodation and we continue to work with 2 others in an effort to provide a suitable solution.

There are currently 4 registered long term entrenched rough sleepers (1 couple and 2 males). The couple and 1 male have been nominated to Housing First tenancies in March 2024. We continue to work with the last client in an effort to secure him long term accommodation.

# Dublin Street Outreach Service Tel: 01 872 0185 from 7 am to 1 am

The DRHE in partnership with Dublin Simon. Outreach and the PMVT Intake team are assertively working on the streets offering accommodation to all rough sleepers. The teams are very familiar with the locations of people sleeping rough across the Dublin Region and persistently work with individuals to support them into emergency accommodation. This process can take time and multiple contacts, as some people do not want to engage but the teams persevere with every person working to achieve a successful outcome.

The service operates 365 days a year, until 1 am. The Outreach Teams also ensure that people sleeping rough are linked with other appropriate health services such as addiction and mental health services to prevent further rough sleeping. PMVT's Housing First Intake team links rough sleepers to permanent accommodation with longterm support.

All emergency accommodation is now 24-hour, with food and shower facilities provided.

# National Housing Strategy for Disabled People 2022-2027 Implementation Plan

Action 1.2.2 of the National Housing Strategy for Disabled People 2022-2027 Implementation Plan states that Local authorities and the HSE must work together to plan and deliver on housing targets for disabled people in the community (including decongregation) in line with the forthcoming Disability Services Action Plan.

The HSE Mental Health Housing Coordinator from Parkgate Hall liaises with the Homeless Services Team on a monthly basis.

Currently 12 Fingal County Council clients have been identified, three have been housed and two more are going through the nomination process

#### Homeless Action Plan 2022- 2024

The DRHE, with the approval of all 4 local authorities in the Dublin region, has finalised the Homeless Action Plan Framework for Dublin 2022-2024. This Plan is the first plan to be put into operation since Ireland signed the Lisbon Declaration on combatting homelessness in June 2021, which aims to end homelessness by 2030.

It will follow on from the previous Homeless Action Plan for 2019- 2021 and continues with the three key themes of **Prevention**, **Protection and Progression**.

The Plan was developed based on a detailed consultative process including submissions from various Stakeholders, interested organisations, Service Providers, Members of SPCs of the four Local Authorities, the Dublin Joint Homelessness Consultative Forum and the Statutory Management Group.

# Preventing Homelessness, Notices to Quit and Tenant In-situ Acquisitions

Fingal County Council is aware that households in the Fingal area who may have received a notice to quit, which is also referred to as a notice of termination, from their landlord may be worried or unsure of what to do.

Fingal County Council and the Dublin Regional Homeless Executive (DRHE) would like to advise anyone affected of the services that are available to them in these circumstances.

We strongly encourage tenants residing in the Fingal area, who have been issued with a notice of termination, to contact Fingal County Council as soon as they receive a notice from their landlord.

The contact details for Fingal County Council are provided at the bottom of this page.

When the tenants contact Fingal County Council, staff in the Housing Department will take note of the termination date.

The Council advises the tenant to refer the notice to Threshold, a service funded by the DRHE to provide a Tenancy Protection Service for private renters in the Dublin Region, including Fingal. Threshold can also be contacted directly on Freephone 1800 454 454 or via their website <u>www.threshold.ie</u> which contains more information and advice on the validity of your notice.

The Council's first response will be to try to prevent homelessness. This includes assessing the person's position on the social housing list, providing advice on applying for Choice Based Lettings, advising the person on the level of Housing Assistance Payment (HAP) they may be eligible to receive, and, in some cases, assessing if the Council can acquire the dwelling where the tenants reside if it is being offered for sale.

Placement in emergency accommodation will be a last resort if no other alternative can be identified.

The Council has been engaging with tenants who have been issued with a notice of termination, as well as their landlords, and following assessment, 272 tenant in-situ properties are at the sale closed stage. A total of 97 properties are at the sale agreed stage with a further 43 cases in the negotiation process. In addition, the Council is assessing a further 314 queries concerning notices of termination and tenant-in-situ acquisition.

The Council will continue to deal with notice of termination queries and cases as expeditiously as possible and progress tenant in-situ acquisitions while taking account of circulars and guidance issued by the Department of Housing, Local Government and Heritage.

Fingal County Council continues to liaise with other Dublin and neighboring local authorities to deal with tenancy issues that may require an interauthority approach. In particular, we are working closely with our colleagues in the other Dublin Local Authorities on the implementation of the Government policy and guidance, with a focus on the needs of tenants. Whilst the Council will, in the context of current circumstances, adopt flexibility in dealing with potential acquisitions of properties with tenants in situ, any acquisition is subject to appropriate due diligence and checks before any commitment is made to acquire, including, for example, determining that a valid notice of termination is in place, the tenant has a social housing need, and the condition and valuation of the property.

The Government has put forward options to allow tenants who are not eligible for social housing to remain in their homes, including schemes to support the purchase of homes and a Cost Rental in-situ Scheme. The Cost Rental Tenant-in-Situ Scheme is available for tenants who are not eligible for social housing and are at risk of homelessness. The DHLGH has advised that local authorities are to be the first point of contact for this scheme, but it is managed by the Housing Agency. Under the scheme, the Housing Agency can purchase a property and rent it to the tenant. Fingal County Council will undertake an initial assessment of the tenant's circumstances and refer details to the Housing Agency for consideration, where the tenant is at risk of homelessness and the Cost Rental Tenant-in-Situ scheme applies. The Housing Agency will then contact the landlord about the purchase of the property.

Where a tenant wishes to purchase their home from the landlord, local authorities can provide advice about the Local Authority Home Loan scheme. The Government is examining implementing a 'right of first refusal' for tenants to purchase their homes, as well as expanding the First Home shared equity scheme. The Council will be able to provide more information on these when available.

Works around preventing homelessness, assessing notices of termination, and responding to tenant and landlord in-situ queries are being led on by the Council's Homelessness section, taking a tenant-centred approach, supported by staff dedicated to dealing with tenant in-situ housing acquisitions.

# **Traveller Accommodation Programme**

Refurbishment works to the 5 Bay Halting Site at St Brigid's Lawns, Porterstown, Dublin 15 is ongoing. Works include replacing the existing welfare units with new modern units and upgrades to the onsite utilities.

Refurbishment work to 3 houses at St Philomena's Court are also near completion. Works include provision of new heating systems, kitchens and bathrooms.

Work has begun preparing the Draft Traveller Accommodation Programme 2025 – 2029. Letters of intent have been issued to relevant stakeholders with further engagement anticipated to take place over the coming weeks, with public consultation anticipated to take place regarding the Draft Plan during Summer 2024.

Regular site visits by Housing Inspectors continue all Fingal County Council Traveller specific sites while checking on vulnerable residents and advising on the continued support available. Council officials continue to liaise and engage with the Traveller Community, Traveller Advocacy Groups, Welfare Services, Child Services, Mental Health Services and other services and agencies to resolve issues when and where possible.



The Council's Community Integration Forum continues to meet regularly to co-ordinate the response of the various statutory agencies and voluntary groups in the county to assist the Ukraine community with the most recent meeting held on the 25th of June 2024.

The Forum was originally tasked with assisting the Ukrainian Beneficiaries of Temporary Protection. However, taking into account Departmental guidance and the work of Council's newly formed Local Authority Integration Team (LAIT) in assisting the target cohorts below the remit of the Forum has expanded to include

- 1. Applicants for International Protection (IP Applicants)
- 2. Those with Refugee, Subsidiary Protection, or Permission to Remain status
- 3. Programme Refugees
- 4. Beneficiaries of Temporary Accommodation (BOTPs).

### Vacant Homes

The Vacant Homes Team continues to engage with owners of vacant properties to encourage owners to bring them back into use and advise of schemes that are available to assist this with on-going follow up of properties reported as vacant to the Council and those identified by way of survey.

Note the **Vacant Homes Team** have also recently taken possession of a vacant residential property by way of Compulsory Purchase Order (CPO) with a further 3 vacant residential properties referred to the Property Department to initiate the statutory CPO process.

The Croí Cónaithe Refurbishment Grant Scheme is in utilisation to address vacancy and assist citizens in getting a home with increasing enquiries, applications, and grant approvals.

Croí Cónaithe Vacant Homes Refurbishment Grant On the 1st May 2023, the scheme was further extended with the eligibility criteria now allowing for properties built pre-2008 to qualify and grants increasing to  $\notin$ 50k (vacant) and  $\notin$ 70k (vacant and derelict) with all areas of the County covered.

The expansion of scheme also allows for a grant for approved properties to be rented on the private market when refurbishment is complete. Before this change, the grant-approved property had to be the principal private residence of the applicant. 142 applications have been received under the scheme with an increasing flow of new applications. 79 applications have been approved with further applications moving to the approval stage.

In addition, staff are engaging with numerous other expressions of interest which have the potential to lead to further applications.

Promotion of the scheme is ongoing by the Vacant Homes Team who have been present at various Housing Information Events most recently at Donabate Golf Club on the 7th March 2024 and a promotional stand was present at the Flavours of Fingal Show in the Fingal Tented Village on the 29\30th June.

#### **Community Development Office**

**Community development** is a process where community members come together to take collective action and generate solutions to common problems. Community wellbeing, economic, social, environmental and cultural challenges are often solved through collective action being taken at a grassroots level. Community development ranges from small initiatives within a local group to large initiatives that involve the broader community.

Building community capacity, strengthening community participation, and involving people in decisions that affect their lives is a complex process and can only be achieved by working with local communities and agencies who have responsibility to the people in those communities. In May/June the Community Development Office worked in partnership with a number of community groups and partners to support many projects/Initiatives including;

# A Sip of Support – New Grief Support Group in Swords

Fingal Community Development Office is delighted to support *"A Sip of Support"*. This new support group came about because of the need bring together members of the community who have lost a loved one and are grieving. The group held their first meeting in the September 2023 and the committee recorded a podcast with the "Everywhere we go – Journey into Heartbreak" in November 2023. Approximately 150 people have come to the group over this 8-month period and are benefiting from the peer-to-peer support this offered by the group.



# **Holywell Residents Association**

On 15<sup>th</sup> June 2024, Holywell Residents Association in Swords undertook to create three fabulous planters which are situated at the entrance to Holywell Park. The group also planted flowers and shrubs on the four roundabouts in Holywell. They also carried up a clearing action to remove weeds from the carpark near the public park. A local fund-raiser was organised and publicised locally with support from businesses in the area who donated prizes. A Family Day also took place as part of the activities plan of the Holywell Development Group, supported by the FCC Community Development Office.



# Disability Federation of Ireland and Prosper Fingal Hustings Event

The #EveryVoteCounts Project, by Disability Federation of Ireland, with partners Prosper Fingal in Swords and the Blanchardstown Centre for Independent Living, hosted hustings workshops for people with disabilities in Swords and Blanchardstown. The workshops were supported by the Community Development Office.

Nine local election candidates took part in a questions and answers hustings event at Prosper Fingal, Seatown Road to support voters with disabilities and allow them to raise their critical issues on topics such as jobs, transport public realm, living with dignity and appropriate community facilities.



#### Mega Mila Festival – Alsaa

On Saturday 1<sup>st</sup> June 2024 the cultural and colourful Mega Mela festival took place in Alsaa, Swords. This event was organised by the Malaysian Indians of Ireland. There was chess, carrom, art competitions, tasty food, dancing, a very competitive tug-of-war competition with 16 teams from all over Ireland from Enniscorthy to Drogheda. Fashion stalls, with colourful saris and beautifully ornate jewellery and delicious food, especially the mango lassi. The Mayor of Fingal Cllr. Adrian Henchy lit the inaugural lamp and welcomed everyone to the festival in the company of Jack Chambers TD, and Barry Andrews EP and Indian Actress Anu Sithara. There was something for everyone.





#### **Prioritising Mulhuddart Meeting**

The second meeting of the Prioritising Mulhuddart stakeholders took place on 13<sup>th</sup> of June 2024. The meeting was coordinated and supported by the Community Development Office. There was great turnout from varying service providers and agencies, who discussed potential collaboration opportunities, local issues, and practical solutions. The next meeting is set for 12<sup>th</sup> September 2024. Going forward, each meeting will feature a presentation from one service provider to highlight their work, followed by updates from all other stakeholders and discussing local issues.

#### Meakstown Community Centre Updates



On 14<sup>th</sup> June 2024, the new Board of Management of Meakstown Community Centre carried out a site visit to the new community centre. The purpose of the visit was to give the Board a clear understanding of the available space, aiding in the development of a plan for community use once the centre opens. Meanwhile, a subgroup of Meakstown residents has finalised a research brief for an updated Needs Analysis of the area. Together with the site visit, this analysis will equip the Board of Management with a solid foundation to allocate community space in line with local needs when the centre opens later this year.

#### Safer Together Festival Blanchardstown



The Community Development Office participated in the recent Safer Together Festival in Blanchardstown on 7<sup>th</sup> June 2024. The good weather provided an excellent opportunity to engage with community members and network with other local service providers, helping to identify potential projects for the coming months.

#### Mourne 50



The Mourne Estate Development Working group are continuing with the 'Mourne 50' project to celebrate the 50<sup>th</sup> year of Mourne Estate in Skerries. A Street Feast took place at Mourne Grove on 25<sup>th</sup> May 2024 with music, face-painting and an appearance of the Sam Maguire. The celebrations were greatly enhanced by a home win for Mourne Celtic FC which won them a League title.

Mourne Celtic FC, Mourne Estate Residents Association and Foróige are key stakeholders in the project and together with the Community Development office, Local Councillors and Scoil Realt Na Mara, are now planning the estate Family Fun Day on 20<sup>th</sup> July 2024 which will include children's activities, music, a memorial soccer tournament and an official launch of the new wall designed and built at the front of the estate, which was a collaboration between the residents and FCC Operations department.

# The Bold Woman Conference 2024 – Progressive You



The annual Bold Woman Conference took place on 4th May 2024 in the Radisson Hotel at Dublin Airport. The theme this year was Progressive You, with guest speakers on the day including inspiring Dr. Ireti Oghuvbu, Seyi Agbede the first primary school teacher of colour in Ireland.

A financial matters talk was given by Tolulope S. Olaniyan and a panel discussion on community engagement with Fingal Community Officer Jacinta Lowndes included on the panel.

The Bold Woman group is a celebration of women in Ireland of African descent and continue to grow under the leadership of Nike Adesemowo.



Fingal Men's Sheds Walk and Talk



Fingal Men's Sheds Association acknowledged Men's Health Week in June by hosting a walk and talk Slí event at Newbridge House and Gardens, Donabate. The member groups embarked on a choice of a walking routes (1km, 2km or 3km) and had the opportunity to converse with fellow group members and those from other Sheds who participated. Members from over 12 Men's Shed groups from Fingal took part. Refreshments and music were enjoyed in the Walled Garden afterwards. #### Pride of Place 2024



**Summer Projects**

By funding these initiatives, the Community Development Office not only supports the development of important life skills but also promotes a sense of community and belonging for young people.

**Baldoyle Community Centre** 



On Thursday, 30<sup>th</sup> May, the official sod turning event for the new Baldoyle Community Centre took place. With a similar design to the centre currently under construction in Meakstown, the state-of-the-art facility will provide high-quality community facilities for this area, new and old. The event was attended by the Mayor and Chief Executive of Fingal County Council, elected members from the Howth & Baldoyle areas, staff from the Community Development Office and representatives of the many vibrant sporting and community groups in the area who will make use of this fantastic facility which will be completed by 2025.

#### Interagency

The Community Development office actively seek to work in collaboration with agencies to maximise service delivery and resources to communities In May/June the CDO supported the delivery of the following:

#### Fingal Festival in a Van – Sounds Like Summer



Fingal festival in a Van is a co-production between the Community Office, Libraries/Creative Ireland and the Festival in a Van organisation.

Music and poetry were enjoyed by 12 communities across the county as the Van rocked up and locals from community groups, direct provision centres, Ukrainian rest Centres and users of Fingal's public park took part in the pop-up festival. Piloted last year in the North County, the project visited every corner of the county this summer, from Balbriggan to Balseskin and from Corduff to Howth.

Artists taking part included rapper Jyellowl, folk singer Niamh Bury, poet Paula Meehan and spoken word artist Trudy Gorman, to name a few. The tour started at Prosper Fingal, Swords and ended two weeks later in Baldoyle Community Garden.

#### **Fingal Volunteer Week**

Fingal Volunteer Week took place from 20<sup>th</sup> – 26<sup>th</sup> of May. There were three roadshow events in Fingal during the week in Baldoyle, Balbriggan Swords Castle Chapel. The Community Development Office works collaboratively with Fingal Volunteer Centre to promote opportunities to volunteer in the community, as well as being a platform for community groups and organisations to request and post for support and help through Ivol, the volunteer centre's database.

# Africa Day 2024



Africa Day was celebrated across the county on Saturday 25<sup>th</sup> May 2024 with four events supported by the Community Department with funding from the Department of Foreign Affairs/Irish Aid.

African Advocacy Network Ireland celebrated Africa Day in Corduff Resource Centre with traditional dance performances from East Nigeria, music by Ghanaian artist Benjamin Dey and an award ceremony to acknowledge community members for their contribution to a positive image to Irish society.

Lusk Community Council and the Redeemed Christian Church of God held an exhibition linked to Africa, A Taste of African food, African music, and dance as well as a podcast on "Irish African Voices". Balbriggan African Community celebrated with an event in Flemington Community Centre with traditional African poetry, music, food and costume with presentations by two Youth Motivational Speakers. Fingal Ethnic Network held an event in Blakestown Community Centre to showcase different cultures through music, food, and discussions.



#### Fingal Comhairle Na nÓg

Comhairle na nOg are child and youth Councils in 31 local authorities, which give children and young people the opportunity to be involved in the development of local services and policy decisions.



The group are busy working on their project about Youth Spaces in Fingal. One member is part of the Road Safety Youth Forum. 7 members took part in a consultation with 'A Lust for Life', a new mental health charity which aims to change how we talk about and treat mental health in Ireland. The charity is developing a new Youth Summit, to create change in schools.

1 member has been nominated to be part of the National LGBTI+ Inclusion Strategy Youth Advisory Group. Some of the group took part in the Youth Vote 2024.

Several members took part in a Hustings event prior to the Local and European Elections in Foróige Balbriggan Youth Project alongside Foróige young people, where they had discussions with local councillors Cllr. Brendan Ryan, Cllr. Karen Power and Deputy Mayor Cllr. Gráinne Maguire.

#### Public Participation Network (PPN)

Fingal Public Participation Network (PPN) is a network of community, voluntary, social inclusion and environmental organisations, working to build a better county for the community of Fingal.

The PPN ran a summer school in DCU for four days from 27<sup>th</sup> to 30<sup>th</sup> May, with daytime sessions inperson and evening sessions online, it included all Dublin-based Public Participation Networks; Dublin City, Fingal, Dun Laoghaire-Rathdown and South Dublin.

The workshops covered a variety of topics and were chosen in collaboration with the PPN coordinators to strengthen PPN members to affect and advocate for positive change in their communities. This year's Summer School also offered all Dublin-based PPNs and their members a chance to network and learn from each other. Sessions covered were:

### Hello, How Are You Day with Thrive Swords

A colourful stand in the Pavillions Shopping Centre, attracted many visitors to find out about the Thrive Swords Mental Health Project which follows in the footsteps of the Thrive Balbriggan project – aiming to make both towns Mentally Healthy Communities. The Community Development Office is continuing to engage with Mental Health Ireland, local stakeholders and community groups and residents to support Swords Thrive! Several meetings have taken place and potential initiatives and events are being planned as we speak – watch this space for more updates.

# Local Authority Integration Team (LAIT)

The role of the Local Authority Integration Team (LAIT) is to provide ongoing integration supports to International Protection (IP) applicants, Programme Refugees and Beneficiaries of Temporary Protection (BOTP) to enable them to live independently in the community.

The LAIT Team is completing their current round of meetings with accommodation centre managers and stakeholders during June which will facilitate the prioritisation of centres by the team and allow clinics to commence.

The Ukrainian Network is facilitated and convened by the Integration Team. The Network met on Tuesday 25<sup>th</sup> June 2024, the meeting included presentations and updates from all the members on their work and any issues discussed.



#### Age Friendly Fingal

Age Friendly Fingal is committed, through this strategy, to driving a collaborative, multisectoral approach which supports interventions that will significantly help to improve the quality of life of the current population of older people in Fingal and future generations.

#### **OPC Annual Conference**



130 representatives from 'senior' groups across Fingal attended the OPC's Annual Conference on 21<sup>st</sup> May 2024 in Kettles Country House Hotel. The Conference, which was opened by the Mayor of Fingal, Cllr Adrian Henchy covered two themes: Housing in Fingal and Decisions Supports within the HSE. Housing presentations were provided by Fingal County Council's Aoife Lawler, Carmel Brennan and Danielle Monahan on Housing Options in Fingal, Age Friendly Design and Ageing in Place, respectively. The informative presentations were well received by delegates who were delighted to know that their needs were being considered in new housing developments in Fingal.

Presentations from the HSE's Ciara Palmer, Jacqueline Grogan and Geraldine Farren focused on the Assisted Decision Making (Capacity) Act 2015 and the move to a human right centered approach, supports available in acute settings and advance healthcare directive. The presentations highlighted the guiding principles underlying this legislation, with the presumption that everyone can make decisions about their own lives. Delegates were reminded that we all make unwise decisions throughout our life, but this does not affect our capacity to make decisions.

Following a thought-provoking morning, the afternoon provided mental relief as delegates danced to the music of Joe Mann. It was obvious from the dancing that some delegates acted upon the information provided by speakers and made their own decision to forgo the walking sticks and join in the dancing. For them it was a wise decision and for one delegate it felt like "a weight had been lifted" from his shoulders and it was best time he has had in years!

# Fingal Age Friendly Strategy (2025)

Work is underway on developing the Fingal Age Friendly Strategy with consultations with older people and key stakeholders taking place throughout June and July. An online survey will be promoted alongside hard copies being made available to inform the strategy.

Consultants will also attend key Council Events such as Vintage Picnic and Flavours of Fingal to seek the views of older people on how to ensure Fingal remains a wonderful place to grow old. They will ascertain the challenges faced by older residents of Fingal and how these challenges can be addressed through policy and action plans. The completed Strategy is expected to be available for approval by year end.

# EU KORALE PROJECT – Tackling Loneliness in the community


The Community Development Office has been selected to take part a four-year EU KORALE project involving a consortium of six European Countries who will focus on preventing and tackling loneliness in their communities through public policy. This European funded Interreg project aims to improve public policies by exchanging good practices and integrating ultifaceted approaches to address and prevent loneliness across Europe.

Following the online kickoff meeting in April, the inaugural meeting of the KORALE partner countries took place last week in Donostia/San Sebastian, with members of the Fingal team actively participating throughout the various meetings and events where concepts and workplans were progressed. KORALE will span four years and its outputs include the publication of **24 good practices** and a **KORALE Policy Guide**.

### Active Travel

# Protected Cycle Lanes:

#### **BLRS Area:**

#### **R132 Blakes Cross to Quickpenny Lane**

Works on the R132 have progressed well over recent weeks with the final surfaces applied the Contractor has been carrying out some of the snagging items along the route. The final lining and road markings are currently being applied when weather conditions are suitable. The installation of the bollards and lane separator's is ongoing with the contractor working from the south of the project in a northerly direction. The area at Corduff School with the SRTS treatment has taken shape and really defines the area where the reduced periodic speed limit applies, and the traffic calming takes effect. Some remaining items in this area to be completed is additional signage and advanced warning of school zone.





#### Seatown Road Swords:

The Engineering Consultant and Project Team are currently working to finalise the tender documents and gateway reports that are required to be submitted to the NTA in advance of going to the tender and procurement process for the appointment of a contractor to carry out the works. The project team are working towards going to the market in the coming months for a Contractor to progress to the Construction stage in 2024, subject to NTA approvals.

#### **Donabate Portrane R126 cycle paths:**

The Project Team is currently working with our property section to progress the potential acquisition of lands along a section of the route to facilitate the progression of the proposed walking and cycling infrastructure from the end of the distributor road in Donabate along the R126 through to the coast at Portrane.

Full options report together with the preferred option is being drafted at present and this will be presented to the members and internal department later this year.

#### Coney Hill Balbriggan R132 cycle paths:

The Engineering Consultant is currently working with the Project Team to finalise concept designs and options report to assist with stakeholder engagement. Further Topographical Surveys are underway to assist with the decision-making process on the preferred option.

This is a complex section of road as the road widths are narrow and confined. All options are being considered at present so that the preferred option can be established. Further details will be presented to Cllr's later in the year.

### St Cronan's Brackenstown Road Cycle lanes:

The contractor has been back on site to complete the outstanding works at the Murrough Road Rathbeale Road Junction. These works included tie in of the cycle lanes from the Murrough Road into the Rathbeale Road. New drop kerbs and road markings to provide safe transition for cyclists and vulnerable road users from the on-road cycle facilities onto the off-road cycle facilities on the Rathbeale Road. These works are close to completion together with other snag items on this project. This project is now in the close out phase.

# Pathfinder Pinnock Hill to Airport cycle paths:

An updated options report has been provided by the Engineering Consultant following an initial review from the Project Team. The updated Options Report has been reviewed and submitted to the NTA for approval before moving to the next steps. Consultation is ongoing with the relevant stakeholders including the DAA, NTA and Bus Connects project team. Further updates will be provided over the coming months, through this report and at ACM level.

# <u>Howth-Malahide Area:</u> Baldoyle-Howth Protected Cycle Lane Scheme Phase 2

A review of the existing road network in Baldoyle is on the Active Travel Unit's programme for 2024-2025, which will include Willie Nolan Road, Brookstone Road and Main Street. The Phase 2 options report for the improvement of pedestrian and cycle facilities on the existing road network is being reviewed for Baldoyle Village and surrounding roads, connecting Grange Road cycle scheme to Warrenhouse Road Cycle Scheme and Baldoyle Greenway.

It is intended to progress to tender for consultants for the preliminary design of Phase 2 in Q3, 2024. Preparation of the brief has begun, in line with the Fingal County Development Plan, the Climate Action Plan and an Active Travel Strategy for Fingal.





# Paddy's Hill to Broomfield

Tender documents are being prepared for Consultant from the NTA Multiparty Framework for 'Concept Development and Options Selection'. Preparation of the brief and tender documents have begun. Brief for the appointment of consultant being drafted and currently being assessed and amended.

Enabling works have been substantially completed to provide connectivity from Paddy's Hill Car Park to St. Helen's Junior School and Limetree Avenue. This included tree surgeon works, footpath works, new access points to the school, ramps, table-top crossings, dropped kerbs and ramps on the carriageway on Paddy's Hill.







# Seapark Hill to Old Golf Course Link Park

A temporary footpath was constructed in December 2023, to provide safe access from Seapark Hill to the Old Golf Links site and paths through the park, providing safe connectivity to Seamount Heights. The Developer on the Seamount Road side has recently reopened the access, which is now through the new development, linking Seamount Road to the temporary footpath in Seapark Hill.

The design brief and tender documents have been prepared for the permanent link, and negotiations are ongoing at present with the Single Party Framework operator. Once negotiations are complete, it is intended to publish this tender as soon as possible to progress this project from the design phases through to completion.




### Feltrim Road Cycle Infrastructure

The brief and tender documents have been returned from the Single Party Framework Operator. The tender return will now be assessed and, pending the outcome of the tender assessment, the consultant will be appointed for multi-disciplinary consultancy services for the provision and improvement of infrastructure for pedestrians, people on cycles and other vulnerable road users.

The route of the Feltrim cycle scheme is shown on the map below, commencing at Kettles Lane, along the Feltrim Road to Mountgorry Way and on up to the Swords Road Roundabout. The study area is from the Mountgorry Way/Swords Road roundabout via Mountgorry Way and Feltrim Road, tying into the Feltrim Road/Kettle's Lane junction. An indicative route for illustrative purposes is provided below.

This map outlines the route of the proposed improved active travel infrastructure with the addition of a pedestrian crossing facility to be provided at/near the entrance to Kettles Park on Kettles Lane, and treatment of the three roundabouts at Swords Road/Mountgorry Way, Mountgorry Way/Feltrim Road, and Drinan Enterprise Centre/Liam Rogers Centre/MPETSS.

It is anticipated that a concept design will be completed by Q4 2024, with Preliminary Design commencing in Q1, 2025.



# Scoil an Duinninigh to Waterside Footpath and Cycleway

Planning permission has been granted for the school and the Department of Education is to engage with Fingal County Council in relation to pedestrian access as a condition of the granted Planning Permission. In the interim, a footpath, dropped kerbs with tactile paving have been provided on the route to/from the school and the Feltrim Road.





BMCO Area: Snugborough Road – NAC to Ongar

The options report for the project has been completed after internal reviews by the Project Team and a workshop with the NTA. A Gateway 2 Report has been issued to the NTA and approval to proceed to the preliminary design phase of the project has been received.

The consultant has received the stage 1 road safety audit on the emerging preferred option. The drawings are now being updated taking this audit into account. Stakeholder engagement continues with the Bus Connects project team for a proposed new signalised junction at Waterville. The latest drawings are being updated to reflect this design. A draft preliminary design report has been issued to the Active Travel Unit with comments sent back. Further updates will be provided over the coming months, through this report and at ACM level.

#### **Clonee to Blanchardstown Shopping Centre**

All data collection has been collated and has informed the initial development of the options report. Initial discussions have taken place with local landowners and site meetings have taken place. The design consultant has been issued with an updated review of the draft Options report and drawings following input from the Active Travel team. Once reviewed a workshop will be held with the NTA.

#### **Castleknock to Dunsink Lane**

This project is now focusing on Auburn Avenue linking into the Royal Canal at the 12th Lock along the Old Navan Road. The Options Report and relevant drawings for Auburn Avenue have been reviewed and approved by the NTA in compliance with the Gateway 2 Hold Point requirements.

A stage 1 road safety audit has been carried out and comments taken into consideration with drawings updated accordingly. Photomontages of the emerging preferred option have been prepared in advance of a public consultation with information leaflets being drafted for a letter drop to the wider area. Draft EIA and AA screening reports have also been submitted for review.

#### Hartstown/Huntstown/Mountview Road

It is proposed to use a newly formed Single Party Framework to progress design from earlier work carried out by the Cycle Design Office. A tender competition has been published to engage the design consultant for phase 2b in this regard. The tender competition is now closed and is under assessment. Fingal County Council will progress on finalising the detailed design for roundabout and junction upgrades. This is subject to revision of design standards to ensure compliance with the new National Cycle Manual.

#### Castleknock to Blanchardstown via Farmleigh

Stage 2 of the tender competition for a design consultant and assessment has been completed. Contract documents have been signed and sealed and a commencement meeting has taken place. The feasibility study has started, and traffic and drone surveys have taken place. A topographical survey has been completed and has been issued to the designers to inform the study.

#### **Towns & Villages**

Works are continuing in the development of an Active Travel Plan for several of our Towns & Villages. Details are outlined below.

#### **New Street**

Fingal County Council has received notification of Judicial Review proceedings challenging the Part 8 approval for the Public Realm Improvements. Fingal County Council's legal team are currently taking instructions in relation to this.

Tender documents have been developed for Stage 2b (detailed design) and negotiations are ongoing with the Single Party Framework Operator.





#### **Balrothery Active Travel Plan**


Documentation in relation to a 2nd non-statutory consultation is being prepared for online public consultation, to share conclusions from the event, emerging vision and the key principles informing this vision.

Baseline traffic surveys have been carried out in the village and the design team are awaiting a report of same.

The Consultant is also in the process of identifying Key Performance Indicators for Active Travel in Balrothery, for agreement with the Active Travel Unit. Different approaches to a solution are being developed to deliver Active Travel in Balrothery. Each of these approaches will be examined against the Key Performance Indicators for various locations across Balrothery to determine a best-fit approach. The approaches will then be put through a feasibility assessment to determine their appropriateness at varying locations across the village, which will inform the emerging plan for Active Travel facilities in Balrothery.

#### **Skerries Active Travel Plan**

Stage 2 Tender for the appointment of an Integrated Design Team are now currently out to the market with tender's due back by early July. Once the tenders are returned and assessed we anticipate being able to appoint a consultant by mid-August. This will be an important milestone for Skerries and allow us to move forward with an overall plan for the area.

Skerries Harbour Road:

The project team and consultants are reviewing and replying to the issues in the Pre-Planning Report received from the Planning Department. The Project Team has recently met with the local Councillors for the area and provided a brief and update on the status of the project and the next steps. Once documents and drawings are revised by the consultants, the project team will be bringing this project forward to non-statutory consultation with the stakeholder in the area over the coming months during the summer.

#### Connectivity/Permeability

We are continuing to receive various requests for Permeability and Connectivity improvements from various stakeholders across the county. These requests are being recorded in detail for evaluation through a multi criteria analysis.

The projects are then reviewed across the departments to identify if an appropriate means of delivery can be established on the ground.

Several projects identified through this process are being developed through the design phases for execution on the ground.

Other projects are being progressed in the areas at either design or construction stage. These Connectivity and Permeability improvements are being delivered in cooperation with our Operations Department. These projects will enhance local communities and provide improved walking and cycling infrastructure within the county.

Greenway connectivity support teams have been convened to review, design, and deliver active travel infrastructure that will enhance accessibility between the proposed strategic greenways and residential, educational, amenity and commercial zones. These support projects have been set up for Fingal Coastal Way, Broadmeadow Way/Sutton to Malahide Greenway and Royal Canal Greenway. This will help to optimise the use of the proposed greenway by both leisure and commuter users.

#### Newtown Bridge, Balheary Road:

The Engineering Consultant and Project Team are currently working to finalise the Non-Statutory Public Consultation Report, Options Report, Detailed Drawings and Screenings on the final option. Once the documents have been finalised, it will be published on the Consultation Portal in the coming weeks. The project team are working towards going to the market in the coming months for a Contractor to progress to the Construction stage in 2024, subject to approvals.

# Rush South Beach:

The project team and the Engineering consultant have prepared concept design and options report for new universal access path. Discussions with landowners are ongoing, with meetings held recently and further meetings with the landowners over the coming weeks.

We are working collaboratively with the property owners to find an optimal solution that caters for everyone's needs.

# Beaverstown Road, Donabate:

Active Travel has completed the Construction stage for the provision of footpath to link up to existing footpath along Beaverstown Road in Donabate.

Landscaping and planting have been completed and the new fence has been erected.

# Balgriffin Park Shared Pedestrian and Cycle Path:

This connectivity piece provides a shared pedestrian and cycle path from the county boundary with Dublin City on Balgriffin Park, to the junction with the R123. This provides a pedestrian and cycling connection for many dwellings on/near Balgriffin Park to the newly constructed pedestrian and cycling facilities on the R123. Works are complete.

## Howth Summit Inn to Bus Stop 567:

Dropped kerbs with tactile paving have been provided on the route between the Summit Inn and Bus Stop 567. This work has been completed.

## **Offington, Howth:**

Junction tightening and provision of tactile paving is complete at three junctions in Offington, Howth:

The two junctions of Offington Drive with Offington Avenue and the junction of Offington Lawn with Offington Avenue are complete. This will slow turning movements by motorised vehicles while providing a shorter crossing distance for pedestrians and other vulnerable road users. Newly landscaped areas have also been provided which will provide additional greenage and sustainable urban drainage. Some minor snagging relating to the newly landscaped areas remain and will be completed as soon as possible.







#### Secure Bicycle Parking Infrastructure

The contractor is progressing works associated with the provision of Secure Bicycle Parking Infrastructure throughout the county.

The Contractor is also currently progressing works to install a number of bicycle parking facilities across the Dublin 15 and Swords Areas. Works has recently been completed in Skerries, Rush and Balbriggan areas.

Expressions of interest was sent to schools, sports club and community centres in relation to the supply of bike parking facilities earlier this year. These expressions of interest have been assessed and orders are being placed for delivery to these facilities in the coming months.

# Safe Routes to School

#### Round 1 – Tranche 1

The works contractor for the Safe Routes to School Tranche 1 contract is finalising snags at each of the 5 schools. A brief update is provided below for each school site and associated construction works completed to date since the appointment of the works contractor.

#### **Rush and Lusk Educate Together**

# Round 2

In mid-December, An Taisce announced Round 2 of the Safer Routes to School programme, with the following Fingal schools selected:

- Holy Family Junior National School, Forest Fields, Swords
- Scoil Bhríde Buachaillí, Church Avenue, Blanchardstown
- Scoil Bhríde Cailíní, Church Avenue, Blanchardstown
- St Helen's SNS, Limetree Avenue, Portmarnock
- St. Colmcille's Girls' National School, Chapel Lane, Swords

The Active Travel team are working closely with An Taisce in relation to data collection and engagement with the schools to develop delivery plans to enable the designers and contractors to carry out the works.

An Taisce are due to provide the delivery plans for each of the schools in the coming weeks that will inform the design process. Some meetings and brainstorming sessions have taken place with the schools in advance of their summer break to allow the Project Team to continue with their works over the summer break. Fingal County Council has procured the services of a consultants' team that will be working on the designs for these schools.

## **Rush National School:**

Active Travel together with Operations have completed the public consultations connected to road safety measures in Rush. A School Street initiative for Rush National School and a junction upgrade adjacent to the school are now being developed with detailed design and tender documents for the appointment of a contractor to complete the works on the ground over the coming months.

The upgrade to the nearby 5-arm junction at Millbank Road, Chapel Road and Whitestown Road which forms part of the 2024 Programme of Works will improve the safety measures for vulnerable road users in the area. Together these upgrades will reduce traffic speeds in the area and provide children walking or wheeling to school with a much safer environment, at and on the approach to the school gate.

# Learn 2 Cycle Tracks.

#### Bike Week 2024

Bike Week took place in Fingal from the 11 to 19 May 2024. The week was a massive success with large crowds attending all the events across the county. The week began in Millennium Park with a Family Fun Day that included a small bike decorating session and parade, the street velodrome and lots more. The week was all about collaboration, we were in The Phoenix Park with Dublin City Council and The OPW for the inclusive cycling session on Sunday 11 and again for the Sunset Cyle on Wednesday 15, where over 100 cyclists joined us for an 8km spin around the park on a beautiful summers evening.



The next weekend started with our first Balance Bike Buddies Session on the new Learn 2 Cycle Track in Millennium Park, 20 children aged 2 to 4 joined us to start their 6 week course and kickstart their cycling journeys.



Throughout the week we worked in partnership with The Scéal Arts Collective in Balbriggan to host a full schedule of events across the town with everything from a bike themed art exhibition to bike safety checks in the pocket park.



The highlight of the week took place in Malahide on Sunday 19 May, where we kicked things off with a bike parade from New Street to the family fun day in Malahide Castle where over 1,600 people joined us to watch family films, The Secret Life of Pets and Sing 2.

Overall, the week was a huge success and the biggest Bike Week that Fingal has seen. We are already planning and looking forward to Bike Week 2025.



#### Lease Bike by Bleeper for Staff

The e-bike lease trial is continuing for staff, and feedback has been very positive. As part of our staff behavioural change programme, up to 10 staff per month from County Hall can sign up to receive a Bleeper e-bike, for a one-month trial. 3 different types of e-bikes are available: folding ebike, trekking or long-tailed cargo bike.



#### **Men's Health Week**

This year as part of Men's Health Week we teamed up with the Sports Office, The Irish Men's Shed Association and our Men's Walk & Talk Groups to host the first ever joint Fingal Sheds Slí event. On 12<sup>th</sup> Wednesday June, approximately 100 members of 9 Fingal Men's Sheds came to Newbridge House and Farm to enjoy a walk around the grounds, followed by an exhibition of the various activities that each shed takes part in. The event was a very enjoyable day and one that will hopefully become an annual event and grow from here.








## **Bike Repair Stations**

# **Fingal Quiet Streets Community Nomination**

The Active Travel unit received a fantastic response to their Quiet Streets nomination process, receiving 150 nominations from the community. The active travel team are now reviewing the nominations. The Quiet Streets initiative allows residents of streets affected by excessive traffic and other road safety issues to nominate their residential street for participation in a 6-month trial of road safety measures which include modal filtering, a longstanding traffic measure in which some streets are kept as through routes for pedestrians and cyclists, but motor vehicles can only access them from one direction using planters and bollards.

The value of the portfolio is the full Fingal County Council allocation of 1.127m Euro. We expect to hear back from the Department in the coming weeks. Legal agreement documents currently being prepared for the are implementation phase.

# Dublin Agglomeration Noise Action Plan 2024-2028

The Chief Executive is making a Noise Action Plan (NAP) along with Dublin City Council, Dun-Laoghaire Rathdown County Council, South Dublin County Council, Kildare County Council and Wicklow County Council in accordance with the European Communities (Environmental Noise) Regulations 2018 (S.I. No. 549 of 2018). The making of a Noise Action Plan is not a reserved function.

This Noise Action Plan is aimed at strategic longterm management of environmental noise from transport systems (other than aircraft) and is based on the findings from strategic noise maps and noise exposure statistics which informed assessments of population exposure and harmful effect of noise.

Areas (PIA priority important areas) have been identified with high concentrations of dwellings exposes to elevated noise levels (53dB  $L_{den} \& 45dB$   $L_{night}$  for roads) in the NAP. These priority areas will be further studied (e.g. further modelling, investigation, noise monitoring & identification and assessment of mitigation measures).

One of the actions for Fingal is to prioritise the use of lower road noise surfaces (stone mastic asphalt) over hot rolled asphalt in urban road surfaces. Stone mastic asphalt has the potential to reduce noise impacts bet 3 -5 decibels (dB) over hot rolled asphalt. In addition, there is a commitment to assess traffic calming schemes for noise in accordance with the traffic management guidelines and manual for streets to maximise noise reduction (some traffic calming measures can worsen noise if they encourage acceleration/ deceleration).

The results of the strategic noise maps have also been used to identify Candidate Quiet Areas (CQAs) areas within the Agglomeration to be considered for the preservation of areas where environmental noise levels are deemed to be good.

A draft Plan was put on display for Public Consultation for a 6-week period from 12<sup>th</sup> April to 24<sup>th</sup> May 2024. A total of 11 submissions from members of the public were received for the Fingal area.

Five submissions were made with regard to road noise. These cover traffic volumes, lack of noise barriers along M50, HGV traffic, and road surfaces.

The M50 will be the subject of further evaluation, there is not proposal in the plan to address HGV traffic which if it is to be addressed would have to be done through a national policy and legislation. There is a commitment in the plan to use lower road noise surfaces in urban areas for resurfacing projects.

One submission related to policy and Planning guidance

This submission is from the Acoustic Association of Ireland and call for noise planning policy. The National Planning Framework has an action prepare national noise planning guidance.

Two submissions commented on the quality of the maps and figures within the plan.

In this regard the noise maps for Fingal have been published on the Fingal Website on a gis viewer in the manner of the county development plan and is a superior way to view the maps One submission related to the selection of PIAs along the M50 in Dublin 15

There are a number of isolated priority important areas in the near the M50 and N3 these will not be assessed in isolation and most likely the whole length of the N3 and M50 in Dublin 15 for 300 m on both sides where there are residential areas will be assessed

One submission related to industrial noise and sites omitted from the noise mapping and exposure assessment.

Two of the sites raised were in Meath and omitted from the noise mapping. One quarry now being used for the disposal of soil was omitted. The omission of these two sites from the noise assessment is minor and will not impact the outcome of the plan, if there a local issue with noise from these sites the problems can be addressed through existing licences

Another submission requested that Garristown Bog and Bog of the Ring be included as Candidate Quiet Areas.

It is not proposed to amend the plan to include these sites, The eastern end of the Bog of the Ring is not quiet and neither of the sites have public access. It this changes during the life of the plan they can be considered for designation as quiet areas

County Council will undertake Fingal an assessment of the noise mitigation measure options relating to PIAs (areas with high concentration of dwellings with elevated noise exposure) within the life cycle of the NAP. This will include discussions across relevant sections within Fingal County Council and the Transport Infrastructure Ireland. The role and responsibility for the assessment and mitigation of noise from the Transport Infrastructure Ireland (TII) managed road network (M50, N3, N2 & M1) is the subject of difference between the local authorities and TII and has not been resolved. This is a significant issue for the mitigation of noise from these roads as Fingal are not in a position to mitigate the noise measures for these roads.

# National Food Waste Recycling Week

Now in its third year, the National Food Waste Recycling Week ran from the 2nd until the 9th June 2024. This campaign provided advice and easy to follow hints and tips to encourage everyone to recycle more of their food waste.

In Ireland, we waste about 800,000 tonnes of food each year, according to current best estimates. Growing, processing and transporting food uses a huge amount of resources, such as land, water, energy and fertiliser. If food is wasted, these resources are wasted too. The EPA estimates that food waste costs the average Irish household about €60 per month or €700 per year. That's an annual national cost of €1.29 billion.

This year's campaign aims to ensure that people understand that food waste needs to be fully separated from all packaging such as plastic or other containers to prevent contamination at the compost and anaerobic digestion facilities leading to higher quality recycling.

# School Food Waste Workshops

Students explored the impacts of food waste, examined the links between climate action and food waste and created practical solutions to manage waste. 150 students were reached through these workshops.





# Litter Management

To tackle littering and dumping more effectively, the Litter Wardens were assigned more targeted CRMs each day. They reported any dumping and littering to Operations division for removal and took enforcement action as required when evidence was found. They also followed up on witness statements submitted by Fingal citizens.



The Litter warden continued to carry out inspections and ensured that the roads were being keep clean of muck and that the building sites had a road sweeper in operation.

They also followed up on reports to ensure farmers were ensuring the roads were keep clean of muck.

The Litter warden continued to raise awareness of the issue of dog fouling on beaches targeting hot spots for dog fouling. They attended a beach awareness event on Balbriggan Beach on 4<sup>th</sup> June and meet with local Tidy Towns, Local Schools and Community Groups to highlight the impact dog fouling has on bathing waters and the responsibilities of dog ownership.



The Litter warden continued to raise awareness of the issue of dog fouling on beaches, they carried out extra inspections daily and on the Sundays prior to the water sampling taking place, which take place from May to September this year. They carried out an awareness campaign in June on the following beaches engaging with dog owners and dispensing dog poo bags, to make people aware of their responsibilities to clean up after their dogs.

They also erected anti dog fouling signage in areas where complaints were received.

The Litter Warden conducted walking patrols, engaging with business regarding their responsibilities to keep outside their premises clean and free of litter. They also checked to see if any issues have arisen for the Operations crews, and they carried out inspections and followed up with fines/warning notice if evidence found.

The Litter Wardens also attended the Gum Litter Taskforce roadshow which took place in Blanchardstown Shopping Centre.

The wardens started the annual litter quantification surveys in May to quantity the litter present, inspecting and counting litter present, thus Identifying black spots, to enable Fingal County Council tackle litter more effectively.

All the bring banks in the Fingal area were inspected daily to ensure that there was no dumping. Any evidence found was dealt with under the Litter Pollution Acts.

The Litter Warden also investigated reports of abandoned cars, taking photographs, and updating the litter app and the CRM system.

# Dog Warden Service

The dog wardens continue to carry out enforcement in relation to breaches of the Control of Dogs Act 1986, Control of Dog Regulations 1998, Parks and Open Spaces byelaws and Beach and Foreshore byelaws. They also educate dog owners on the responsibilities of keeping a dog and remind owners to pick up after their pets when in public places. The dog wardens also increase their patrols of the beaches during the summer months to optimise bathing water quality and retain the status of Fingal's Blue Flag beaches.

The dog wardens are continuing with door-to-door licence checks. Dog owners should ensure that they hold a valid licence for their dog and if issued with a 10-day notice by the dog wardens, should present their licence to <u>controlofdogs@fingal.ie</u> within the 10 days provided on the notice. Failure to do so may result in a fine being issued for failing to produce a dog licence when requested to do so by a dog warden and keeping a dog without a valid licence.

There were 408 x 10 Day Notices and 38 Fines issued by the dog wardens during May 24. There were 247 10-day notices and 58 fines issued to the 21st of June 24.

#### **Dog Shelter Service**

Dublin County Dog Shelter holds "Meet and Greet" visits for anyone looking to rehome a dog. Visits can be arranged by calling the shelter and arranging an appointment. These visits can be arranged from Monday – Friday from 11am to 1pm and from 2pm to 3.30pm. The shelter is also open on Saturday from 11am – 1pm. The shelter is closed to the public on Sundays. The dog shelter holds stray dogs picked up by the dog warden and dogs who have been surrendered by their owners either to the dog wardens or directly to the shelter. At the beginning of May there were 26 dogs in the shelter.

During May 2024, 14 dogs were brought to the shelter by the dog wardens as stray or surrenders and 3 dogs was surrendered by a member of the public. Of these 26 dogs, 2 were reclaimed by members of the public and 1 were PTS. At the end of May there are 23 dogs remaining in the shelter. The shelter has a Facebook page, Dublin County Dog Shelter and Instagram Account @dublincountydogshelter which they actively update with strays and dogs wishing to rehome.

# **Bathing Water:**

The 2024 bathing water season commenced on the 1<sup>st</sup> of June 2024 and already to date Fingal County Council has completed 3 bathing water sampling rounds. Bathing water samples collected from the designated bathing waters are analysed for two types of bacteria namely E. coli and Intestinal Enterococci.

To date all bathing water samples collected during the bathing water season have been determined to be of excellent water quality.

Bathing water sampling results recorded for the season will at the end of the year be added to a four-year sampling period which is then used to classify the beaches according to the levels of bacteria detected.

# Fingal at the 2024 Go for Life National Games

A team representing Fingal took part in the 2024 Active Age & Opportunity's National Go for Life Games event held in DCU on Saturday, June 8. Over 250 older adults took part in the event with Fingal represented by players from Baldoyle's Men Shed, Swords ICA, Active Retired members from Skerries, Castleknock and Blanchardstown. The Fingal Team were selected following a series of Games Practice Workshops held in the ALSAA Sports Complex in May. It was first time that the National Games was held since 2019 as the annual event had been interrupted by the pandemic. The Sports Office supports and encourages such initiatives and programmes that promote the continued participation in physical activity and the Go for Life Games demonstrate that sport is for everyone no matter what age or ability. The Go for Life Games are three target games. Málaí, an adaption of Cornhole, Flisk, an adaption of frisbee and horseshoe toss and Scidil, an adaption of tenpin bowling. Teams from Cavan, Dun Laoghaire Rathdown, Laois, Meath, Dublin City South and Westmeath were in Fingal's side of the draw and following a series of close competitive matches the Midlanders went home with the best County title.



# Movement & Mindfulness Workshops

Following the success of Fingal Sports Office's Movement & Mindfulness Workshops held in April & May at St. Colmcille's GAA, Swords. A new summer six-week programme was arranged for of June and July. Due to the high demand for places two sessions have been provided on the same day. Fifty-two participants were successful in obtaining a place in the classes. The workshops are a combination of chair yoga, breathing and mindfulness techniques and previous participants have praised the tutor for her teaching methods.



## **Men's Shed Physical Activity Day**

Fingal Sports Office and Active Travel collaborated on a Men's Shed Physical Activity Day during Men's Health Week. The event brought together upwards on 80 participants from 9 different Sheds in the Fingal area. The event started with a warm-up session followed by a 1k, 2k and 3k walk around Newbridge House. The Shed then returned to the walled gardens for displays on each shed, music, refreshments and garden games. This initiative allowed different Sheds and other stakeholders such as Age and Opportunity and Walk and Talk Groups to collaborate on various projects.

It also recognized the need to focus on healthrelated activities that can improve men's wellbeing with a move towards the formation of a sustainable walking and exercise group.



## **Defibrillator Training**

Fingal Sports Office delivered 2 Defibrillator Training Workshops following up from last month's Sports First Aid Series. These workshops were an accredited qualification from the Pre-Hospital Emergency Care Council focusing on cardiac arrest, heart attacks and strokes. This accreditation will give local club coaches key life skills in and outside the sports arena.





# Safer Together Summer Festival

As part of the Safer Together Summer Festival in Millennium Park on 8th June, the Sports Office facilitated a mini-football blitz for local clubs, a 3x3 basketball competition. and parkour demonstrations. Five local football clubs participated in the under-7 mini-football blitz, and for some of the teams, it was their first time playing organised matches. The 3x3 Basketball Ireland competition brought teams from all over Fingal to compete in the U14 boys', U14 girls', and senior men's categories. Dublin has an active parkour spots, community with several including Millennium Park, and groups dedicated to the discipline. Dublin Parkour came along for the day to demonstrate their acrobatic skills. They amazed festivalgoers with jumps, flips and tricks.







# Men's Health Week

International Men's Health Week (MHW) always begins on the Monday before Father's Day and ends on Father's Day itself. During 2024, it ran from Monday 10th until Sunday 16th June.

The overall aims of MHW are to:

- Heighten awareness of preventable health problems for males of all ages.
- Support men and boys to engage in healthier lifestyle choices / activities.
- Encourage the early detection and treatment of health difficulties in males.

As part of this year's Men's Health Week, the Sports Office supported clubs in delivering come-and-try sessions for men, with the intention that there would be follow-up sessions to introduce new male members to the club. There were 16 clubs across Fingal that signed up to deliver come and try sessions ranging from martial arts to fishing.

Active Cities Dublin also provided a Men's Health Walk on Saturday 15<sup>th</sup> June. Over 40 men took part in a walk on the Bog of Frogs Trail in Howth, with Beann Eadair GAA club providing refreshments along the route.







# **Come and Try Netball**

Fingal Sport Office in partnership with Netball Ireland have started a come try netball programme in the Liam Rodgers centre in Swords. The aim is to see if there is the interest in the Swords area to start a new netball club to cater for North Fingal Area. The project is set to run for 16 weeks from June 17<sup>th</sup> and will see females form the Swords and surrounding areas train in the skills of netball on Monday nights 7pm – 8pm. We have 10 participants turn up for the first's session and they were joined by the ladies from Boyne Netball who provided the coaching support.



Fingal Active Cities Dublin Race Series 5km The four Dublin Local Authorities collaborated through Active Cities Dublin to sponsor the Athletics Ireland Race Series 5km events that take place in the phoenix Park over three months. These events have over 10,000 people participate in the three events. The Active Cities Dublin Coordinators in each Local Authority linked in with local areas in areas of deprivation and running clubs with the aim to get people more active through running. We have linked in with clubs to set up beginner's couch to 5km programmes and for the participants to take part in the race series.



#### **Autism in Sport Course**

Fingal Sport Office hosted an autism in sport course online via zoom with Active Disability Ireland. We had 20 participants from clubs across the Fingal area. Most participants are volunteers with these local clubs who are upskilling their volunteers to help them be more inclusive. Staff also presented to the local Children's disability network groups to create a link with sports office and its offerings to help support children with additional needs join local clubs.
